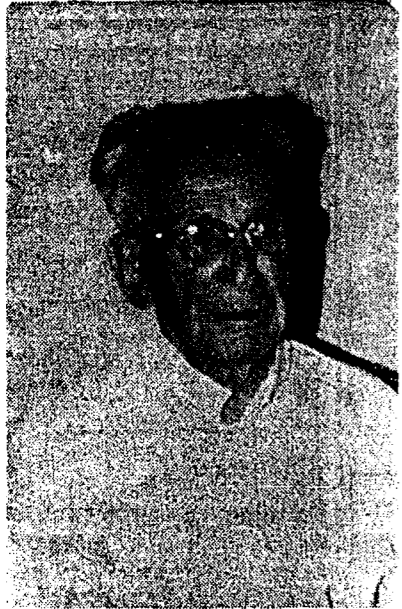

F. C. 'Dick' Cuddy, Retired Barber, Passes at Age 91

Frank Calvin "Dick" Cuddy, one of Kendrick's best-loved and best-known citizens died Friday at Gritman Memorial Hospital in Moscow of causes related to age. He was 91.



Dick was Kendrick's barber from 1947 until he retired in 1977 at the age of 79. His shop was one of the last one-man, small town barber shops and was a mecca for loafers, visitors and community information of the smallest detail. All things—great and small—were discussed either in the shop or out in front of it on the "liar's bench". Shortly before his retirement, Dick and his shop were the subject of a fine feature story in the Daily Idahoan by Rhonda Brammer, a local resident, who was working for the paper at that time.

Mr Cuddy was born August 6, 1898, the 4th son of Hiram and Belle Cuddy at Southwick. He lived with his family at Southwick until 1910, when they moved to Star, Idaho. He returned to Southwick in 1916 and lived there until 1928.

He married I. Floy McCormick at Coquille, Oregon Nov. 17, 1928. They lived at various places throughout southwest Washington and northwest Oregon until 1945, when they moved to Orofino. They lived at Orofino until 1947 when on May 19 of that year he purchased the barber shop and building from Sid Clemenhagen. The shop had been run by Roy Maples.

Dick was active in community and county affairs. He was instrumental in organizing and instituting the Kendrick Volunteer Fire Department and was always a supporter of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Service. He was an active member of Kendrick Grange No. 413 and the Latah County Pomona Grange. He was a lifetime member of the Lewiston Elks No. 896. Golf was one of his favorite pastimes and he played regularly until two years ago. He was also a strong supporter and fan of local baseball and basketball events.

After his retirement at age 79, Dick and his wife Floy, who died in 1986, were a Main Street fixture on summer afternoons, as they sat on the front porch of their home together watching the traffic go by and visiting with passers-by. Folks could set their clocks each day by his 9 a. m. trip to the post office and grocery store six days a week.

He was preceded in death by his wife Floy, and a daughter Kathryn. He is survived by his 4 grandchildren, 6 great-grandchildren, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Final services were held Tuesday, January 2 at 1:00 p. m. at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with Rev. Lonnie Williams officiating. Joyce Clemenhagen was organist and soloist was Carrie Bird.

Casket bearers were Elmer Cuddy, Jim Cuddy, David Cuddy, John Cuddy, Jack Cuddy and Charles Cuddy.

Burial was at Normal Hill Cemetery, Lewiston.

The family suggests any memorials be sent to the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Fund or the Kendrick Volunteer Fire Department.

Governor to Proclaim Week of Thanksgiving for Idaho

Governor Cecil Andrus has proclaimed the weekend of January 5-7, as a Weekend of Thanksgiving for Idaho, prior to the state's official Centennial kickoff commemoration on Saturday, Jan. 13 on the steps of the Capitol. Individuals and religious congregations are urged during the January 5-7 weekend to reflect upon Idaho's past and be thankful for all that the state and its people have made possible. The Governor will sign the Proclamation on January 4, 1990.

"Before we officially begin the celebration of the century, I would urge all Idahoans to consider ways to honor Idaho's past in their homes and in their places of worship," said Governor Andrus.

The Weekend of Thanksgiving honors the success and progress of a "committed citizenry representative of a wide variety of faiths and creeds," the Governor's Proclamation reads. Idahoans are urged "to lend their support and show their appreciation for Idaho and all that its people and resources make possible."

