Cholesterol Testing in Kendrick Nov. 29

Cholesterol has gained much attention in the last few years and many people are talking about their cholesterol levels, cholesterol free foods, "bad" cholesterol, etc. Do you know your cholesterol level? Do you know why cholesterol is important? All adults should be aware of their cholesterol levels.

North Central District Health Department will sponsor a cholesterol screening and education program on Tuesday, November 29th, 12:30 to 3 p. m. at Kendrick Senior Citizen Center. The fee for this screening is \$3.00 for Senior Citizens (55 years and older) and \$5.00 for non-senior citizens. A cholesterol screening requires obtaining a small amount of blood from a finger stick. Fasting is not required for this screening. All adults are encouraged to have a cholesterol screening.

What to do, or rather what can be done with the bridges leading up Sperry Grade and Southwick Grade, will be topic of discussion at a special meeting of the Kendrick City Council Tuesday morning at 10 a. m. on Nov. 29 at the Kendrick Fire Hall.

In addition to the Kendrick City Council, there will be representatives from the Nez Perce County Commission, the South Latah Highway District, Latah County Commission and the State of Idaho.

Basically, Kendrick mayor Darrel Brocke said, the group will exchange ideas on the two bridges, and explore the various options which are available to bring the structures up to standard levels of safety.

This meeting is open to the public and any interested persons may attend.

Julietta Council Met Tuesday Night

All members of the Julietta City Council were present at the regular meeting held Tuesday evening at City Hall. Mayor Harold Freeman presided over the session with councilmen Frank Groseclose, Bruce May, Richard Groseclose and Dirk Hammond in attendance. There were no guests at the meeting.

The council agreed to hire the accounting firm of Hayden and Ross of Moscow to conduct the annual city audit.

In a discussion of television service, the council wishes to inform subscribers to the Cablevision system that if they have any problems or questions about television service, they should call the Cablevision company in Moscow. The city is unable to provide service or information on cable service. This can be done only by the company providing the lines.

The council also decided to go ahead with the study of the Cox's Spring as a possible water supply for the city. There are matters of access and necessary adjacent property to the spring which needs to be worked out if the city plans to put the springs on the line providing water.

The city will continue the project of drawing up job descriptions for the city clerk and maintenance men. The council also thought that it would be desirable if the clerk publish an agenda of council meeting in the future so local residents will know what topics are to come before the meetings.

Coach Clark Bradley will send his 1988 version of the Kendrick Tigers boys basketball team out on the hardwoods next Tuesday night as the Tigers open the current year hosting the Potlatch Loggers.

Bradley will be forming his team around returning lettermen Chad Sneve, Aaron Heinen, Chad Henson, Mike Morey and Jason Butler. Moving up from the junior varsity ranks will be James Watkins, Tory Smith, Reece Hewett and Shane Taylor.

The Tigers will have "pretty good" height this year with at least two 6-3 men on the team. There are 20 students turning out for basketball this season and Bradley mentioned that Ron Morgan, at 6-4, and Don Brown, another 6-3 man, both now on the JV squads will probably see action with the varsity this year.

Wet Week for Area

There has been plenty of slush, mud and rain in the area the past week, but not much complaining about it was heard from residents, especially the farmers who welcomed the moisture in any form after the dry, near drought conditions of late summer and fall.

A week ago Monday the area received its first significant snowfall of the season with several inches covering the ground on the ridges and at least an inch falling in Kendrick and Julietta. The Genesee area receive the brunt of the storm and reported 8 to 10 inches of snow. School was dismissed one day because of drifting snow.

Over in the Stonypoint area, Walt Zumhove reported 5 inches of snow in his rain gauge Monday morning. Since last Saturday, Walt said the gauge collected 3/10ths on Saturday, 2/10th on Sunday morning, 1/10th Monday and Tuesday morning of this week his gauge held 4/10ths of an inch. All this was unofficial, of course, but it does show that the area is finally getting some badly needed moisture.

Remember the oatmeal you hated as a kid? Research dating back to the 1960's indicate 3/4 cup of oat bran or 1 cup oatmeal can significantly lower your blood cholesterol. However, to have lasting effects, it must be a regular part of the daily diet and must accompany an overall lowering of fat and cholesterol intake. Seventy-two medical students at the U. of California ate 2 oat bran muffins a day for 1 month lowering cholesterol counts by an average of 5 percent. A 1 percent decrease means a 2 percent decrease in heart disease risk.

Oats bran contains large amounts of soluble fiber—citrus, beans, peas, all contain soluble fiber). Soluble fiber decreases the L. D. L. (which

First—the 2 mill levy is the maximum legal levy limit. That is not to say that we, the Board, will levy that amount, but only that it allows us to levy any amount up to that limit. We have had to hold two override levy elections because we were frozen at \$200 per year by the 1% initiative. These override elections are expensive and a waste of taxpayers money. That is why we are asking for a 10-year limit on this override election.

Our annual budget runs around \$1,000 with mower repairs, fuel, wages and insurance.

We supplement the levy with whatever money comes in from the sale of lots. For those who don't know, if the override passes in December, the District won't receive any money from the override until January of 1990.

I feel passage of this election is very important to the Leland and Cameron areas to maintain our two cemeteries.
