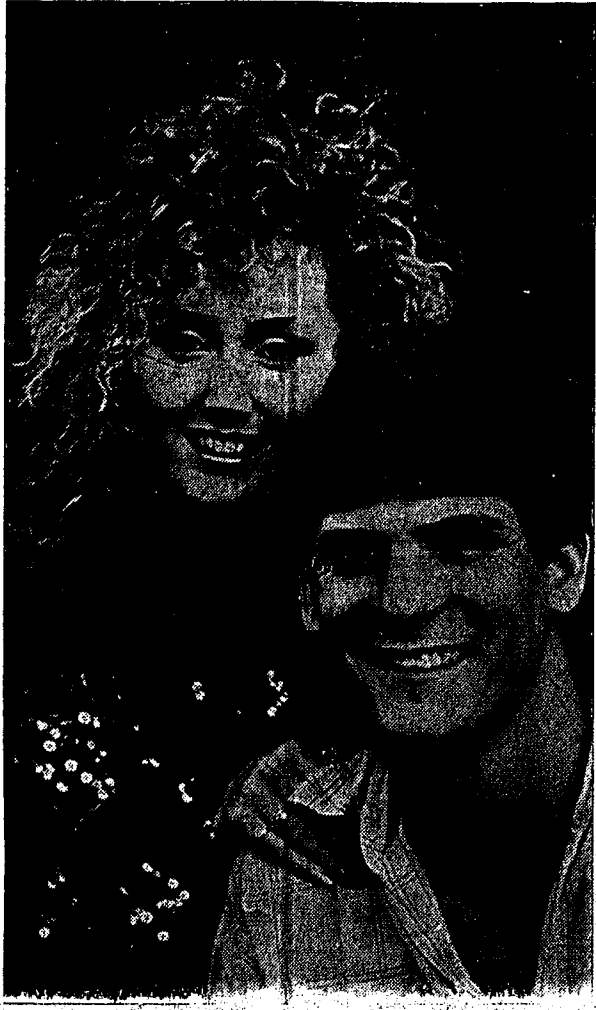

Bear Tours Kendrick

The streets of Kendrick are normally quiet and deserted when Mike Morgan goes on his rounds in the early morning delivering his copies of the Lewiston Tribune, but that wasn't the case last Friday when Mike looked back over his shoulder and saw a black bear was also on the street.

According to Mike's mother, Shirley Morgan, Mike had picked up his papers at the Kendrick Garage and started up the street. He was about at the Antelope Inn when he heard a noise, and on looking back saw what he thought at first was a large (very large) dog coming down the steps between the Roger Roy and Don Brocke homes. Then Mike realized that it wasn't a dog, but a bear and as he watched the animal crossed the street and disappeared between the Kendrick Garage and the Kendrick Garage. Understandably Mike didn't pursue the bear, but he did tell his mother when he came back home. Shirley immediately called Don Bateman, the city maintenance man, who said he'd go down and check this matter out. Don did and he spotted the animal on the back street down by the river. Don reported that it was a good-sized bear—maybe 225 to 250 pounds and watched until the creature disappeared back of the Lewiston Grain Grower warehouse. Don, whose job does not include bear capturing, figures the animal crossed the river and went into the timber on the other side.

Surrounded by hills and trees, it is not unusual for deer to wander into town at night or early in the morning, but this is the first time a bear has been reported although some Kendrick residents are pretty growly and bear-like as they make their way to the restaurant for early morning coffee.

Ben Nye a Semifinalist In 1990 Merit Scholarship Competition

Ben Nye, son of Lloyd and Cynthia Nye of Juliaetta, and a senior at Kendrick High School, is among the more than 15,000 semifinalists in the 1990 Merit Scholarship Competition. It was announced this week by National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). The nationwide pool of academically talented semifinalists includes about half of one percent of each state's seniors. These young people demonstrate exceptional potential for scholarly contributions and leadership that will benefit the nation in the future.

More than one million students in 19,000 U. S. high schools entered the 1990 Merit Program as juniors by taking the 1988 PSAT/NMSQT, which served as an initial screen of entrants. Those designated semifinalists in each state are the top scorers who must advance to the finalist level of the competition in order to be considered for Merit Scholarships.

