City Elections Set for Tuesday, November 7

Kendrick and Juliaetta residents will go to the polls next Tuesday, November 7 to elect city officials for coming terms of office. Kendrick voters will cast their ballots at the Fire Hall. Juliaetta voters will vote at City Hall. The polling places in each town will be open from 12 noon to 8 p. m.

Three Council Seats In Juliaetta
There are three positions open and to be voted on in Juliaetta next Tuesday. The four year terms of Dirk Hammond and Frank Groseclose expire December 31. Neither Hammond nor Groseclose filed for re-election. Also expiring in Dec. is the two-year council seat now held by Bruce May, who also declined to seek another term.

Filing for the two four-year terms on the Juliaetta council have been George B. Bacon, Jr., an employee of the local Fire District, and Bruce Spang, a supervisor at Gem State Lumber Co. Spang is a former mayor of Juliaetta.

No one filed for the two-year position now held by May, so that position will have to be filled by write-in votes.

Hold over members of the Juliaetta council are Mayor Harold S. Freeman and Richard Groseclose.

Registration books will be open at Juliaetta City Hall until noon on Friday, Nov. 3, said city clerk Mary Jo Vallem. Registration may also be made at Juliaetta Market.

Kendrick to Choose Mayor
Kendrick voters will also have to resort to the write-in method to choose one of the three council seats to be filled at the Tuesday balloting. In Kendrick the terms of Mayor Darrel Brocke and councilmen Rita Blewett, Dave Klatt and Richard Benjamin are expiring. Klatt and Blewett have both filed for re-election, but Brocke and Benjamin will not seek another term.

Jerry Brown, manager of Potlatch Telephone Co. and currently a councilman, has filed for the office of mayor. He is opposed on the ballot. Also unopposed is Mrs. Blewett in her bid for another two year term. For the two council positions for terms of four years each, only the name of incumbent Dave Klatt appears on the official ballot. The other four-year council seat will have to be filled by a write-in candidate.

Be Sure You're Registered
Kendrick City Clerk Donna Goff Tuesday expressed concern about the obvious number of unregistered voters in the city. If you did not vote in the 1987 CITY election, you must register before 8:00 p. m. Friday, Nov. 3, before you are eligible to vote in the Tuesday election. Voting in the 1988 presidential election does not count. Mrs. Goff will be at the city hall in Kendrick from 8:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. Friday, Nov. 3 to register voters.

Donna also said the city will deliver absentee ballot to those who are unable to get to the polls. These absentee ballots will be available on Monday, Nov. 6 and must be returned by 5:00 p. m. Tuesday, Nov. 7. The city will also have transportation available for anyone needing a ride to the polls on Tuesday. Call city hall (289-5157) if you need this service.

