Kendrick-Juliaetta Centennial Coins Would be Very Special Christmas Gifts



In the final weeks before Christmas the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association is making a special effort to offer its Centennial Medallions to the public as excellent gifts for holiday giving. These coins, or medallions, have been on sale for a number of months and several hundred have been sold through the bank and other merchants in the area, but this will be the first time they have been offered on a wide distribution basis.

"These would make truly fine gifts for family members, friends or business associates," said Geo. F. Brocke, Jr., chairman of the Medallion committee.

Each coin is minted from pure Idaho-mined silver (1 Troy ounce) and are in an air-tight plastic case mounted in an heavy, protective outer casing with historical information also contained in the case.

There are two separate Medallions available for both Kendrick and Juliaetta. The front of the coins were designed by local artists. Jim Black a retired U. of Idaho professor who lives in Kendrick designed the Kendrick medallion. Carol Helmgartner Bartleson, formerly of Juliaetta created the Juliaetta design. The reverse of both medallions honor Idaho's statehood centennial.

The coins are being sold for \$21.00 each (tax included). There will also be a \$2.00 handling charge for postage and mailing. That is \$23.00 total charge for each medallion.

The Idaho statewide EMS system is comprised of about 200 ambulance, Quick Response Unit (QRU), and rescue squad units in all areas of the state. Over 90 percent of the EMS personnel in Idaho are volunteers. EMS units in Idaho respond to about 50,000 patient situations each year, including motor vehicle accidents, heart attacks, and other emergency events.

Kendrick Council Met Tuesday Eve.

All members were present at the Kendrick city council met in regular session Tuesday evening, Dec. 12. Mayor Darrel Brocke presided over the meeting attended by councilmen Dick Benjamin, Jerry Brown, Dave Klatt and Rita Blewett. Also present were city clerk Donna Goff and Don Bateman, city maintenance.

Guests were Mike Boe, councilman-elect, Will Harrington, an attorney from Moscow and Mitchell Marx, the city's auditor.

Both Harrington and Marx were present to discuss the city's present financial situation. While the city's general financial situation is good at the present time, both the attorney and the accountant agreed that the city is facing an increase in sewer and water user fees, if it hopes to bring these services into compliance with state and federal standards. Both the water and sewer systems are old and in need of repair.

Mayor Brocke said after the meeting the council realizes that changes must be made to provide adequate service. Because any changes will affect the budget, the city is planning to re-open and re-do the budget in January and February. Public notices will be made to inform the citizens before this is done, Brocke said.

It was reported that all yield signs have now been placed on the back streets and there will soon be signs on the old school house hill posting a 15 MPH speed limit.

Don Bateman also indicated to the council that he plans to retire from his position as city maintenance man March 1.

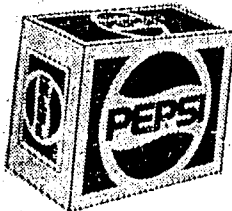
