## Lola Parsley, 83, Retired Teacher, Passes Aug. 20

Lola Mae Parsley of Lewiston, 83, a retired teacher and former resident of Juliaetta, died Sunday evening, Aug. 20 at Orchards Villa Nursing Home at Lewiston of congestive heart failure. She had been a resident there for the past five years.

Mrs. Parsley was born Dec. 3, 1905 at Flora, Oregon to Louis M. Austin and Kattie M. Cochran. She graduated from Flora High School and attended one year at Cheney Normal School, now Eastern Washington University, before beginning her teaching career at Flora.

She married David R. Parsley on Dec. 28, 1928, at Asotin and the couple farmed at Anatone. They moved to Peck, Idaho, and continued farming until 1959 when they moved to Sprague, Wash. They ran a motel there until 1970, when they moved to Juliaetta.

Her husband, David, died October 24, 1978. Mrs. Parsley was a member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Kendrick and enjoyed helping residents in the community by doing errands such as picking up mail and groceries for residents of Johnson Manor. She also enjoyed crocheting. Survivors include a daughter, Melva M. Eisenbarth of Pierce, Idaho; a sister, Wilma Murrill of Umatilla, Oregon; seven grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

A son, Hopper Parsley, died previously. The funeral was held Wednesday at Merchant Funeral Home at Clarkston with the Rev. Bob Kenyon officiating.

Burial will follow at Vineland Cemetery at Clarkston.

The family suggested memorials be given, if desired, to the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Fund.

## Memories of a Former Lewiston Business Firm

(Note: This is an excerpt from a book of reminiscences being compiled by Eugene Heath, and due to be published in the fall of 1989.)

"Echranacks" used to be a narrow hole-in-the-wall, one-family sort of electrical fixtures business in downtown Lewiston, near the Liberty Theatre. My apologies to any remaining family members who might see this, for vagueness and inaccuracies it may contain. I will blame time and a poor memory.

Through a business oddity, Mr. Echranack also handled Levi Strauss overalls which was what brought us farm kids through his door. With European frugality as he shortened the legs or made other alterations, he collected the scraps of denim and carefully packaged them as he instructed us to save them for patches later on.

I casually remember that what has never left me is that during these visits to his store, perhaps while waiting for the alterations, Mr. Echranack took the time with us non-spending, out-of-town kids to show us something entirely outside our field of experience.

He took us into the dim recesses of his backrooms and showed us some beautiful Czechoslovakian crystalware, and also some American products, and by gentle tapping, brought forth the difference with the clear, pure tones of the European products.

By the time you read this, the stuffed toy contest will have been judged on the Pomona level at the Kendrick Grange Hall. All needlework to be in competition this year was to be at the Hall by 9:00 this last Tuesday morning. There were quite a few kids making stuffed toys at the Grange Hall recently under the guidance of Ruth, Nellie, and Delores Helmgartner. ## June A. Cedars, Formerly of Leland, Passes Aug. 17

June A. Cedars of Pullman, a Leland area native, and a cook for Washington State University groups for 25 years, died of liver failure Thursday, Aug. 17, at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane. She had been ill for three weeks.

Mrs. Cedars was a cook for 18 years for Farmhouse fraternity at WSU, six years for Tau Kappa Epsilon and one year for Kappa Delta. She was born at Leland, Idaho, to Hugh and Katherine Parks Jan. 14, 1923. She attended Leland School and graduated from Juliaetta High School in 1941. She moved from the Leland area in 1960 to Pullman, where she had lived since.

On April 9, 1964, she married Eddie W. Cedars at Lewiston. He survives at their home. A previous marriage ended in divorce. During summer months, Mrs. Cedars cooked for church groups such as Tall Timber Church near Leavenworth, Wash., and Luther Haven on Coeur d'Alene Lake.

