Juliaetta Council Halts All Outside Watering

In its most severe restriction to date, the City of Juliaetta halted all outside watering until further notice at its meeting Tuesday evening, Aug. 8. Problems have developed at well No. 9, from which the city was obtaining most of its water and the council felt it had no alternative but to stop all outside watering. The council deeply regrets this action and again asks for the public's understanding and cooperation.

All members of the council: Dick Groseclose, Frank Groseclose, Dirk Hammond and Bruce May were at the Tuesday evening meeting presided over by Mayor Harold Freeman.

Guests at the session were Cliff Morey and David Doeringsfeld of the engineering firm of Wyatt and Jaykin and Joyce and Lloyd Cook.

Mr. Cook was present to discuss a spring on his property that he has been using. Mr. Cooks wishes to determine who has the water rights to the spring and the city will investigate this matter.

Doeringsfeld was present to talk to the council on state and federal grants the city may apply for in regard to water. Doeringsfeld has experience in applying for these types of grants and is willing to help the council. Morey was present to discuss the comprehensive water study his firm has recently done for the city, what projects might be started now and what might be planned for the future.

There will be a public meeting Tuesday, August 22, at 7:00 p. m. in the community library for the discussion of the proposed city budget for the coming year. All interested persons are invited to attend.

There was also a discussion of the problem of drivers parking on the wrong side of the streets and what action should be taken to discourage this practice.

The council also discussed a recent court ruling that landlords were not responsible for municipal water bills incurred by their renters. The city presently has an ordinance that states landlords are responsible. Now the city attorney will have to make his recommendations to the council on this matter.

The next regular meeting of the council will be Tuesday, Aug. 22.

Kendrick's Water Supply Is "Just Keeping Up"

Upon hearing that Juliaetta was forced to stop all outside watering this week, the Kendrick City Council was a little more relieved to find that despite the dry weather and increased usage, the Kendrick water wells and pumps are "just keeping up", with demand. At present time watering is permitted on a three-day a week schedule for two hours— from 6 to 8 p. m.

The Kendrick council met Tuesday evening, Aug. 8. Mayor Darrel Brocke presided with councilmen Dick Benjamin, Dave Klatt, Jerry Brown and Rita Blewett present.

The council was informed of the progress being made on street improvements being made on A and B streets intersecting School House Hill. Mayor Brocke told the council that the city is presently awaiting word from Poe Asphalt and Paving as to when that firm will be in town to resurface the streets. The curb work and drainage has been finished and coating of the streets is what remains to be done.

Brocke suggested that private property owners who might wish to have paving done while the paving company is in town, should contact the city clerk (289-5157) and leave their names.

The city is still working on the final agreement that would permit Kendrick Garage to use part of the city property near the new car-lock gas pump system it has installed. The city made some recommendations about the agreement after receiving the first draft from the attorney. This first draft is being modified now. The new pump facilities are now being operated on a temporary permit issued by the city.

The council is now in the process of working on the proposed budget for the coming year. Brocke said he hopes to have the budget ready to present to the public at a public hearing on Tuesday, Aug. 29.

Plans are being made now to close the War Memorial Swimming Pool in Kendrick after the August 27 session. Pool managers Marcell Clemenhagen and Audra Callison will be leaving to return to college Aug. 12. Brocke said arrangements have been made to have an adult supervisor present from the 12th to the 27th to assist Karen Clemenhagen, Jennifer Fey and Lianne Weyen.

Few Fires In Area This Season, Reports Warden

Despite the many fires that have destroyed thousands of acres of timber and grass in the west this season, this area has been extremely fortunate, and only two small fires have been reported this week, according to Roger Kechter, District Fire Warden from Deary.

One of the fires is a small lightning-set fire south of Deary and the other is a slash pile burn which is still smoldering from last winter.

The only fire of any consequence of 7 that have been reported so far this season was one two weeks ago on the lower Stonypoint area that burned about 70 acres of grain and timber before being controlled.

No rain and temperatures pushing into the nineties has the burning index in the "High" category, Kechter said late Tuesday afternoon and he urged all farmers, woodworkers and campers to use great care when they are outdoors.

Kechter added that some farmers are now burning grass fields which causes a lot of smoke. These are controlled burns with permission of the Fire District. Kechter said area residents are still encouraged to report smoke sightings.

Harvest Getting Good Start This Week

Harvesting of the 1989 small grain crops are off to a good start in the Kendrick-Julietta area, reported the local warehouses that are receiving the legumes and grain. The weather has been, for the most part, hot and dry, allowing the fields to ripen and the cutting to move ahead without delay.

Peas grown under contract for Brocke and Sons in Kendrick should be in by this week or next, said Geo. Brocke, Jr. Small green peas should be done Wednesday, Brocke said and the regular Alaska peas are over half done this week. Rape seed will also be pretty well done by the end of the week.

Quality of the peas this season appears to be good or slightly above average. Some of the later peas do not look as good as the early ones, Brocke said, but the crop will probably even out to average.

Lentils, Brocke said, are just getting a good start, but what they've seen look good.

The peas harvest seems to have been a little quicker than usual this year, a result, Brocke said was caused from a slightly slower ripening of the wheat and barley fields. In some years farmers will start in the peas then pull off to cut wheat and barley. This season they went right on with the peas.

Kendrick Rochdale is taking in both wheat and barley this week, reports Marybelle Larson, one of the Rochdale managers. "We're just getting going good," she said Tuesday afternoon. She estimated that maybe 10 to 20 percent of the expected deliveries had been brought in.

The grain is showing a good test weight and the yields seem to be also good, running an average of about 80 bushels. There is some smut showing up in the grain, Mrs. Larson said, which will result in a small discount.

Deliveries to the Rochdale have been coming in from American Ridge, Potlatch Ridge and Big Bear, but it was predicted that it will be well into next week before the harvest starts to peak.

Tom Jeffries, manager of the Lewiston Grain Growers facilities in this area, also said the harvest was just getting a good start this week with maybe 10 to 15 percent of the expected grain in. Most of the grain has come from the lower end of the Potlatch Ridge, but some deliveries have come into Cavendish and the Southwick warehouses.

Wheat "looks pretty good" Jeffries said, adding that traces of smut have also shown up in wheat coming into LCG. If the weather stays good, the LCG manager said, the harvest will be in full swing next week.

Tuesday night, after the above story was written, rain fell over most of the area. The rain wasn't heavy, but was enough to halt harvest operations.

The tour continued on to the Kayler Tree Farm below Peck Junction where the seed, planting and grooming of live Christmas trees is done.

The methods of processing and packaging trees for marketing was discussed by the Kaylers.

The tour next stopped at Orofino and the lovely home of Tom Farbo and wife Ruth, who hosted a happy hour and get-acquainted time. Most enjoyable to see the friendships that had spanned a period of fifty years.

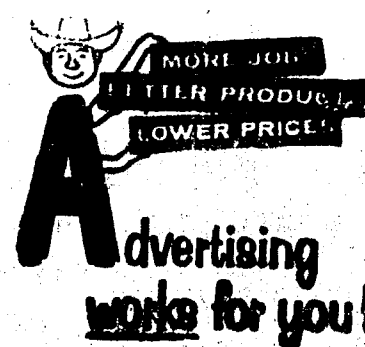
