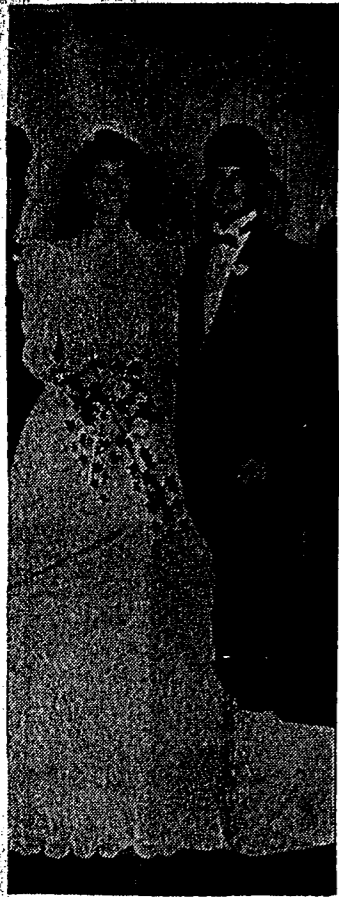

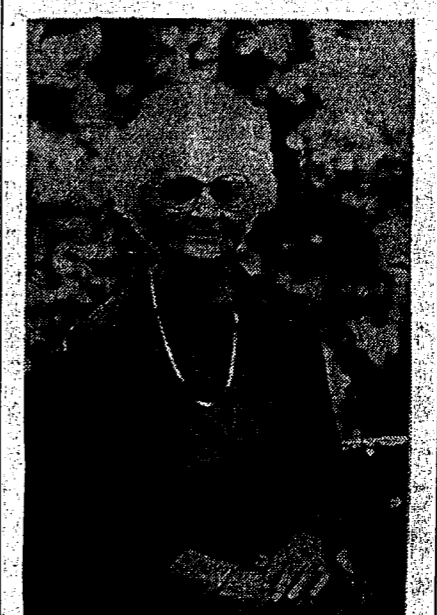

RESOLUTION NO. 626
A RESOLUTION PROCLAIMING A GENERAL CITY ELECTION, TO BE HELD ON NOV. 7, 1989, DESIGNATING THE POLLING PLACE, DESIGNATING THE REGISTRAR, AND ORDERING THE CITY CLERK TO GIVE NOTICE OF SUCH ELECTION.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, IDAHO, THAT:
SECTION 1. The general city election will be held in and for the city of Kendrick, on the 7th day of November, at which time there will be elected a mayor and two council persons to serve for a term of four years and one council person to serve for a term of two years, or until the election and qualification of their successors.

SECTION 2. The following is designated as the polling place for the city election. Fire Hall form 12 o'clock noon until 8:00 p. m.

SECTION 3. That Donna Goff, City Clerk, is hereby designated as Registrar and Betty Watts as Deputy Registrar. Registration will be at City Hall on regular business days from 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. to November 3rd. On November 3rd the electors may register at City Hall until 8:00 p. m.

Electors must be at least 18 years of age, a citizen of the United States, and a bona fide resident of this city at least thirty (30) days next preceding the election. An elector must have registered for this election

or must have voted in the city general election within the past four years.

SECTION 4. The Clerk, for and on behalf of the Mayor and Council, shall give public notice of the time and place of holding such general election by posting such notice in three public places or publishing such notice in at least two issues of the Kendrick Gazette, a newspaper printed and published in the city of Kendrick, Idaho, the first publication of such notice to be made not less than 45 days previous to the date of such city election and the last publication not less than 15 days prior to the election; the notice so published shall state the places of registration and the name of the Registrar and the Deputy Registrars, and the requirements for registration of electors at such city and such other information as may be necessary to give full facts of such election and registration; said notice to contain such information in accordance with the requirements of Section 50-438 of the Idaho Code.
