## Christie Eacker, 90, Once of Bear Ridge, Passes October 18

Christie M. Eacker, a Lewiston homemaker and a former Big Bear Ridge resident, died of causes related to age Tuesday morning, October 18 at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston. She was 90.

She was born February 18, 1898, at Anadarko, Oklahoma, the daughter of William and Esther Whybark. The family came West in a covered wagon when she was 6 weeks old and settled in the Caldwell area.

Mrs. Eacker lived on Bear Ridge near Kendrick where she attended school and lived until 1916.

She married George W. Eacker on Nov. 30, 1916, at Troy, Idaho. The couple then lived at Deary, where her husband farmed. From 1922 to 1932, they farmed in Nebraska and South Dakota. They then moved back to Deary, where her husband was employed by the Idaho Highway Department and owned a small farm. They moved to Lewiston in 1971.

Mr. Eacker died June 24, 1973.

She enjoyed crocheting and gardening and was a member of the United Brethren Church Ladies Aid Society at Deary and the Warner Avenue Alliance Church at Lewiston. Survivors include three sons, Lyle W. Eacker of Lewiston, Carroll J. Eacker of Princeton, Idaho, and Wayne L. Eacker of Spokane; a daughter, Margie E. Mertsching of Moscow; two sisters, Chloe Warner of Deary and Ruby Lukens of Glenden Beach, Oregon and a brother, Dan Whybark of Sedro Wooley, Wash.

A daughter, Georgie Pearl Eacker, seven brothers and two sisters died previously.

A funeral was held Saturday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Jack Trainor of the Warner Alliance Church officiating. A graveside service was held at the Wild Rose Cemetery on Big Bear Ridge.

(Frank Jacobson and his wife Virginia recently attended the Idaho State Grange Convention held in Idaho Falls, as delegates from Kendrick Grange No. 413. Here is Virginia's account of the event.)

As the new Master and Lecturer of Kendrick Grange No. 413, Frank and I drove to Idaho Falls to attend the 80th Annual State Grange Convention. Since we had never been to Montana, we went up over the Lolo Pass (not so frightening after all) and spent the night in Butte. The next day we arrived at our motel at about the same time as Latah County Pomona delegates Nellie and Lawrence Heimgartner did.

It was a beautiful trip visually, and the weather was just perfect for the whole six days we were gone. Convention headquarters motel, the Littletree Inn, was ideally situated; the restaurant was just a few steps away, and the Elks Club, where our meetings were held, wasn't much farther.

Some 335 delegates, alternates and visitors participated in the convention. Grange business, consisting of committee assignments, reports, conferences, nominations, and elections, and the conferring of the 5th and 6th degrees, took up most of the time. What was left was filled with drawings for door prizes, "one liners", and alot of laughs.

The adoption of a resolution to quit paying the Idaho State Grange Treasurer (a pittance, really) resulted in ongoing actions that kept us in a really silly and fun mood over the remaining days of the session. After the adoption of the resolution, Treasurer Leah Brewington broke down with loud and pathetic boo-hoos over becoming poverty stricken. After a recess, she appeared with a cane, dark glasses, and a cup filled with pencils, and proceeding around the hall she received many "donations." ## Kendrick Bombs Troy 42-20 In Final Game

Kendrick had to spot the winless Troy Trojans an early touchdown last Friday night before they settled down to close out the 1988 season with a 42-20 victory over the Trojans on the Troy field. Coach Terry Webb and his Tigers finished the long season with a 4-2 league record and an overall 4-5 mark.

Trojan Kirk Griffis galloped 60 yards in the first quarter then carried over the conversion for two more points before Jerrod Silflow ran 7 yards in the same period to score for the Tigers. Tomy Smith put the Tigers ahead in the second quarter with a 3-yr run and Reece Hewett passed to Shane Taylor for the two extra points and the Tigers led 14-8 at half time.

In the third period the Tigers increased their lead with Scott Powers scoring on a 10 yard run and Brian Witt went 4 yards for another KHS touchdown.

There were four touchdowns scored in the final period with Jeff Abbott going 70 yards for Troy and Scott Powers taking a 17 yard pass from Hewett for a Kendrick tally and Bert Brocke running across the extra points.

Mike Policho scored on a 55 yard pass play from Kreg Hokanson and then Jerrod Silflow closed out the game with a 44 yard run.

This was the final high school football game for eight members of the Kendrick Tiger team.



### THE PARSON'S CORNER

America the Great

De Tocqueville of France, over a hundred years ago, visited America. Upon his return home he wrote: "I sought for the greatness of America in her harbors and rivers and fertile fields, and her mines and commerce. It was not there. Not until I went into the churches and heard her pulpits flame with righteousness did I understand the greatness of her power. America is great because she is good; and if America ever ceases to be good, America will cease to be great."

Presidential elections have a way of bringing out patriotism in most of us. Our desire is for America to be great. The candidates, each in their own way say the same thing: "We together can make America great again!" The passion runs deep within us as we long for our land to be blessed and prosperous.

So what has caused America to slip from her former greatness? To slip from being a creditor nation to a debtor nation? To slip from leading

the world in economics and in industry to just trying to keep pace? In the book of Proverbs we read, "Righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people." (Pro. 14:34). According to God's Word, America's former greatness was due to her former righteousness, and her present state is due to her present sin.

A question we need to answer is: "What is a national sin?" National sin is when a nation by its laws and institutions call what is right wrong, and what is wrong right. 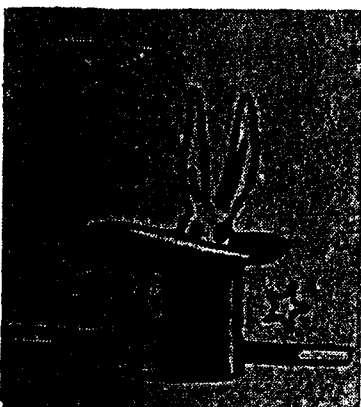
