KHS Tigers Open Football Season Here Friday Night

Kendrick High School's 1988 Tiger football team opens its season this Friday evening, Aug. 26, against the Timberline Spartans in a non-league contest that begins at 7:00 p. m.

Coach Terry Webb reported Tuesday that 40 players turned out for the football season this year. This is about 10 above the number that have been answering the call in previous years.

Graduation cut deep into the Tigers last May and missing from the line-up this fall will be Ron Hewett, Jim Woods and Tom Flowers, all of whom helped lead the KHS team to the District Championship and took them into the State playoffs. Kendrick finished the season last year with a 8-win, 2-loss record.

Coming back this season will be seniors Chad Sneve, a tight end; Scott Powers, wide receiver, and Chad Henson, a running back. Bert Brocke, a line backer will also be a returning starter on defense. Webb said Sneve will convert to a line backer on defense, and Powers will be a corner back.

With the loss of Ron Hewett, sophomore Reece Hewett will be calling the signals from the quarterback slot this year. Sophomores will be a feature of the KHS team this year, as Webb said he will probably be starting 5 or 6 sophomores on the offensive team.

Despite what Webb considers a pretty small team, he is still optimistic about their chances for a good season. "Potentially we're pretty good," he said. "If we can just get by these first three games with no major injuries, we'll be competitive." Kendrick's first three games are all non-league contests. "It's just the league games that count," Webb said.

Barring injuries that might force a change in his plans, the KHS coach hopes to be able to use a two platoons system this year. "We've got a balanced running and passing game so we'll just take whatever opportunities we get," he said.

Pre-season injuries haven't been too bad for the Tigers. Brady Lohman will be lost for a while with a dislocated shoulder and James Watson suffered a sprained ankle.

Asked about his team's league opposition this year, Webb figures that "everyone's going to be bigger than we are." But he's counting on his Tiger's conditioning and pride to offset the size disadvantage. He said if he had to make a pre-season prediction, he'd pick Deary as one of the league's powerhouses this year.

Marv Eveland will again be assisting with the football team this season.

Juliaetta Council Approves Budget

The Juliaetta City Council approved its budget for the coming fiscal year without opposition, at a special meeting of that group held Tuesday evening, Aug. 23. The budget was passed without change.

All members of the council were present at the meeting: Mayor Harold Freeman, Bruce May, Jim Cuddy, Dick Groseclose and Frank Groseclose.

Guests at the meeting were Don Bateman, city maintenance man for the City of Kendrick, Harry Burmeister, Diane Groseclose, Melanie Bacon, and Floyd and Betty Heimgartner.

At a short business session before the budget hearing, the council approved a \$25 license for the sale of bottled wine within the city limits. This will allow wine to be sold in grocery stores in Juliaetta with the prior permission of the council, of course, and the payment of the license fee.

The council also approved having City Clerk Nancy Fey attend the City Clerk Convention in McCall next month.

Don Bateman was present to request that Juliaetta's maintenance man, Ed Campos, be permitted to do the testing of Kendrick's water samples. Juliaetta has this capability and Kendrick, at present must send its water samples elsewhere to be tested. The council agreed to provide this service for Kendrick, which will be a definite benefit for the City of Kendrick.

Harry Burmeister was present to request the city participation in the recently organized GEM program, a project by the State Department of Commerce and Development, that is designed to help small communities develop a better economic base.

The council also discussed the installation of a walk-way down to the site of the new grocery store. One plans calls for development of a former mill race leading to the area. It was reported that Gem State Lumber, which owns the land is agreeable to such a proposal.

The next meeting of the council will be Tuesday, Sept. 6.

Matilda Riley Konen, a native of the Kendrick area, died at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center Tuesday morning, Aug. 23. Death was attributed to cancer. She was 83.

Mrs. Konen was born August 28, 1904 in the Pine Creek area. She was the daughter of Barney and Amelia Riley. She grew up on the family farm and attended the old Pine Creek School. She married Sylvester Konen at Coeur d'Alene in 1929. They farmed on Cedar Ridge and later in the Tammany area. They were divorced in 1951 and Mr. Konen died in 1971.

Survivors include a daughter, Helen Byers of Lewiston; two sons, Richard Konen and Joseph Konen, both of Lewiston, and three grandchildren; and five sisters: Alice Gilbert of Kendrick, Pat Tout of Deary, Nancy Henderson, Hermiston, Ore., Minnie McCoy, Stanfield, Ore., and Carrie Knutson of San Luis Obispo, California. Two brothers and two sisters preceded her in death.

Funeral services will be held Friday, August 26, at 10:00 a. m. at Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home in Lewiston. A graveside service will be conducted at the Kendrick City Cemetery at 11:30. Burial will follow.

J-K Recreation District Budget Was Approved

The proposed budget of \$10,900 for the Kendrick-Juliaetta Recreation District was approved without opposition last Thursday evening, Aug. 18.

