## Lisa Gravelle Was Among Finalists at State Young Woman of the Year Program

Kendrick-Juliaetta Young Woman of the Year

Lisa Gravelle, the daughter of Paul and Carolyn Gravelle of Juliaetta, recently returned from one week of participating in Idaho's Outstanding Young Woman of the Year Program, formerly known as the Junior Miss Scholarship Program.

During her stay in Moscow, she competed among 40 other talented Idaho girls for the state title. This was the first year since the Idaho program began in 1959 that all the participants scored points during the competition either in scholastic achievement, interview skills, creative and performing arts, presence and composure, or physical fitness. "It was an exceptionally remarkable group of young women," according to State Chairman Ardell Kerr.

Lisa, a 4.0 senior at Kendrick High School, performed a self-composed flute duet where she taped one part to accompany the live harmony she played on stage. In the personal

glimpse of her presence and composure, she shared with the audience what music meant to her.

On Friday Lisa won the preliminary for fitness and then on Saturday evening she placed among the top ten finalists.

With these honors come scholarship money. However, the amounts of each will be announced in January 1990 after the annual meeting of the program's State Board. Finishing as a finalist also makes her eligible for additional scholarships.

Those who attended the 3-day performance know how Lisa won the hearts of all the people. She was a definite crowd-pleaser with her liveliness, personality, and never-ending smile.

Kendrick and Juliaetta can only feel "pride and joy" with having such an outstanding young woman like Lisa representing our community.

Thane looked wonderful, is doing great, and is very much looking forward to coming home for Christmas.

The Searcys also traveled among the New England States, seeing the fall "colors", visited the prosperous Quaker-Dutch and Amish settlements in Pennsylvania, and contracted a Washington, D. C. tour, where they saw the changing of the guards and J. F. K. Memorial at Arlington, the White House and capitol monuments.

A somber and fitting reminder of problems of other times, they found Valley Forge and Gettysburg well preserved. Williamsburg was much too commercial, but an approximate to being well-restored. ## Kendrick Grange Counts Community's Blessings, Looks to Future

Looking forward to the next five years, Kendrick Grangers last week gave the highest priority in community improvement to the enforcement of speed limits in Kendrick and Juliaetta. The next most desirable change they envisioned was overnight accommodations for the two towns. A laundromat was third on the Grange wish list.

At its November 7 meeting the Grange was busy making its contribution to the Gem Community Project by participating in a community goal setting exercise. Among the many things identified as making Kendrick-Juliaetta a nice place to live were the friendly people, the moderate climate, the central location, and the recreation opportunities. Grangers also expressed their appreciation for advantages such as the EMT/ambulance service, the library and schools, the active organizations, and the presence of a variety of quality businesses, including the bank and the pharmacy. And the Gazette!

Among the things that were considered not so good were the excessive speed on the highways, the poor condition of streets and sidewalks, the lack of public transportation and the absence of house numbers in the two towns. At the same time, considering what they wouldn't want to see lost Grangers indicated they would sorely miss the post office, the medical clinic and dentist, the automotive garage and full service gas stations, and meeting facilities such as the Grange Hall, the Senior Citizens Center, the Fire Hall, and the V.F.W. Hall. They would also miss the special quality of small town people associations—their friendliness, the helpfulness, the caring.

For a full picture of last Tuesday evening's work, you are invited to see the big window of the Grange Hall where the work sheets are posted.

That same day, Master Frank Jacobson reported, the local Brownie Troop had agreed to begin mapping the town of Juliaetta to identify the names of those living in the houses there, an important first step in the long-delayed project to provide the J. K. Ambulance Service with such information for the whole area. Jacobson reported that the young ladies were very excited about the project and fully understand its importance, thanks to leaders Ellen Magnuson and Cynthia Nye and their support.

The next meeting of the Grange at 7:30 on Tuesday, November 21, will feature reports on the 81st convention of the Idaho State Grange.

They are also looking at doing children's theater performances at the elementary school, and they hope to offer their services to local businesses who may need extra elves.

In the club's first organizational meeting on Friday, October 27th, Laura Ladd was elected president of the club and Nicole Wilson was elected vice-president.

The turn out for the club was surprisingly large and Mr. Eldrich stated that he would like everyone to feel welcome in the club, but that he feels that the membership will eventually shrink a little because students are so active in a huge variety of activities.

## Kendrick Council Discusses Water, Garbage Rates

Possible increases in water rates and garbage collection fees were among the topics for discussion as the Kendrick council met Tuesday at city hall. All members of the council, Mayor Darrel Brocke, Richard Benjamin, Jerry Brown, David Klatt, and Rita Blewett were present. Also at the meeting were city clerk Donna Goff and maintenance man Don Bateman. Rick McGregor was also at the meeting.

McGregor, who lives on school house hill, was present to tell the city of his plans to re-connect the sewer line from his property out to the city's collection line. The change would allow him to make a connection without crossing on other property, as he now has to do. The city council was agreeable to the new connection.

The council discussed the "yield" signs on the back street, noting that the condition of these signs is very poor. Councilman Klatt will check to see if new signs might be obtained through the state. Whatever the outcome of this is, the council agreed that the signs must be brought up to good condition and will see that this is done.

Mayor Brocke, who is a member of the Solid Waste Committee of Latah County, discussed a proposed 10 percent increase in garbage collection rates. The added charge will be used by the county to cover the cost of hiring a consultant to give advice and make recommendations on the present landfill used by Latah County and how to make better use of it, and also how to set up a recyclable collection system. It is understood that this procedure is, or will soon be, required by the federal government. No definite decisions on when this might be effective has been made.

The council also heard that the accounting firm retained by the city has recommended an increase in the fees charged for water. This increase, the accountants feel, needs to be made to offset increasing costs of operation and to also make replacements and repairs. Brocke said the council will take this matter under advisement and hopes to have a better understanding of the situation by the next meeting.

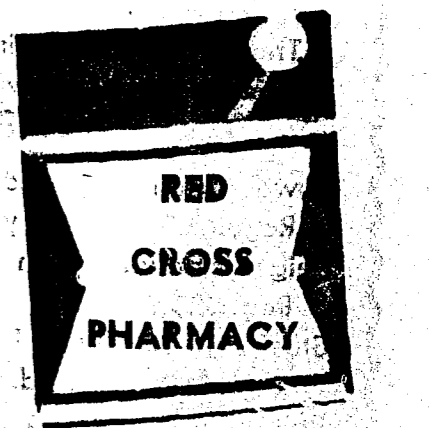
