On September 14, 1989, Commander Kenneth F. Heimgartner relieved Commander E. Scott Shuman as Commanding Officer of the "Black Aces" of Fighter Squadron FORTY ONE. The ceremony took place in Hangar 23 at Naval Air Station Oceana, in Virginia Beach, Virginia. Captain Curt Schantz, Jr., Commander, Fighter Wing ONE was the guest speaker.

Commander Heimgartner, a native of Juliaetta, Idaho, graduated from the University of Idaho in 1972 with a Bachelor of Architecture degree. He entered the Navy through the Aviation Officer Candidate School program in Pensacola, Florida, and received his wings in June 1973 at Naval Air Station Glynco, Georgia.

Commander Heimgartner's previous squadron tours include VF-121, VF-111, 414 Fighter Weapons Squadron, VF-101, VF-84, and VF-33 flying both the F-4 Phantom and the F-14 Tomcat. His previous tours include: Fighter Wing ONE an Commander in Chief Atlantic.

Commander Heimgartner joined the "Black Aces" in April of 1988 as the Executive Officer. ## Tigers Slosh To 26-14 Victory Over Kootenai

Eight-man football made its return to Kendrick and the Whitepine league last Friday night when the KHS Tigers sloshed their way to a 26-14 victory over the Kootenai Warriors.

Only a small crowd of the most ardent Tiger boosters were on hand to watch the opening of the 1989 season, the debut of head coach Ken Swanger, and the return of the eight-man game. The fans also were thoroughly drenched by the heavy rains that poured down in a thunder and lightning storm.

The Whitepine League voted to play eight-man football earlier this year after several of the schools in the league indicated they would have a difficult time fielding an 11-man squad because of declining enrollment.

The gridiron was wet and slippery from the rain, but the Tigers pounded out a 26-14 win behind the three touchdown efforts of sophomore Cade Konen who rushed for touchdowns of 43, 16 and 2 yards.

Kootenai kicked off to open the game and the ball was picked up by Tiger running back Jarrod Silflow on the KHS 27, and he immediately slipped and fell on the wet turf. On the next play quarterback Reece Hewett on a keeper play picked up good yardage and put the ball up to the 41. The Tigers struggled down the field until they were on the Warrior 22 yard line.

From there Hewett tried to pass, found his receivers covered, and ran the ball to the Kootenai 4. Tory Smith brought the ball down to the 2 and then on the next play, Hewett packed it over for the first score of the night. Hewett tried to run for the extra points but failed.

Kootenai took the return kickoff from Ron Wylie and moved down to Tiger 21 yard line before they were stopped on downs. Hewett passed to his tight end Shane Taylor to take the ball to the Warrior 43 and from there it was Cade Konen on a 42-yard reverse play that scored 6 points for Kendrick. Hewett ran the conversion over for another two points and the Tigers lead 14-0 with 8:20 left in the half.

A fumble on the return kick-off set up the next Kendrick score when a Warrior player let the wet football slip from his hands and an alert Tiger pounced on the ball on the Kootenai 40. A few plays later Konen scored his second TD of the evening as he went 16 yards around left end for the score. There was still 7:00 minutes left in the half following the touchdown. The conversion try failed.

Kendrick was down knocking on the Warrior goal line again in the first half, but the visitors stiffened their defense and took over on downs at their own 13 yard line. Konen intercepted a Kootenai pass and went all the way for a touchdown again, only to see the play nullified and called back because of a clipping penalty.

Cade was back in action in the third quarter, scoring Kendrick's final six points of the game on a 2 yard ramble.

Kootenai picked up two touchdowns in the rain in the final period of play as Coach Swanger began to use his substitutes.

Of interest to Kendrick fans was the fact that the Kootenai team is coached by Darren Clemenhagen, who played his high school ball for the Tigers. Darren is the son of Max Clemenhagen, who also played for the Tigers "way back when". Darren's grandfather is Ross Armittage, who coached Tiger teams for many years.

Coach Swanger and his Tigers will be at home again Friday night, Sept. 8, as KHS hosts the Troy Trojans in a game that begins at 7:00 p. m.

The City of Kendrick this week lifted the outside watering restrictions it had placed on local homeowners earlier this summer in a conservation move. Mayor D. He added that the city will continue to monitor the water supply closely and should it appear necessary, the restrictions would be reset.

Brocke also announced that city hall will be closed Sept. 14 and 15. City clerk Donna Goff will be attending a meeting of Idaho City Officials in McCall.

The next regular meeting of the Kendrick city council will be on Tuesday, Sept. 12.

It was reported that Poe Asphalt and Paving Co. will be in town next week to do re-paving work on some to the streets.

## Harvest Going Again After Heavy Rains

Farmers in this area are finally beginning to feel that there might be an end to this year's harvest as most were able to be back in the fields this week after heavy rains have hampered cutting operations.

This year's harvest started off perfectly, with good looking crops and nice weather. Then several weeks ago, actually the week of Aug. 21, a wet weather system moved into the area bringing over two inches of rain. That completely halted harvest just when it was about at its peak.

The skies finally cleared and the farmers were just getting started again when another storm moved in, bringing more rain and delays.

That was the harvest picture until this week when the fields had dried enough to allow the grain to be cut. Dareld Hazeltine said Wednesday afternoon that Lewiston Grain Growers began taking in grain again Monday. Hazeltine said, barring any more rain, most of the farmers delivering to LGG should be finished up in about 10 days, except for the real high country such as around Cavendish and further back. The warehouse at Cavendish is accepting grain at a steady, rapid pace now, Dareld said, with 131 loads delivered on Tuesday.

The local warehouses (Rochdale and Lewiston Grain Growers) said they couldn't say what damage the rain had done to the wheat and barley until the grade test results came back from the laboratory, but the warehousemen did say that some damage had been done.

Marybelle Larson, one of the managers at Kendrick Rochdale, estimate farmers delivering to that co-op should be finished with the harvest in 4 or 5 days if all goes well. "It's starting to wind down," she said Wednesday. Mrs. Larson noted that the Rochdale took its first grain in on July 20.

"We're going again," said Dean Brooke Wednesday afternoon and added that harvest was pretty well along for Brooke and Sons, with most of the farmers hoping to be done by the end of the week.

The rain definitely did affect the quality of the peas and lentils. Brooke said bleaching was noted on the crops brought in after the rain. Until the wet weather hit, the yields on the peas and lentils had been above average and the quality was good.