A similar commemoration is planned to conclude the Centennial year. The year-end observance, designated as a Weekend of Commitment, is scheduled for December 28-30, 1990, at which time all Idahoans will be encouraged to participate in an observance honoring a commitment to Idaho's future.

Shotgunners Respond In Survey

Recent opinion surveys by the University of Idaho show that Idaho bird hunters, identified as "shotgun hunters" in the survey, represent a true cross-section of the state's population. The survey, administered under contract with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, used a computer-generated random sample of 826 waterfowl or upland bird hunters who bought stamps for either species.

Idaho's shotgun hunters come from all age and income groups, and 66 percent hold full-time jobs. Almost 90 percent of the respondents were male, and less than a quarter were members of hunting, conservation or sportsmen's organizations. Nonresi-

Residents were more than twice as likely to belong to such a group as residents.

Pheasants, ducks and geese were the most desired types of game, although over half hunted most of the upland or waterfowl species. A majority hunt only in one region (only 20 percent utilize more than one region), with Region 3 in southwestern Idaho getting the heaviest use from residents and nonresidents.

Dirt bikes, ATVs and mountain bikes were used by fewer than one in ten shotgun hunters. More than 90 percent hunt on foot, while three-quarters use 4-wheel drive and two-thirds use 2-wheel drive vehicles to get to hunting locations.

Over half feel that the majority of their Idaho hunts are quality; and like most other hunters they find quality in naturalness of setting, knowing animals are abundant, being around few other hunters, seeing game, using equipment and applying hunting skills. Harvest was not a key element of a successful or quality hunt for most respondents.

A few things detract from a hunt, among them encountering other groups, off-road use of motorized vehicles, and use of hunting areas by livestock. Almost 75 percent said that hunting in an area having many open roads detracted from their shotgun hunting experience.

Fee increases to offset increasing costs of game management were supported by 77 percent of resident shotgunners and 53 percent of nonresidents. A majority of both groups feel the upland and waterfowl Habitat Improvement Programs should be retained, with no increase in cost of the respective permits.

While less than half feel the Department of Fish and Game is doing an excellent or good job of waterfowl or upland bird management, only ten percent felt it was doing poor, and 57 percent rated overall fish and wildlife management by the department as good or excellent.

Fullness of Time

Only a selected few knew when He came the first time. It was an unpretentious arrival. What should have been a major global event, was a private family affair. No one could have predicted when God would visit the world in the form of a babe. The prophets had been silent almost four hundred years. So then why was that the time?

We read in Galatians 4:4 "But when the fullness of the time was come, God sent forth his Son, made of a woman, . . . Jesus came to Bethlehem when it was the fullness of time. God determines time. He controls nations and their final destinies. God used Rome to cause the fullness of time.

Salvage Certificates of Title Will Alert Buying Public
Effective Jan. 1, a "Salvage Certificate of Title" will be issued for severely damaged vehicles that are five years old or newer or worth over \$5,000, provided they have been declared uneconomical to repair by an insurance company or the owner of an uninsured vehicle. "The salvage title, rather than a regular title to prove vehicle ownership, will be issued by the Idaho

Transportation Department in response to a 'Truth in Buying' law passed during the last session of the Idaho Legislature," Douglas Kraemer, chief of motor vehicles, said. "This legislation was passed to enable car buyers and financial institutions to clearly identify severely damaged or rebuilt vehicles."
For insured vehicles, it will be the responsibility of the insurance company to apply to the Idaho Transportation Department for a salvage title if a vehicle has had a total loss payoff. Owners of severely damaged, uninsured vehicles will be responsible for contacting the department themselves for issuance of the new salvage title.
Once issued, a salvage title may be replaced by a regular, clear title if the vehicle is inspected by an Idaho Transportation Department motor vehicle investigator prior to rebuilding and it is found that the vehicle does not require repair or replacement of two or more major component parts.
The new legislation further requires that when a severely damaged vehicle is rebuilt and two or more component parts are repaired or replaced, the words, "reconstructed vehicle" must be printed on the title. Such rebuilt vehicles will also be physically labeled with a "reconstructed vehicle" sticker on the door-jamb.

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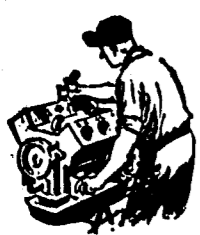