Bulldogs Chew Tigers 22-14; Deary Here Friday

Kendrick's Tigers, crippled by the absence of starting quarterback Reece Hewett and running back Tory Smith, were defeated by the visiting Genesee Bulldogs 22-14 last Friday night. Hewett suffered an arm injury in practice the previous night and Smith was out with a leg problem.

Coach Ken Swanger had to use Cade Konen, sophomore wide receiver in the quarterback slot and the Tigers took a 14-0 first quarter lead on the strength of some good running by Konen and Shane Taylor, but the Bulldogs turned loose Brad Grieser, a fine running back and rambled for 210 yards that night and was trouble for KHS all evening.

Despite his inexperience as a quarterback Konen directed the Tigers well and with less than three minutes into the game, Cade dropped back to pass, found his men covered and then kept the ball and went up the middle 48 yards for the touchdown run. Ron Wylie ran over the extra points to give the Tigers an 8-0 lead.

Kendrick scored again a few minutes later with Shane Taylor breaking two tackles in the Bulldog secondary to go 38 yards for another score. Kendrick didn't make it try for the extra points and led 14-0 at the end of the first period.

Genesee went on to score touchdowns in each of the next three quarters to take a 22-14 lead.

A Konen to Taylor pass in the final 20 seconds of the game would have given the Tigers a chance to tie the game, but the touchdown was called back because of a holding penalty.

City Elections In Juliaetta, Kendrick Set for Nov. 7

Municipal elections will be held in Kendrick and Juliaetta Tuesday, November 7, residents of the two towns were reminded this week. Voters in both towns will be choosing almost new councils this year because of resignations during the past two years since the last city elections. Kendrick will be voting on a new mayor and three council seats. The terms of mayor Darrel Brocke has expired and those terms of councilmen Richard Benjamin, David Klatt, and Rita Blewett.

The seats held by Brocke, Benjamin and Klatt will be for four year terms, and that held by Blewett will be for two years, as Mrs. Blewett was appointed to fill the position held by Dana Magnuson, who resigned from the council in January when he was sworn in as a County Commissioner.

Brocke said Tuesday night that he has no plans to seek another term. Benjamin has also indicated that he will not be a candidate. Blewett said last Friday that she is still considering whether to seek the two year term. Klatt said Tuesday evening that he will seek re-election. "There's some positive, interesting things" going on in the town now," Dave said, "and I'd like to see them continue."

Member Jerry Brown is the only council member whose term will not expire. Juliaetta voters will be asked to elect three councilmen at the November 7 polling. The terms of Dirk Hammond and Frank Groselose have expired. Both of these open positions are for four years. Also expiring will be the term of Bruce May, whose was elected for a two year term. May has indicated that he will not seek re-election.

Hold overs are Mayor Harold S. Freeman and councilman Richard Groselose.

For Your Information—

Anyone wishing to vote in the city elections on Nov. 7 must be registered. If you voted in the last city election you are automatically registered in the town in which you voted. If you did not, or have moved, since then, you must register.

Registration in Kendrick may be made at the City Hall with clerk Donna Goff between the hours of 8:30 and 12:30. Those who might have problems getting to city hall during regular hours, may contact Mrs. Goff to make other arrangements, she said Tuesday.

Registration in Juliaetta can be done during normal business hours at the city hall.

The filing of petitions for nominations will be accepted (both towns) beginning Sept. 28. Petitions must be returned by 5:00 p. m. on Tuesday, October 10. Forms are available at each city hall and nominating petitions require the signatures of five qualified electors.

Those who wish to vote absentee ballot must also be registered prior to voting. The city clerks will be able to assist in this matter.

Polls will be open on election day, Nov. 7, from 12 noon to 8 p. m. Juliaetta and Kendrick voters will vote at the respective city halls.

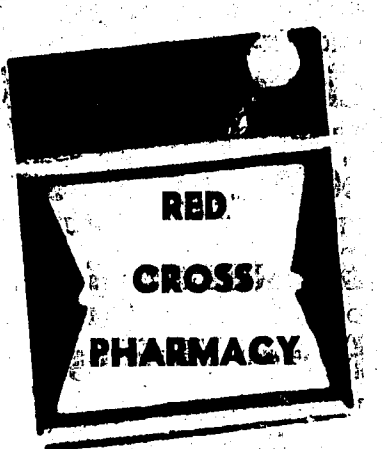
