Latah County Farm Bureau Donates \$200 To J-K Ambulance Fund

The Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Service is \$200 richer this week thanks to the generosity of the Latah County Farm Bureau. Tim Eichner, president of the county organization made the donation last week as that group shared part of the profits from the sale of a reproduction of a painting by an Iowa artist.

A year ago, 70 farmers from Iowa were in North Idaho to cut, bale and ship hay from local fields back to that drought-stricken state to feed cattle. Many of the mid-west farmers took pictures of the haying operation. When they returned home the pictures were used by an Iowa artist, Virginia Bell to create a painting that depicted the Idaho-Iowa Hay project. The painting showed many of the events that occurred during the work—both here and in Iowa.

A limited number of prints were made and sold. The proceeds from the sale of these prints were sent to Idaho to be used to benefit all the communities who were involved in the Hay Project.

Jim Hoogland, treasurer of the Ambulance Service, said the gift from the Farm Bureau was sincerely appreciated and he thanked the Bureau on behalf of the Ambulance Service.

Mike Boe Write-In Winner In Kendrick Election Tuesday

Mike Boe was elected to the Kendrick city council Tuesday as he received 15 write-in votes to replace incumbent councilman Richard Benjamin who declined to seek re-election for another four-year term. Boe barely edged out John Wilson, a retired logger, who drew 12 votes. Jerry Brown, who was running unopposed for the office of mayor, was elected with sixty-eight votes. Also winning another term were David Klatt (four years), and Rita Blewett (two years).

Brown, the manager of Potlatch Telephone Co., is a member of the council and was a hold-over councilman. One of his first duties when he takes office in January will be to name a replacement for himself on the council. Brown will be filling the position now held by out-going mayor Darrel Brocke, who would not seek another term.

City clerk Donna Goff said Tuesday night that Kendrick had 109 voters registered to cast ballots in the Tuesday election—only 69 ballots were cast. This is still an improvement over the 54 votes cast in the 1987 election.

In her place, Lawrence and their three children—Jcanna Johnson, Janice Groseclose, and Ray Heimgartner—accepted her award from the State Lecturer at the conclusion of the annual talent show Friday night, culminating a process that had begun several weeks before with a search for Kendrick's Granger of the Year.
