Dr. Russell B. Banks, Kendrick Physician, Dies October 13

The community was deeply saddened at the passing of one of its physicians and to many, a good friend, Dr. Russell Banks. Dr. Banks died last week and will be missed by all whose lives he touched in very special ways.

Dr. Banks was involved in the planning of the Kendrick Family Practice Clinic and had been dedicated to its service for the past six years. During his time spent at the clinic he developed many close friendships with people in the Kendrick and Juliaetta area. He found he had many things in common with those who were fortunate enough to share his interests. He loved his horses, camping, fishing and boating at Dworshak, gem cutting and "shooting the breeze." His son Robert often joined him in his adventures and was a frequent summer visitor to Kendrick—a gesture that showed he cared enough to share our families with his—as one person said, "He was one of us."

Dr. Banks was born Oct. 27, 1945 at Pocatello to Gayle and Ellen Joyce Coleman Banks. He lived in the Pullman area during his younger years and graduated from Pleasant Hill High School in California. He spent time in the U. S. Air Force, graduated from Loma Linda Medical University in May of 1978. His practice as a family physician was spent in Orlando, Florida, Rigby, Lewiston, and Kendrick, Idaho.

He is survived by his son Robert Banks of Orlando, Florida; his wife Leslie in Lewiston, father Gayle Banks of Lewiston, and his mother, Ellen Coleman of California.

Services were held Monday at the First Methodist Church in Lewiston.

Russ Banks will be remembered as a man of great compassion and boyish good humor. To him we remind, "A friend loveth at all times." Proverbs 17:17. May he rest in peace.

Elsie Chamberlain, Bear Ridge Native, Passes October 11

Lifetime Kendrick-area resident Elsie L. Chamberlain died of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease) Wednesday afternoon, October 11, at the Moscow Care Center. She was 82.

Though she worked most of her life as a homemaker, she was known for her work in preserving historic elements of the Big Bear Ridge community. Chamberlain was involved in seeing that the Wild Rose Cemetery was maintained and improved. Her grandparents were among the first settlers buried there, and she felt a close connection with the cemetery, according to her sister, Betty Kechter of Kendrick.

Chamberlain was particularly instrumental in petitioning to get the Big Bear Ridge Grade paved. Along with her husband, Cecil Chamberlain, she also worked at improving Bear Ridge Community Hall, a fixture of the Big Bear Ridge community life.

She was born April 11, 1907, on Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick to Oscar and Emma (Alber) Morey. She attended Taney Country School there and graduated from Kendrick High School in 1925. On July 14, 1926, she married Cecil in Moscow.

They made their home in Kendrick where she worked at a dry Goods store. In 1929 the couple moved to Big Bear Ridge and farmed there all their lives. She was active in the farm operations, driving truck during harvest season.

She was a charter member of the Happy Home Club, which is still active today.

Survivors include her husband at the family home; a son, Jerry of Roseburg, Oregon; three sisters, Betty Kechter of Kendrick, Clara Galloway of Juliaetta, and Ida Perryman of Kendrick; and three grandchildren. Two brothers and two sisters died previously.

Funeral services were held Saturday at 1 p. m. at Short's Funeral Chapel in Moscow with Reverend Ray McKellom officiating. Burial was in Wild Rose Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials, if desired, to the J-K Ambulance Fund or Hospice of the Palouse.

Please Don't Put Leaves, Grass Clipping, etc., Out At Burning Site

The city of Kendrick this week asked local residents to please NOT put leaves, grass clippings and other lawn rakings out on the burning area near the high school on the Bear Creek road. This spot was created for larger debris such as boards, larger limbs, etc. What happens is that the leaves and clipping pile up and smolder. Then that causes smoke and also causes the unburned material to blow onto the ball field, causing more work for the school maintenance people.

If you live in town, residents are supposed to gather up the refuse and put it in leaves or garbage bags and let Latah Sanitation collect it each week. You're paying for that service, so why not use it, is the city's position.

Latah Sanitation will pick it up if it's properly contained.

Also, Don Bateman, the city maintenance man, said if people will rake their leaves and grass clippings into the gutter in front of their homes, he will pick it up with city equipment.

Kendrick TV Cable Sold to CableVision Company of Moscow

George F. Brocke and Sons, Inc. announced this week they had sold its Kendrick TV Cable System to CableVision of Moscow, effective as of Thursday, Oct. 12. CableVision assumed responsibility for the local system on that date.

"We currently serve Moscow, Pullman, Potlatch, Palouse, Albion, Colton, Uniontown, Genesee and Juliaetta," said manager Jim Ulberoff Tuesday afternoon, "and we're excited to have the opportunity to serve the people of the Kendrick area."

Kendrick subscribers will see no change in the system for several months, CableVision said. The company will have to rebuild the entire system before it can be put on the owner's lines. Work on the new lines is expected to begin soon.

When the new transmission lines are completed Kendrick will receive all the programming that is offered by the company, which at the present time consists of 30 basic channels and four premium channels. Kendrick, at this time receives 11 basic channels and one premium channel.

CableVision said there will be no rate changes in local service until the new lines are installed and operating.

CableVision offices are located in Moscow at 205 5th St. on the corner of 5th and Washington. Office hours are 8 to 6 Monday to Friday and from 9 to 5 on Saturday. The phone number is 882-2832.

The cable company said it will soon be sending letters to all present subscribers informing them of its plans for the Kendrick area.

Brocke and Sons brought television to Kendrick in 1954 and has served the community since that time. There are approximately 160 subscribers to the present system.

The Kendrick system lost its technician and repair man several months ago when Chas Lyons closed his Lyons Electronic firm to pursue his education in another field. Since that time Brocke's have had to use contract labor from Troy to service the system.

In announcing the sale of the system, George Brocke, Jr. on behalf of Brocke and Sons said this firm wished to thank the community for its patronage and support over the past 35 years and wished CableVision all the best in the future.
