The Star was one of the newspaper published in that town in the early days. It was a four-page paper, the same size as the Gazette is now and the subscription price was \$1 a year. Mrs. Nellie (Talbot) Biddison had originally owned the paper and she had saved it because it contained the story of her marriage to Mr. Biddison, who owned the dry line in Julietta for many years.

Among the other news the edition carried was that wheat was 90c a bushel and flour was \$1.30 a sack.
