Kendrick Grange will soon be involved in an assessment and priority-setting program concerning our own local roads and bridges in Latah and Nez Perce counties.

Indian Dancers Entertained at Juliaetta School

Last Wednesday, Oct. 18, the students of Juliaetta Elementary were honored by a presentation of traditional Nez Perce dances which included demonstration of the "Fancy Dances" and the "Grass Dances." The demonstration presented by the Four Nation Pow Pow Committee included the group's president, John Meninick, his wife and vice president of the group, Lynne Meninick, and their secretary - treasurer, Jessica Redheart. Other members performing in the dances included: Raye Bones Arelee, and Lapwai Elementary students Joellen Nomee, Jessica Nomee, Daniel Mcntoya, and D. J. Meninick. John and Lynne Meninick's three-year-old son, J. J., also performed. Dancing Eagle Drummers were represented by Jake and Lee Whiteplume.

The audience was especially impressed by the Nez Perce's beautiful beadwork and their brilliantly colored costumes, decorated with shells, beads, quills, and feathers. Raye Bones captivated the children with her explanation of some of the tribal tradition; she explained that "the heart of our people is the drum. We move to the beat of our heart." It was also a special privilege to have John Meninick perform a solo dance; John travels with the American Indian Dance studio, and last year, performed in Paris and the Mediterranean with the group. Shirley Pinkham, an elder of the tribe, was also present for the dance performance.

A highlight for the children (and adults) of Juliaetta Elementary was the invitation to participate with the Nez Perce in a Friendship Round Dance to the beat of Dancing Eagle's Drum.

The group has extended an open invitation to our community to attend the 9th Annual Four Nation Pow Pow to be held at the PI-NEE-WAUS Center in Lapwai, October 27, 28, and 29th. The Pow Pow, which involves tribes from all over the U. S. and Canada will begin Thursday evening at 6:00 p. m. with a spaghetti feed and Social Round Dance and games. The next session begins at 7:00 p. m. on Friday evening. The Saturday sessions are from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. and 7:00 to midnight. The final session begins Sunday at 1:00. There will be drumming, singing and dance competitions. Also on display and for sale will be a variety of Native American beadwork, basketry, pottery and traditional foods.

Kendrick FFA Teams Attended Ag Days at U. of I.

Nine members of the Kendrick FFA Chapter participated in the Livestock and Dairy Cattle Judging contests at Ag Days held at the University of Idaho on Saturday, Oct. 21.

Team number one placed third in the District FFA Judging contest while members of team number two didn't do so well. However, there were outstanding judges on both teams.

John Wegner won the top high individual judge overall with a score of 259 out of 300 points possible. Tricia Jeffries won third high individual judge overall with a score of 225 out of 300 points and also won second high among FFA team number one judges.

She was a member of the Deary Community Church. She enjoyed gardening, fishing, and sewing and was a member of the Deary Garden Club.

In addition to her husband, survivors include three sons, Tim and Mikel Jones of Deary, and Ted Jones of Louisville, Ky.; daughter, Suzanne Mock of Pomeroy; five brothers, Archie Candler of Texas, Frank Candler of Deary, Charlie Candler of Lewiston, Jim Candler of Kendrick and Gilbert Candler in western Washington; two sisters, May Westendahl of Kendrick and Ada Westendahl of Juliaetta; and seven grandchildren. Two brothers, Bud and Jerry died earlier.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2 p. m. at Short's Funeral Chapel, Moscow, with Rev. John McDaniel of the Deary Community Church officiating. Burial followed at Pine Crest Cemetery, Deary.

CITY OF JULIAETTA, STATE OF IDAHO RESOLUTION CITIZEN PARTICIPATION PLAN A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, ESTABLISHING A CITIZEN PARTICIPATION PLAN, SETTING FORTH GUIDELINES FOR CITIZEN NOTIFICATION AND INVOLVEMENT IN WATER IMPROVEMENT PROJECT DEVELOPMENT.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, as follows:

SECTION 1. All notices of public hearings and City Council meetings shall include a section encouraging the participation of all citizens, giving emphasis to participation by persons of low and moderate income.

SECTION 2. The City shall provide citizens with reasonable and timely access to City Council meetings, information and records relating to the proposed use of grant funds.

SECTION 3. The City shall provide technical assistance to groups representative of low and moderate income that request such assistance in developing proposals of said improvements.

SECTION 4. The City shall provide public hearings to obtain citizen views and shall respond to proposals and questions at all stages of the water improvement project, including the development of needs, the

review of proposed improvement and review of improvement progress; with hearings to be held after adequate notice, at times and locations convenient to potential or actual beneficiaries, and with accommodation for the handicapped.

SECTION 5. The City shall provide for a timely written answer to written complaints and grievances, within 15 working days where practicable.

SECTION 6. Section (f), page 22 of the IDAPA 48.2.1 requires identification of the needs of non-English speaking residents, wherein the City of Juliaetta has none and is not therefore required to provide such requirement.

SECTION 7. The City shall hold at least one public hearing to permit public examination and appraisal of the grant pre-application and the full application to enhance public accountability.

SECTION 8. Public hearings shall be scheduled in ways and at times to provide full participation of citizens, giving at least seven (7) days prior notification by mailing of said public hearings. The notice shall include:

(a) The primary purpose of this report is to provide for the proper planning, construction and operation of the system components needed to provide sufficient water to meet domestic, fire, and emergency demands during a twenty-five (25) year planning period ending in the year 2014.

(b) The amount of the funds being requested are \$1,172,400.00.

(c) The time and place of public hearing will be Thursday, Oct. 26, 1989 at 7:30 at the Community Library in Juliaetta, Idaho.

(d) Notification that both written and verbal comments will be accepted.

SECTION 9. This Resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.
