She was born New Year's Day, 1923 at Winner, South Dakota. She attended school there.

During World War II, she worked at the Hanford Nuclear Reservation in Washington.

In 1948, she married Melvin Hamilton at Winnemucca, Nev. The couple lived in places throughout the Northwest until 1968 when they moved to Juliaetta.

Mrs. Hamilton is survived by her husband at the family home in Juliaetta; two sons, Robert Hamilton of Deary and Michael Hamilton of Portland, Oregon; a daughter, Gail Huber of Pendleton, Oregon; a stepson, Bart Hamilton of Orofino; a stepdaughter, Susan Brenner of Hillsboro, Oregon; two brothers and two sisters, whose names and addresses were not available; nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Hamilton's funeral will be at 2 p. m. Thursday at Juliaetta Community Church. The Rev. Clifton Morey will officiate, and burial will be at Juliaetta Cemetery.

James W. Holt, 72, Passes October 3

James William Holt, age 72, a lifelong Kendrick area resident, died Monday afternoon, October 3, at the home of his daughter at Onaway.

He was born September 16, 1916, to James and Jessie Hunt Holt on Texas Ridge. He grew up there and attended school at Gold Hill, Kendrick and San Diego. James ranched before his marriage to RoseAnn Cuddy in Lewiston on January 10, 1944.

In May of 1945, James entered the Army and served in the Asiatic-Pacific Ocean Theater and was discharged in 1946.

He ranched, was a mill worker and also a logger prior to his federal employment, serving as field agent for the Bureau of Sports, Fisheries, and Wildlife for over 20 years.

His interests included hunting, fishing, photography and gardening. He also enjoyed raising pheasants and pigeons. He was a member of Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Kendrick, Idaho.

Survivors include his wife, RoseAnn at the family home; three sons, Michael and Andrew of Kendrick, and Stephen of Potlatch; three daughters, Carolyn Nelson of Moses Lake, Wash., Eileen Ball of Potlatch, and Amy Lynn Holt of Coeur d'Alene; and ten grandchildren.

A brother Felix preceded him in death.

The body was cremated with a committal service to be held Saturday, October 8, at 2:00 p. m. at Wild Rose Cemetery on Bear Ridge. Rev. Clifton Morey of the Juliaetta Community Church and members of the Kendrick V. F. W. Post 3913 are in charge of the services.

Shorts Funeral Chapel at Moscow is in charge of arrangements.

With the game pretty much decided, both coaches used their bench in the fourth quarter and the Tigers scored 20 points with Cade Konen taking a pass from Hewett for 15 yards and the touchdown and then the same pair scored the extra point on a pass play. Scott Powers took a pass from Hewett in a 20-yard play for another Tiger score and after Deary's Dock White scored on an 18 yard run, Hewett touched to Chad Sneve for the final touchdown of the game.

The winless Troy Trojans, who have a young team just like the Tigers, come down Friday night for a 7:00 o'clock contest. Troy lost to Genesee last Friday 20-14, but did score against the Bulldogs for the first points of the season.

Juliaetta Council Didn't Tax Television Cable Connections

At the regular meeting of the Juliaetta City Council held Tuesday evening, the members discussed what they felt might be a misunderstanding by new subscribers to the recently installed Cablevision TV system. The subject came to light within the past few days when councilman Bruce May heard a representative of Cablevision explain to both he and other persons signing up for the service that the city of Juliaetta had imposed a 3% tax on cable charges.

May told the Gazette Tuesday evening that the council had never imposed such a tax, nor will it ever. What the council did do, on the advice of its attorney Will Harrington, was to set a 5% franchise fee on the Cablevision company. This is, according to councilman May, a standard common practice by cities served by cable systems, to cover the cost of having the lines on city property which would be used to meet insurance additions and other costs that might arise. May said the company understood this fee and accepted it when the franchise was granted.

May said he did not know whether the representative of Cablevision who was signing up subscribers did not understand the original agreement, or just what the added 3 percent might represent, he wasn't sure of, but the council wanted the citizens of Juliaetta to know that the council was not taxing them for connecting with the cable service.

City Clerk Nancy Fey told the Gazette later Tuesday night that she will contact Cablevision Wednesday, or as soon as possible to help clear up the matter.

All members of the Council were at the meeting Tuesday evening presided over by Mayor Harold Freeman. Present were councilmen Jim Cuddy, Bruce May, Dick Groseclose, and Frank Groseclose.

Ken MacDonald, a representative of Rowand Machinery Co was also at the meeting to discuss the city's interest in either a back hoe or a grader. MacDonald told the council he will be on the lookout for the type of used equipment they might be interested in.

The council further expressed interest in joining the Clearwater Resource Conservation and Development Association. A group whose goal is to improve the economic growth of small communities.

The council also adopted an initiative and referendum ordinance. This was done on the advice of state legal authorities and sets rules and procedures for dealing with any possible problems in this field in the future.

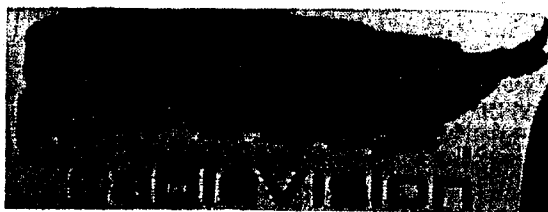

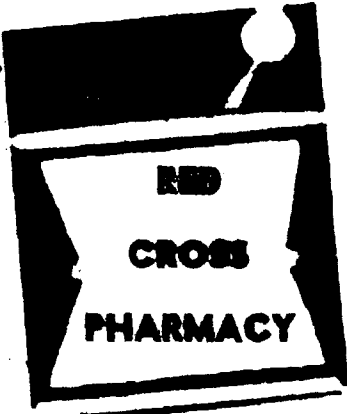