The only change in the proposed budget was to increase the administrative portion from \$300 to \$800, and decrease the District Reserve fund by a similar amount. This change was made to meet the cost of the election which is to be held this year for District directors.

The director also approved changing the auditing firm which oversees the money from the Lucas Co of Moscow to Thiel and Marx. The District pays \$475 per year for this auditing service.

The District also renewed its membership in the Rails to Trails group, an organization that is interested in converting right-of-way land once used by the railroads to civic and community use.

Dick and Janice Groseclose, and Linda Groseclose were at the Thursday night meeting to discuss the possibility of getting funds from the Recreation District to help the City of Juliaetta in the installation of a sidewalk or pathway down to the west end of town. The proposed walk would lead from about the Monte Calkins residence out to the Gem State Lumber Co. area.

The Recreation District is now studying this request.

The City of Kendrick also requested money from the district to help pay the cost of installing a new diving board at the swimming pool. This project would involve lowering or deepening one end of the pool, and the installation of the board. It is estimated that this project will cost about \$15,000, and the city is requesting about \$8,000 to meet expenses.

The district tabled this request until a later date.

Kendrick Tightens Water Restrictions

The Kendrick City Council, meeting in special session Tuesday evening, Aug. 23, voted to continue the restrictions on outside watering and even tightened the present rules that were imposed last week.

The main change in the restrictions approved Tuesday night was the adding of hours when watering may be done. The same watering dates were maintained, only now watering on approved days can only be between the hours of 6 and 8 p. m.

The city has been divided into two sections for watering purposes.

City residents who live North of Main Street and West of the old school house hill may water on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays between the hours of 6 and 8 p. m.

Residents living South of Main Street and East of the old school house hill may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays between the hours of 6 and 8 p. m.

There is NO Sunday watering. Mayor Darrel Brocke said the city is closely monitoring the output of its wells and all three wells have shown a definite drop in output. The main well has shown a drop from 130 gallons per minute to 100 gallons per minute. The spring has decreased from 20 to 8 gallons per minute, and the city "second well" is producing only 23 gallons per minute.

The city well in the East end of town is being used on a limited basis because of its sulfur content.

Brocke said the council is urging all residents to be as saving on water for all purposes as possible until the present dry season is over and the water supply is adequate.

Foundation Seed Requests Should be Ready by Sept. 2

Wheat and barley growers desiring to purchase foundation seed from the North Idaho Foundation Seed Association (NIFSA) should have their requests ready by September 2,

according to Richard Ohms, secretary/manager of NIFSA. Allocations will be approved at the third quarter director's meeting to be held at 10:00 a. m., September 2, at the Mark IV in Moscow. Prices will likely be 30 cents per pound for each of 6 winter wheat varieties and also for the winter barley variety.

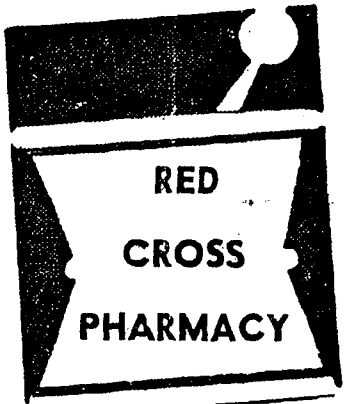
NIFSA was organized to provide northern Idaho growers with foundation seed of new or commonly grown commercial crop varieties. "Foundation" seed is a class of seed with stringent requirements regarding varietal purity, weed seed, and disease contamination. Foundation seed for any crop variety is generally available to only a small number of farmers because it is in short supply. Fields planted with foundation seed are then harvested as "certified" seed, which also must meet many quality requirements, but is readily available to most growers.

Soft white winter wheat varieties available through NIFSA include Dusty, Lewjain, Stephens, and Hill 81, which are old releases familiar to most wheat producers. Two new wheat varieties available are Madson common wheat and Hyak club wheat developed by WSU and released in cooperation with the Idaho, Washington, and Oregon Agricultural Experiment Stations. Both of these are unique as they have shown excellent resistance to strawbreaker footrot. One winter barley variety is available through NIFSA, 78AB812 which has shown good yield (over 5,000 pounds/acre) under irrigation, but has not been extensively tested under dryland conditions.

Growers interested in applying for

foundation seed from NIFSA should contact Ohms at 243-4903 or their local county extension agricultural agent, or plan on attending the NIFSA meeting.

Marriage Is Good

Statisticians say that somewhere in the neighborhood of fifty percent of all marriages in the United States end in divorce. And also of the remaining relationships that stay intact, ninety-five percent are emotionally divorced. These marriages may seem together on the surface, and some things in life are shared, but it is more of a relationship of convenience than an intimate marriage. The American home needs help!

In the book of Proverbs, chapter 18 and the 22 verse we read "Whoso findeth a wife findeth a good thing, and obtaineth favour of the LORD." By this passage we know that when a wife is found, or rather when a couple comes together in the bonds

of marriage, that God says it's good. So then God's perspective on marriage, anyone's marriage, is that it is good.