She was a member of the WSU's Cooks Club, and the cooks on campus have dedicated a cookbook in her honor for her many years of service. She also was a former member of the Lapwai Grange and enjoyed cooking, flowers and collecting crystal. She was of the Methodist faith. Survivors in addition to her husband include her mother at Pullman; a daughter, Marilyn Cuddy of Juliaetta; four sons, Arnold Zumhofs of Kendrick, Daryl Zumhofs of Kennewick, Von Zumhofs of Lewiston, and Nels Cedars of Spokane; a sister, Ferol Oliver of Yakima; two brothers, Byard Parks of Port Angeles, Wash., and Earl Parks of Salem, Oregon; 12 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held at 1 p. m. Monday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with Rev. Dale White and Dick Sanders of the Cathedral of the Desert in Richland, Wash., officiating. Organist was Tom Schumacher and the soloist was Monte Angelson who sang, "The Lord's Prayer" and "His Eye is On the Sparrow". Casket bearers were: Todd Zumhofs, Stade Zumhofs, Mitch Cuddy, Trent Zumhofs, Quentin Zumhofs and Jim Cuddy.

## Juliaetta Council Approves Budget At Tuesday Session

The Juliaetta Council, meeting in regular session Tuesday evening, Aug. 22, approved its \$204,607.00 budget for the coming fiscal year without opposition following a public hearing which preceded the regular session.

The meeting was presided over by Mayor Harold Freeman, and all members of the council—Dick Groseclose, Bruce May, Frank Groseclose, and Dirk Hammond—were present. Also present was city clerk Mary Jo Vallem. Guests at the meeting were Gerald Boyd of CableVision from Moscow, Steve Rishling, Bill and Shirley Hadley, Cynthia Nye, Rich Berenson a CEDA representative, from Lewiston and David Doeringfels of the engineering firm of Wyatt and Jaykin of Lewiston.

The budget was approved and passed without opposition and will become effective October 1.

Mr. Doeringfels was present to discuss with the council more about the grants that might be available to the city to improve its water system. Mr. Berenson was present to tell the council that CEDA would also help in securing these grants in any way it could.

The CableVision representative, Gerald Boyd, told the council that his firm is currently attempting to install an extended cable west of the city, but is having a problem obtaining right-of-way permission. It was reported that some of the property owners along the proposed route are reluctant to give CableVision permission to cross their land.

Later in the meeting, after Boyd had left, Floyd and Betty Heimgartner came to the meeting to say that the city has an easement in that direction which was obtained to run water lines out west and suggested this access be used to put the cable lines underground. The council will contact CableVision to see if this is a possibility. Delinquent water bills were also discussed at the meeting.

The next meeting of the council will be on Tuesday, Sept. 5 at 7:30 p. m. at the city hall.

## Highway Accident Claims Life of Willy Alford

Kenneth Jack "Willy" Alford, 16, died Monday afternoon, Aug. 21, of injuries he received in an accident at Orofino.

Willy was on a motorcycle when it collided with a United Parcel Service van at Riverside and Highway 7 about 2:10 Monday afternoon.

According to a dispatcher with the Idaho State Police, Alford was heading westbound on Highway 7 when an eastbound UPS van driven by Stanley A. Cramer, 36, of Lewiston, made a lefthand turn in front of the motorcycle.

Willy, who was wearing a helmet at the time of the accident, was taken to St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston where he later died.

Alford was born in Dallas, Texas, January 1, 1973, the son of James and Kathy Alford. The family later moved to Kendrick when his father accepted a position at Kendrick High School. Willy attended schools at Juliaetta and Kendrick and last year was a student at Orofino High School, where his father now teaches mathematics. Willy would have been a junior this year.

He is survived by his parents at the family home, and a sister, Kim Braater of Boston, Mass.

The body will be cremated and the ashes scattered at a private family service this week at Black Lake, where Willy spent some of his happiest hours. "We were very proud and happy to have raised Willy in Idaho," his mother said Tuesday afternoon.

Willy was a fine young man, well liked and respected by all who knew him. Jim, Kathy and Kim have the love and prayers of the entire community as they endure this tragic loss.
