She was born at Coeur d'Alene Sept. 1, 1931, to E. Ruldolph and Elma L. Jacobson. She graduated from high school at Rathdrum, Idaho in 1950 and had lived in several areas throughout the Northwest until 1967 when she moved to Spokane. She had married and divorced.

Heikkila moved from Spokane to Juliaetta in 1987.

While at Rathdrum, she attended the Christian Church there.

Survivors include her mother, Elma L. Kirbyson of Juliaetta; two sons, Bill E. Kelly of Lewiston and Terry L. Hudson of Juliaetta; three daughters, Lynda L. Lawson, Debra S. Harris and Robyn M. Heikkila, all of Juliaetta; a brother, Raymond D. Jacobson of Whitefish, Mont.; a sister, Vera J. Kleinbrook of Seattle; and five grandchildren.

A graveside service was held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the Sandpoint Cemetery at Sandpoint, Idaho. The body was cremated.

Sperry Grade Bridge Will Get Improvements

Sperry Grade bridge, the subject of many discussions between state, county and city officials over the past years, will get some improvements. That was the decision coming out of a meeting Tuesday morning of representatives of the Kendrick city council, the Nez Perce County commission, South Latah Highway District and the State of Idaho Highway Dept.

The City of Kendrick, the Nez Perce County Commission, and the South Latah Highway District agreed to take equal responsibility for the upkeep of the bridge that spans the Pottlatch River in West Kendrick.

The meeting was held at Kendrick Fire Hall Tuesday morning at 10 a. m. Fifteen officials and about the same number of spectators were present for the session hosted by the Kendrick council.

The three entities that agreed to do the improvements on the bridge will not attempt any major overhauling of the structure at first, reported Kendrick mayor Darrel Brocke. He said the first step would be to bring the bridge up to safe, state-approved standards for a 5-ton limit. Once the bridge meets these standards for safe use, then the 5-ton limit will be strictly enforced, which means light traffic only and the end of farm trucks and other heavy equipment utilizing the bridge.

It is understood that Nez Perce County will draft a letter to be sent to possible users of the bridge that the limit will be strictly enforced.

Brocke said the Nez Perce commission, South Latah Highway Dist. and the City of Kendrick will meet in a few months to evaluate the cost of bringing the bridge up to 5-ton standards.

The Wanucher Gulch bridge was also discussed, but this is a responsibility of the Nez Perce Commission and South Latah Highway Dist. who will meet later and plan for improvements.

Toddo The Caribou Poached, Reward Fund Grows to Over \$3,500

One of Idaho's endangered woodland caribou was poached recently near the northeastern Washington town of Newport, and the radio-transmitter collar, along with identifying eartags, left behind. The caribou bull, named "Toddo" by the Council, Idaho, schoolchildren who followed its progress under the Adopt-A-Caribou program, was released in the Idaho Panhandle eight months ago after being moved from Anahim Lake, British Columbia.

Reward funds exceeding \$3,500 have been pledged from a variety of sources including the Inland Northwest Wildlife Council, Spokane; Regional and National Offices of the National Audubon Society in Boulder, Colorado, Washington, D. C. and New York, New York; Izaak Walton League of America in Arlington, Va., and the Golden Eagle Chapter of the Audubon Society in Boise. The reward will be paid for information leading to arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible.

cause of the federal listing, and use of federal funds in the effort to prevent extinction of caribou in the Pacific Northwest, agents of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service have been called in to aid the investigation. Federal penalties could include fines of up to \$100,000 and a year in prison. Washington state fines, civil penalties and jail time are additional under state law.

The caribou transplant program was carried out jointly by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Washington Department of Wildlife and British Columbia Ministry of Environment.

A total of 48 caribou have been moved in the past two years to augment a small migratory population of the species frequenting the Selway Mountains in northern Idaho and adjacent portions of Washington, Montana and British Columbia. At one time, their native range included most of Idaho north of the Salmon River.

Idaho's Adopt-A-Caribou program gained international print and broadcast media attention due to its popularity with students and the general public. Under the program, radio-transmitter collars were distributed to the participant schools, where students decorated them with classroom wishes for long life and happiness in their new home. The collars

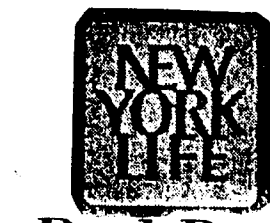
were collected by biologists and fitted to the individual caribou prior to release.

Thomas Jefferson had two rivals for the hand of the lady who finally became his wife. One visiting day
