Manning Onstott to be Honored on 80th Birthday Sat., Dec. 23

Manning Onstott will be honored on the occasion of his eightieth birthday anniversary at an open house reception Saturday, December 23 at the Kendrick Grange Hall between the hours of 2 and 6 p. m. A cordial invitation to attend this affair has been extended to all friends.



Manning was born Dec. 23, 1909 at Clarkston, Washington. His parents moved to the Bear Ridge area in 1914 and he has called Kendrick home since then. He attended schools in this area and worked for the Blister Rust crews for nine seasons before serving as a State Fire Warden for a number of years.

Manning and the former Elsie McCollister of Lenore were married August 29, 1932, and they began their married life together at a home where Brocke and Sons Fertilizer Plant is located now. They later moved out to a house near the high school where they raised their family and lived for 43 years before moving into Kendrick.

In 1946 Manning accepted a position with the Soil Conservation Service as a SCS officer. With headquarters at Lewiston and then Moscow, Onstott served a four county area and maintained an office in Kendrick until his retirement in 1971.

Even after his "retirement" Manning kept a busy schedule and was a school bus driver for nine years. Always active in community affairs, Onstott is a 46 year member of the Kendrick Grange No. 413, serving 4 terms as Master. He is also active in the county Pomona Grange. He is a long-time member of Kendrick Lodge No. 26, A. F. & A. M. and is a Past Master of that organization.

Manning and Elsie are the parents of two children, Geri of Lewiston and Ray of Canada; the grandparents of five, and the great-grandparents of six.

Kendrick-Juliaetta Centennial Coins Would be Very Special Christmas Gifts



In the final weeks before Christmas the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association is making a special effort to offer its Centennial Medallions to the public as excellent gifts for holiday giving. These coins, or medallions, have been on sale for a number of months and several hundred have been sold through the bank and other merchants in the area, but this will be first time they have been offered on a wide distribution basis.

"These would make truly fine gifts for family members, friends or business associates," said Geo. F. Brocke, Jr., chairman of the Medallion committee.

Each coin is minted from pure Idaho-mined silver (1 Troy ounce) and are in an air-tight plastic case mounted in an heavy, protective outer casing with historical information also contained in the case.

There are two separate Medallions available for both Kendrick and Juliaetta. The front of the coins were designed by local artists. Jim Black a retired U. of Idaho professor who lives in Kendrick designed the Kendrick medallion. Carol Heimgartner Bartleson, formerly of Juliaetta created the Juliaetta design. The reverse of both medallions honor Idaho's statehood centennial.

The coins are being sold for \$21.00 each (tax included). There will also be a \$2.00 handling charge for postage and mailing. That is \$23.00 total charge for each medallion.

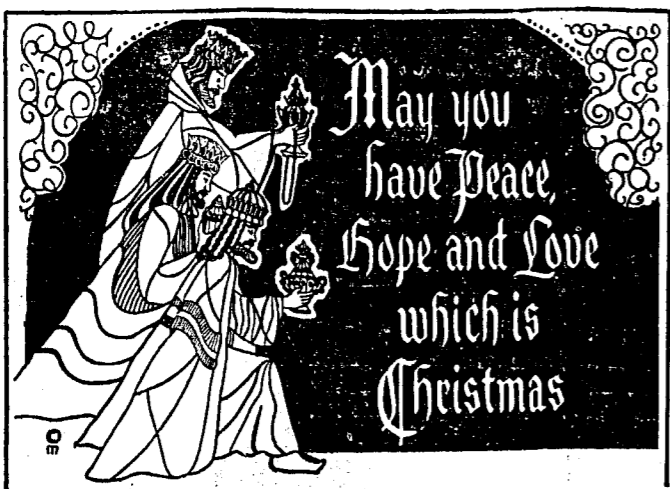
