## Norman "Fuzzy" Nelson Claimed by Heart Attack

Norman J. "Fuzzy" Nelson who owned "Fuzzy's Tavern" in Deary for 34 years, died Friday, Sept. 8 at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane of a heart attack. He was 71.

Relatives said that before he purchased the tavern in 1947, he was a scaler for Potlatch Industries, and had worked in the woods since he was 18, so he knew logging and its people. And even though it was called the Deary Tavern, it was named Fuzzy's in the end, since that's the name everyone gave it.

He was born May 12, 1918, at Bovill to Emil and Maggie Johnson Nelson. He grew up and went to school at Deary.

On May 3, 1941, he married Ruby Hecht at Coeur d'Alene.

He served on the Deary City Council and served as commissioner of the Deary Rural Fire Department.

He was active in numerous community organizations, and served as chairman of the Deary Days Celebration for many years. He was a member of the Deary Lions Club, the Latah Chamber of Commerce, and the Evergreen Odd Fellows Lodge of Potlatch and was named booster of the year by the Deary High school where he enjoyed taking tickets at the high school ball games.

He also enjoyed camping. Survivors include his wife at the family home at Deary; a daughter, Dellrae Warner of Deary; a sister, Elizabeth Baker of Spokane; two brothers, Albert and Elvin Nelson, both of Pierce, Idaho; and three grandchildren.

At his request the body was cremated. A memorial service was held Wednesday at Short's Funeral Chapel in Moscow with the Rev. Steve Hammond officiating.

## Tigers Rout Trojans 68-26; At Highland Saturday

Coach Ken Swanger's KHS Tiger football team spotted the visiting Troy Trojans an early 6-point lead last Friday night then went on to crush the Trojans 68-26 for their second victory in as many starts. It was the awesome offense of the Tigers that keyed the victory. Junior quarterback Reece Hewett teamed up with tight end Shane Taylor to rip the Troy defense apart as he completed 14 of 21 passes—half going for touchdowns—for 470 yards. Taylor caught five of those touchdown passes as the two connected for more than 200 yards.

Troy served notice early in the game that they were there to play football, taking the opening kickoff and on the third play from scrimmage scoring on a 71 yard pass play from TBS quarterback Jim Stratton to end Michael Polichio. It took Troy just 1:20 minutes to get on the score board.

Apparently stung by the swift Troy attack, Kendrick struck back with Jarrod Silflow taking the kick off return from the 15' up to the Tiger 45. Kendrick picked up one first down on the ground. Then Hewett passed to Cade Konen who scored on the 44 yard play. Troy Smith's conversion run was good for another two points and the Tigers had an 8-6 lead and were never again in trouble. Konen went 80 yards on a punt return for the next touchdown to make the score 14-6 then Smith ran over the extra point and it was 16-6 with six minutes still on the clock in the first quarter.

Troy had its own potent passing attack as Stratton flipped out to Mike Davis who almost went all the way before being hauled down on the Tiger 26. Shane Taylor intercepted a Trojan pass on the nine yard line to stop the Troy drive but the Tigers couldn't move the ball and lost it on down, picking up only 2 yards. Kendrick again held the Trojans, got the ball back and moved up the field largely on the running work of Silflow and Hewett and with 22 seconds left in the quarter, Hewett hit Konen again on a play covering 62 yards. The extra point try failed when the Tigers were given a false start penalty.

Kendrick led 22-6 at the end of the first quarter.

Troy was still full of fight as Polichio took the return kickoff back to the Kendrick 38 to open the second quarter. A poor snap from center put the Trojans back to the Tigers 46 then Stratton passed to Joel Kerley who was down to the Tiger seven before he was stopped. Kendrick put up a fine goal line stand and held on Trojans to downs, taking over on the Tigers on their own 36, then KHS team some breathing room on the first play when he picked up 6 yards. Hewett's pass to Taylor put the Tigers own their own 36, then Hewett ran the ball to the Troy 40. Hewett then went to sophomore wide receiver Ryan Blewett who took the ball on the Troy 40 and raced down the side line to score. It was 28-6 after the extra point try failed.

Troy answered that touchdown on the return kick off as Mike Davis picked up the kick and returned it 80 yards for a score and it was 28-12.

Another Hewett to Konen pass clicked and the extra point try was a success. Kendrick led 36-12.

Kendrick put two more touchdowns on the board in the third period. The first on a 15-yard Hewett to Taylor pass with Ron Wylie carrying on the conversion to make it 42-12. Ron Wiley scored again for Tigers in the third quarter this time from 3 yards out.

The Trojans got back on the board in the 4th quarter with Kerley going the final 3 yards for the touchdown, and running the conversion to make it 50-20.

Hewett and Taylor were ripping the Trojans apart and it was that combination that scored again in a play covering 25 yards that made the score 56-20.

Troy wasn't done yet and Stratton passed to Polichio for 16 yards and the score was 56-26 after the conversion failed.

Kendrick's Hewett-to-Taylor pass worked twice more as Kendrick ended up a 68-26 winner.

Eugene Calvin Leister of Lewiston, a retired farmer and rancher, died Saturday evening, Sept. 9, at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center of causes related to age. He was 83.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by a sister, Frances Berndt of W. Iwau'ee, Wisconsin.

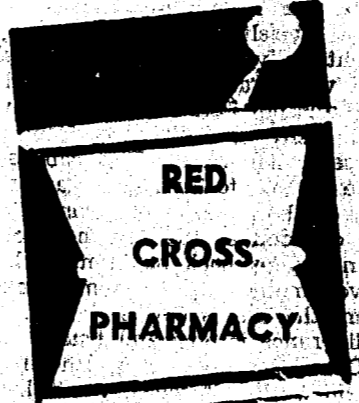

#### Change

Our generation is witnessing some of the most astounding events in history.
