Old Copy of Juliaetta Paper Found by Nelsons

While looking through some old old papers last week, Ed and Erna Nelson came across a copy of the "Juliaetta Star" dated May 17, 1912. The Star was one of the newspaper published in that town in the early Dick Cuddy. Lynne Cuddy of Coeur days. It was a four-page paper, the same size as the Gazette is now and the subscription price was \$1 a year. Mrs. Nellie (Talbott) Biddison had originally owned the paper and she had saved it because it contained the story of her marriage to Mr. Biddison, who owned the dray line in Juliaetta for many years.