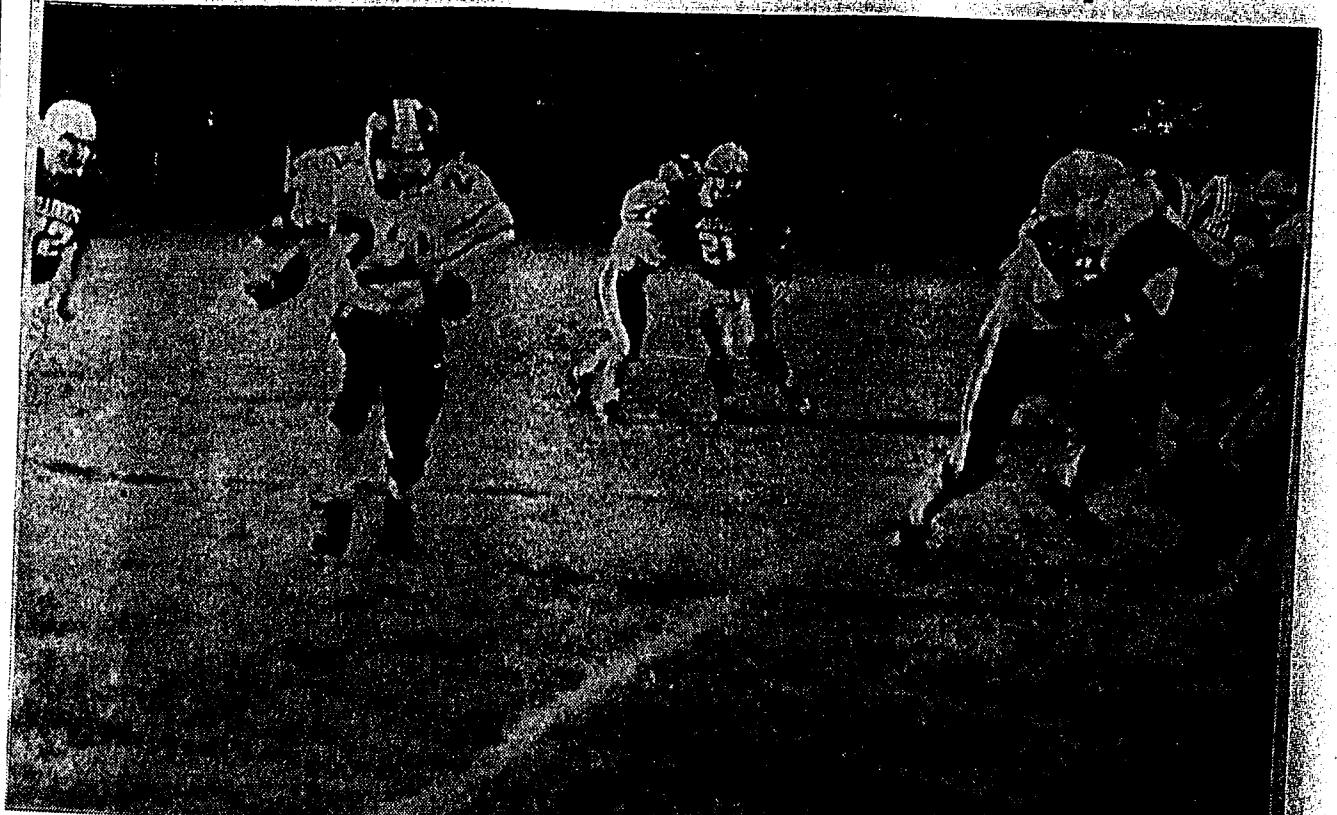

Tigers Claw Bulldogs 36-20 to Win State Play-off Spot



Genesee defeated Kendrick's Tiger football team 22-14 on Sept. 22 when the two squads met in a non-league game, but Kendrick got its revenge last Friday night at Genesee by rolling over GHS 36-20. The win also gave the Tigers a place in the Idaho state Class A-4 playoffs.

Kendrick will meet Plummer this Saturday in the third game of a triple-header at the Kibbie Dome in Moscow in the semi-finals. Highland plays Mullian 1st game, Grangeville faces Valliview in the second match, then the Tigers meet Plummer in the third game—probably starting around 4 or 5 p. m.

First round winners will meet the following Saturday, Nov. 11, at the Kibbie Dome to determine who goes on to State.

Reece Hewett was injured the first time the Tigers met the Bulldogs, but he was back in action last Friday night at Genesee and completed 16 of 29 passes for 343 yards and three touchdowns and ran over one touchdown himself.

Cade Konen, Kendrick's wide receiver, caught seven passes for 164 yards that night and scored two touchdowns. Ryan Blewett was on the receiving end of three Hewett passes including a 48-yard pass play good for a first quarter touchdown.

Kendrick scored twice on the Bulldogs in the first quarter before Genesee could score. Cade Konen took a pass from Hewett for 18 yards and the first 6 points then Hewett passed to Shane Taylor for the extra point. Hewett then went to Ryan Blewett

for a 48 yard play for the next touchdown.

In the second quarter Hewett scored on a one-yard quarterback sneak and Ron Wylie ran over the conversion. Then Wylie himself scored on a one-yard run but the conversion attempt failed.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but in the final period, the Hewett to Konen combination worked again for the Tigers from the four-yard line.

THE PARSON'S CORNER

Real Freedom

We live in a time when freedom and liberty are defined as "answering to no one but ourselves." The media pumps it to us with such slogans as "I've just got to be me." Some of the results have been AIDS running rampant through homosexuality billed as an alternative life style, and over 1.5 million babies murdered each year through abortion on demand.

Our freedom and liberty comes only as we submit to God by His Word, and to those in authority. God states in His Word, "Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers." (Romans 13:1). Jesus also said that He came to give life, and life abundantly (John 10:10). If we submit to only ourselves we become like a river with no banks, running amuck causing distress and gaining no real power and direction for ourselves.

The President of the United States gains his greatest authority and freedom by submitting to the constitution, balance of powers, and the agenda of the people who elected him. If he steps out of being under authority, he then loses freedom and liberty. The Watergate scandal and resignation of President Nixon gives us a clear example of what happens when we submit only to ourselves.

In Luke 4:32 we are told that Jesus' word was with power (authority). Jesus had this power because He submitted to God's Word and to local authority. Mark, chapter 1, records Jesus entering a synagogue and teaching. To teach in the synagogue Jesus had to submit to the rulers.

Our own freedom and liberty will be at its highest when we submit to God's Word and those in authority. Those in authority may be bosses, the government, and church leaders.

Is there power, freedom, and authority lacking in your life? What are you submitted to, is it yourself or the Word of God and the Lordship of Jesus Christ? God's abundant life is available for the taking when we submit to the Word of God and to those in authority.

Idaho Century Farm Program Forms Available

The Idaho Department of Agriculture is sponsoring an Idaho Century Farm Program which will award a commemorative sign designating the property an Idaho Century Farm and a certificate signed by the Governor and Director of Agriculture of qualifying families. These families must have retained a minimum of forty acres for at least one hundred years. The family must have occupied the property and begun farming by 1890, and the present owner must live on the farm or actively manage the farm. The line of ownership may be through children, brothers, sisters, nephews, and/or nieces, including through marriage or adoption. Only one person, the current owner of record, may apply for the Century Farm designation, and co-ownerships are eligible for a single, joint award. Only one sign will be given to each century farm.

Applications are available from the McConnell Mansion, 110 South Adams, Moscow; the Idaho Cooperative Extension Service in the Latah County Courthouse and any office of the Idaho Department of Agriculture, Food Producers of Idaho, and local granges. The applications must be notarized and received by the Idaho Department of Agriculture, 2280 Old Penitentiary Rd, Boise, Idaho 83712, by April 1, 1990.

The Century Farm Program is designed to honor those farm and ranch families who pioneered Idaho agriculture, and it is one of several ways the agriculture industry is celebrating the Centennial. The Program is a cooperative effort of the Idaho Department of Agriculture, the Idaho Food Producers, the Idaho State Grange, the Idaho Centennial Commission, and the Cooperative Extension Service. Information will be shared with the Idaho Historical Society.
