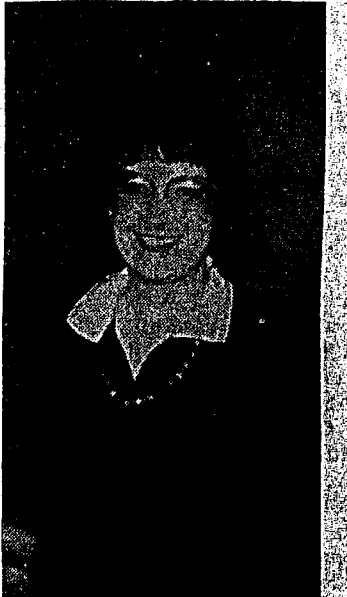
Nov. 15—Janice Wells, the librarian at Juliaetta Community Library, showed a film which is always a high light of the month. The group truly appreciates this monthly service.

## Kendrick Teacher Delegation Leader for Study Group to Russia

Colette Cozort of Kendrick High School has recently been selected as a Delegation Leader for the 1990 "People-to-People Youth Science Exchange to the Soviet Union. Now in its third year, the People to People Youth Science Exchange is the largest reciprocal exchange effort offered to outstanding science students from both the United States and the Soviet Union.

Selected American High School students, with an interest in science and world affairs will spend three weeks next summer under the direction of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR studying in 12 academic disciplines. Scientific categories represented will be: Medicine & Health, Chemistry, Physics, Geology, Marine Biology, General Biology, Archeology, Environmental Studies, Computer Science, Astronomy, Aerospace, and General Science.

Delegations of 30 students and three Science Leaders will visit three of more than a dozen participating cities across the Soviet Union between June and August. Locations have been selected by the Academy of Sciences based on their proximity to research facilities and natural settings for each of the specific disciplines.

Students will begin their program with a two-day intensive orientation session in Washington, D. C., then travel to Moscow for four days of cultural and sightseeing activities. They will then continue on to the location of the science camp for a two-week science program, sharing and learning with an equal number of selected Soviet students. Heavy emphasis will be placed on "hands on" activities to compliment the lecture presentations during the science camp. In addition to the academic focus of each itinerary, students will participate in a variety of cultural and recreational experiences with their Soviet counterparts. From camp locations, students will travel to Leningrad for an additional three days of cultural activities. Delegates will also spend a day in Helsinki, Finland before departing for the United States.

A reciprocal exchange will take place in the United States during the same time period involving Soviet Youth. Interested American science students are welcome to contact Colette Cozort at (208) 289-4690 (home) or 289-4202 (school) for further information regarding application to the program.

## Visit to Austria and Germany Was an Exciting Experience.

I recently returned from a trip to Vienna, Austria and was asked to write about some of my experiences. I went over to visit my cousin, Wendy Wilson, who has been there working for Eastern European Seminary for two years now.

We had a nice Thanksgiving with some of her friends at the home of Ralph and Myrna Alexander on the outskirts of town. We spent the next week "doing Vienna." We went to hear the Vienna Symphony perform one night and the next night went to half of an Italian opera at the State Opera House. (Half was enough, although it was beautiful.) We also took in an English performance of Charles Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol' at the International Theater.

Vienna is a very international City. There are people from all over the world living and working there. Just in the short time I was there, I met people from Australia, the Philippines, Africa, Brazil, Canada, Germany, Japan, Norway, and England, as well as the United States and other countries. Communication was not a big problem as most of the people speak at least a little English. The main language spoken, however, is German.

There are many historical buildings in Vienna that were either undamaged or restored after World

War II. One of these that I toured is the Schonbrun Palace, summer home of the Hofburg family during their reign in the 17th and 18th centuries. Names I've read about in history books don't always seem like real people to me, but to be in the very room where Mozart gave his first concert at six years old and to see Marie Antoinette's childhood bedroom really brought these and other characters to life for me.

Wendy and I also did some traveling outside of Vienna. We spent one day in Budapest, Hungary—taking a train down in the morning and back that evening, about 2½ hours each way. The main tourist areas of Budapest are well kept and very pretty, but there is still much war damage and many deteriorating buildings visible on the back streets. We did have a delicious Hungarian meal at a small restaurant on one of these back streets, though.

Our next stop was Rothenburg ob der Tauber, W. Germany. We got off the train to find a living fairy tale! The town (population about 12,500) is still surrounded by its original wall, built mostly in the 14th and 15th centuries. The streets are all cobblestone and the buildings all portray the character of medieval times, complete with hanging wrought iron store signs. The drawbridges are gone and the moat is now a playground for children, but it was still fun to wander around and pretend it was the 14th century!

Rothenburg is also famous as a

Christmas town. The European "Christkindmarkt" (outdoor Christmas market) originated there and there are Christmas trees and lights everywhere and store after store of handmade Christmas ornaments and decorations. Needless to say, we had lots of fun shopping, too.

Finally, one of my last days in Europe was spent in a town experiencing lots of exciting changes right now—Berlin. We saw the Wall and places where the Wall has been taken down to make new checkpoints, all of which were crowded with East Germans going back and forth. We even chipped a few small pieces of concrete out of the Wall. It seemed strange to one day be walking around on the Rothenburg wall thinking it was so neat, and the next day feeling a small bit of the hatred the German people have toward the Berlin Wall.

On the way to Berlin, we had to change trains in Nurnberg and got a first hand glimpse of how hungry the people of East Germany are for a taste of Western life. The seats and the aisles of that train were literally overflowing with hundreds of East Germans who had come to West Germany to shop—mainly on the "Welcome Money" provided to them by the West German government—and to just look at things they had never, ever seen before in their lives, things Westerners take for granted. Most of them got off the train at the border to catch other trains back to

their home—many of them carrying small stereos and one or two small shopping bags.

Berlin is a very interesting city. The contrast between East and West is incredible. West Berlin is a literal island of western culture in the middle of East Germany. It is actually closer to Poland than it is to W. Germany. Among the many restaurants, theaters, and stores on the main shopping street is the Ka-De-We, the 3rd largest department store in the world. There are lights everywhere—neon signs, street lights, a huge lighted reader board, and thousands of beautiful white Christmas lights on trees, store fronts, and strung in designs above the street. The city is always busy with cars and buses and pedestrians bustling around the streets well into the night.

Comparatively, East Berlin is quiet, dark, and dismal. There are some nice looking storefronts, but most of the items displayed are nowhere to be found inside. There are very few lights and even less activity in the streets after dark. We did, however, see one large Christmas tree lighting an otherwise dark public square. There is a tremendous amount of construction going on—restorations as well as new constructions. Most of the new buildings appear to be housing. There is currently a 2-3 year waiting list for the government-owned apartments—longer if you are single with no children. There is also a waiting list to buy

cars—10-12 years or longer.

We crossed back over to West Berlin through Checkpoint Charlie, thankful for our Western freedoms and lifestyle. We really do have much to be thankful for here and, hopefully, someday the East Germans and Czechoslovakians and maybe even the Romanians will be able to say the same thing.
