Heart Attack Claims Kenneth R. Brown

Kenneth Ray Brown, 59, one of the best friends Kendrick's many athletic programs will ever know, died of a heart attack at Gritman Memorial Hospital in Moscow Sunday, December 3. He was stricken at a turkey shoot in Juliaetta. He was rushed to the Moscow Hospital by ambulance where he later died.



Ken, respected and well-liked in the community was a former city council member and active civic worker, but it was his love of sports and young people that made him so special to the community. He started the Little League baseball program at Kendrick and Juliaetta 28 years ago and was always one of the driving forces of its existence. He coached both the Little League and the Babe Ruth League teams, and organized fund-raising events such as the annual "bean feed" to help keep the baseball program solvent. In addition, he always assisted with the Kid Races at the Locust Blossom Festival. He was a fan and ardent supporter of all KHS athletic events.

Ken also was an avid bowler and bowled in league competition each season in Lewiston. He also liked camping, hunting, fishing, golfing and attending turkey shoots.

All of his help to the school and the community earned him the Kendrick Grange citizen of the year award in 1986 and the Kendrick Booster Club named him booster of the year in 1987.

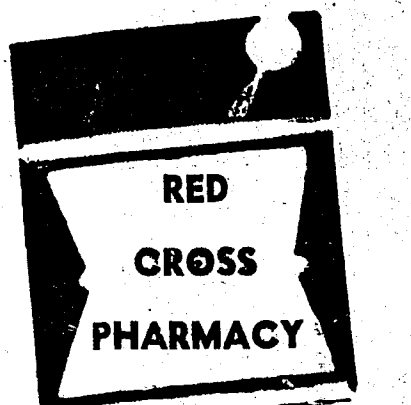
