Applications for Fuel Assistance Being Taken

Applications are currently being taken for Fuel Assistance for low-income citizens in Asotin, Nez Perce, Idaho, Latah, Lewis, and Clearwater Counties. Citizens who meet the income eligibility guidelines can receive a benefit payment that is to be applied toward winter heating costs, no matter what kind of heat energy is used.

In Idaho each applicant must furnish proof of address, household social security numbers and proof of gross household income for anyone over age 16, for the past 30 days or 1 month previous to the date of application.

The same applies to Washington applicants with the exception that proof of gross income is for the past 3 months previous to the date of application.

Applications are taken by appointment only at designated locations in each county.

City to Change Entry Access To Fosterville

Kendrick Mayor Darrel Brocke revealed at the Tuesday night council meeting that the city has received permission from the State Highway Department to change the entry into the small settlement in the east part of town known as Fosterville, in an effort to slow down speeders who have been using the road as a short-cut. Speeding cars have been a complaint by residents in that section for a number of years.

With the approval of the State, the city will now change the entry from almost straight to a 90 degree angle which should, it is hoped, slow down those who use the road. The old entry will be blocked when the new access is completed. Brocke said the city hopes to have the project completed before Spring.

All members of the council were present at the Tuesday session presided over by Mayor Brocke. Present were councilmen Dana Magnuson, Dick Benjamin, Dave Klatt and Jerry Brown. Also present were City Clerk Donna Goff and City Maintenance man Don Bateman.

The city went on record as publicly thanking the young men and women who worked so hard on their "Adopt-a-Town" project. Brocke was speaking for the entire community when he thanked the workers and expressed appreciation of their efforts.

City Will Collect the Leaves—

Don Bateman reported to the council that he will pick up the leaves raked from private property, if the home owners will just rake them out into the gutters of the streets so he can get to them.

The city also approved the purchase and installation of an emergency light for the Fire Hall. This will be a self-contained, battery operated system that will automatically turn on in the event of a power interruption.

Dana Wins

Dana Magnuson, a Kendrick insurance agent, won the seat on the Latah County Commission as commissioner for District 3 in the general election held Tuesday, Nov. 8. With all but three precincts in the county reporting, Magnuson had received 5,399 votes to his opponent Roy Krause's 4,639. This will be the first time since the late Gerald Ingle held office that a Kendrick-Julietta man has served on the county commission.

Talking to the Gazette early Wednesday morning, Magnuson expressed his deepest appreciation for the support he received during his campaign from his friends in this area. "The fun part is over now," Magnuson, "now I've got to get to work."

In the contest for Commissioner from District 1, incumbent Tom Spangler turned back the bid of his Republican opponent Gerald D. Schutz, and a write-in campaign by Moscow businessman Mark Solomon, to win another 4-year term. As of Wednesday morning, and with only 3 precincts to count, Spangler had received 4,411 votes, Schutz 3880, and Solomon 2013.

In the contest for State Representative from District 5, incumbent Tom Boyd had polled 6,623 votes to his Democratic opponent' Liz Sullivan's 4,200. Boyd, a popular Genesee farmer, is expected to retain his position as Speaker of the House.

Kathlyn Morey Wins Football Forecast

The ladies continued to out-pace the men in Kendrick's Weekly Football forecast, as Kathlyn Morey won this week by picking 14 of the 16 games played in the NFL correctly. This was Mrs. Morey's first win of the season and she will receive the \$5 gift certificate from Wally Butler's Farm Bureau Insurance Office here in Kendrick.

Master Frank Jacobson presented Betty Cowger, chairman of the Women's Activity Committee, with a check from State Grange for taking third place with her scrapbook. A tasty lunch—one of Betty's ongoing responsibilities—was provided by Manning and Elsie Onstott, Henney Reil, and Kathryn Morey.

The next meeting of the Grange on Tuesday, November 15, will focus on Thanksgiving and feature folk-singer/composer Peggy Harvey-Marose of Juliaetta. Peg, who was an intern at Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church and the proud mother of young Douglas, has been assigned to the Montana Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. She and her husband await the family's future with some excitement. The Grange is looking forward to her program.

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

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Aspirin decreases the blood's ability to form blood clots, the foremost immediate cause of most heart attacks and strokes. Because aspirin "thins the blood," it increases the risk of hemorrhage in the brain, a less common cause of stroke.
"We have to be cautious about suggesting aspirin for the entire population," advises Dr. Milo Gibaldi, dean of pharmacy at the University of Washington. "It comes down to prescribers making an assessment of individual patients."
The study that has received such widespread publicity (published in the January 28, 1988 New England Journal of Medicine) was conducted on 22,000 male physicians with no conditions that might be aggravated by aspirin, such as liver or kidney disease, gout, hemorrhagic stroke, peptic ulcer or aspirin sensitivity.
"The evidence suggests that there's more benefit than risk in taking aspirin for people who are at risk for heart attack because they have already had a heart attack or have unstable angina (chest pain caused by insufficient blood supply to the heart)," Gibaldi says. "In addition, aspirin may be useful for people at risk because their families have a history of heart attacks, because they smoke, or because they have high levels of cholesterol in the blood."
"But I would be very conservative about suggesting aspirin therapy for a healthy person who has few or no risk factors," he adds.
Dr. J. Ward Kennedy, UW profes-

sor of medicine and director of cardiology at the University Hospital in Seattle, generally agrees with that assessment.
He believes an aspirin every other day would be beneficial for people who have had heart bypass surgery or a previous heart attack, or who have cardiovascular disease or angina.
Kennedy also believes aspirin therapy is a good idea for men over age 40 and women over 50 who are at high risk for a heart attack because of a family history of heart attack, particularly if they have a father or brother who had a heart attack before age 60.
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Those risks increase with larger doses of aspirin, which are not necessary since one aspirin every other day is enough to reduce the clotting action of blood, Gibaldi says. "Some people just take one baby aspirin a day," he notes.
Clearly, patients must weigh the benefits of aspirin against possible complications. Your physician can help you determine whether it's more important for you to reduce

risk of heart attack, taking aspirin or to avoid the possibility of complications that may come with aspirin therapy.

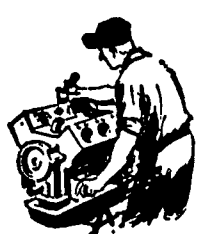
