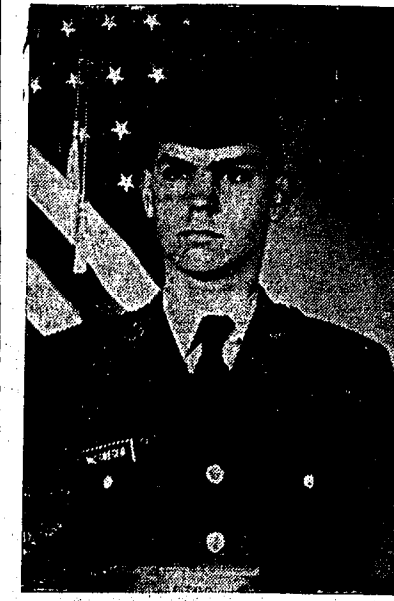

Mabel Callison, 82, Retired Teacher, Passes Nov. 17

Mabel Gertrude Callison, 82, a retired school teacher and well-known and respected member of the Kendrick community, died of causes related to age Friday afternoon, November 17, at the Lewiston Care Center. She had been a patient at the center since Sunday.

Mrs. Callison was born Jan. 17, 1907 at Cloverland, Wash., to James Andrew and Sarah Jane Mitchell Weaver. She moved with her family in 1914 to Lenore, where she attended grade school. She then boarded at Clarkston while attending Clarkston High School. After graduation she attended Lewis-Clark Normal School (now Lewis-Clark State College), where she earned her lifetime teaching certificate.

She taught school at Star, Idaho, northeast of Lenore, from 1925 to 1927, then at Twin Falls from 1927 to 1932, when she returned to north central Idaho to teach grades one through eight at the Taney School on Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick. She taught there until 1934, and on Oct. 14 that year she married Norla Samuel Callison at Lenore.

From 1934 to 1977 the Callisons lived on American Ridge near Kendrick where he farmed and she was a homemaker. Mrs. Callison also taught elementary school at Juliaetta from 1961 until her retirement in 1970. She continued to live at Kendrick. Her husband died July 1, 1983.

Mrs. Callison was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star and the Kendrick United Methodist Church. She enjoyed gardening and crocheting.

Survivors include a son, Robert N. Callison of Kendrick; a daughter, Nancy L. Nye of Genesee, and five grandchildren. Three brothers and six sisters died previously.

The funeral was held Tuesday at 10:30 a. m. at the Kendrick United Methodist Church with the Rev. John W. Martin officiating. Burial was at the Kendrick City Cemetery.

Memorial contributions are suggested to the Kendrick United Methodist Church or the Kendrick-Julietta Ambulance Fund, Kendrick, Idaho.

Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home at Lewiston was in charge of arrangements.

Red Cross Pharmacy Was One of Kendrick's First Business Firms

(Note: This story is the first of a series of articles highlighting local business firms which are such an important part in the day-to-day life of the Kendrick-Julietta community. The articles will attempt to give a brief history of the business, the products and services it offers, and how it contributes to the community.)

This project is part of the K-J Community Development Association's efforts to increase knowledge and awareness of the services offered locally.

A good reliable drug store is an asset to any town. The Red Cross Pharmacy in Kendrick has survived two disastrous fires and several location changes to remain a valuable part of valley life.

The drug store was established by C. A. White as "White Drug"

prior to 1893 and was one of the businesses that burned in the fire of 1893. The firm was again destroyed in the great fire of August, 1904. Within a week, after supplies had arrived by train, White opened for business in the two front rooms of a private home. It is believed that it was about this time that Mr. White changed the name of the firm to its present "Red Cross Pharmacy."

Old photographs, dating from 1911, show that the drug store was in its present location, but later, the store moved several times before returning to its original site in 1952.

Following the passing of the founder of the business, other pharmacists have been Albert Moskop, who was related to the August Wegners. The pharmacy still has one of his prescriptions from 1911. A. G. Newton was also a druggist at the store, as was Lewis Harris who was married to the daughter of Thomas Kirby, the founder of Kendrick. Also operating the firm was Frank Nesbitt, whose state license number was 11.

Although not a pharmacist, Tom Keene owned the store for several years in the late 1940's and early 1950's.

The present owner, David Clayton, began working in the store part time in the fall of 1948, when he came to Kendrick as a science teacher and assistant coach. In the spring of 1949 Dave began working full time at the store and except for a year in 1954 when he was in Ketchikan, Alaska, he has managed the business since that time.

Some of the equipment from the early days is still in use. The Claytons think that the balances (scales) in use were purchased after the fire of 1904. They were manufactured by the Henry Troemner Co. in Philadelphia, Penn., and are dated 11/5. Old record books are an interesting legacy at the drug store. During prohibition, ethyl alcohol was used in compounding prescriptions. The Claytons have a record book for the years 1920 and 1921, where previous druggists accounted for the ounces of alcohol that were dispensed each month (this was required by law). This book also contains formulas for liniments, cough syrups, lotions, etc., plus such items as squirrel poisons and dandelion spray.

In 1973, following the retirement of the late Dr. D. A. Christensen, there was a major remodeling of Red Cross Pharmacy which doubled the floor space.

Dave is now semi-retired and Jerry Carter, former owner of Carter Drug in Moscow, works three days a week. Barbra and Mariann Chase work "almost" full time. Judy Callison also works several hours each week.

"We have always thought that Kendrick was the place we wanted to live, work and raise our family," Dave and Barbra said. "We still feel that way and welcome this opportunity to express our thanks to the community for the many friends we have and for the community's loyalty to our business," they added.

Food Stamp Benefits, Eligibility Levels and Deductions Increase

Starting on October 1, monthly food stamp benefits increased by about 10 percent. At the same time, food stamp income eligibility levels went up by about 4 percent, meaning a family can have more income and still qualify for food stamps.

Secretary for Food and Consumer Services said, "The changes are a result of annual adjustments in the cost of living and include an additional increase mandated by the Hunger Prevention Act of 1988. These food stamp benefits are the highest on record."

As a result of the increases, the maximum food stamp allotment for a family of four will increase from \$300 to \$381 a month.

Gross income levels which help determine eligibility for households which do not include an elderly or disabled member, will be raised from \$1,263 a month to \$1,311 a month for a family of four. Net income levels, used to determine eligibility and benefits for all households, will increase from \$971 to \$1,009 a month for a family of four.

Starting October, households will also see an increase in the amount that may be deducted from their gross incomes to determine net income. Standard deductions will increase from \$106 to \$112 per household. Shelter deductions will increase from a maximum of \$170 to a maximum of \$177 a month per household. The maximum dependent care deduction will remain \$160 per dependent.
