## Employment Test For 1990 Census Jobs Is Jan. 19

The Bureau of Census of the United States Department of Commerce will be conducting tests and taking job applications for workers who will help with the taking of the 1990 Decennial Census in the Kendrick/Juliaetta area. Representatives of the Census Bureau will be at the Kendrick Fire Hall Friday, Jan. 19 from 9:30 to 11:30 a. m. to conduct the testing, said Donna Goff, Kendrick city clerk, who is helping arrange the Jan. 19 session. Mrs. Goff said the Bureau will need at least 20 persons to work in this area.

The taking of the 1990 census will begin April 1.

Some of the types of jobs to be filled are:

Enumerators: those people who will work in the field (in neighborhoods, rural areas, colleges, apartment buildings, institutions, etc.) gathering census information. There are several kinds of enumerators, but most of their jobs involve person to person contacts and a lot of walking or driving and climbing stairs.

Crew Leaders: Also work in the field, and they are required to do a lot of walking and driving. They have the responsibility of training, supervising, evaluating, and improving the work of a crew of enumerators.

Clerks: These work in the census office on several operations concerned with processing census questionnaires and materials.

There are also Supervisory Office Clerks, Clerks for Special Place Operations, Payroll/Personnel Clerks, Stock and Supply Assistants, and Data Transcribers.

Each applicant for Census Bureau employment must take a written test. The test consists of 28 questions designed to measure the skills, abilities and knowledge required to perform a variety of census jobs. There are five parts to the test: reading, clerical, number, evaluative, and organizational skills.

The tests are multiple-choice. This means that for each question there are several choices from which the applicant will select the best answer.

Applicants have 30 minutes to complete the test.

All those who pass the test will receive notification that they are eligible for training. The training period depends on the job description.

The pay is \$5.00 an hour for a 35 to 40 hour week for the 4 to 6 weeks the census will be conducted. There will also be a 24 cents a mile allowance for those people who have to use their own cars for official work.

The Census Bureau will mail to each person or head of a family a form which can be mailed back. Enumerator will also collect these forms and give assistance in filling them out for return.

## Low Income Fuel Assistance Sign-Up Help Available In Juliaetta/Kendrick Jan. 17

Representatives from the Community Action Agency will be in Kendrick and Juliaetta Wednesday, Jan. 17 to assist in signing up people for this year's Energy Assistance Program. The sign-up will be at the Kendrick Senior Center from 9 to 12 noon and at the City Hall in Juliaetta from 1 o'clock until approximately 4 p. m.

The program is designed to give low-income families help with fuel costs during the winter months.

Those who are interested in signing up are asked to bring proof of income, rent receipts, power bills or other heating bill receipts and their Social Security cards.

## New Juliaetta Council Seated Tuesday Night

George Bacon, Jr. and Bruce Spang were officially sworn in and seated on the Juliaetta City Council as that group met in regular session Tuesday evening, Jan. 9. Bacon, a fire warden with the State office at Deary, and Spang, a supervisor at Gem State Lumber Co. will replace Frank Groseclose and Bruce May, whose terms expired Dec. 31.

Bacon and Spang were sworn in by Mayor Harold Freeman. The Juliaetta council is now composed of Mayor Freeman, Bacon, Spang, and holdover members Richard Groseclose and Dirk Hammond.

Mary Jo Vallem is the city clerk. It was good news for dogs Tuesday night as the council decided not to enforce the licensing fees on dogs. The decision was made to not make any effort to collect dogs licensing fees with the knowledge that only 2 people had bought licenses for their pets last year. The law concerning the licensing of dogs will remain on the books for the time being. However, the city will enforce the ordinances concerning barking and nuisance pets, the city clerk said.

The council discussed repairing streets and sidewalks in town. This subject will be a matter of continuing concern for the council.

On a similar subject, the council was informed that a number of traffic signs in Juliaetta will be replaced by the company from whom the signs were purchased. The signs, it appears were defective and have begun to peel.

Also discussed was the project of numbering the houses and business firms in the city. Plans will be made for this project in the near future.

Sally Browning, a member of the local Centennial committee was present to inform the council that the State of Idaho is making a \$200 grant available to each town in Idaho to use for a Centennial project. Also available is a bench and a tree which are to be placed in the community. The city has to make application for these items if they are wanted. The council approved making this request.

The new council also decided to have just one meeting each month, eliminating the second "delinquent" session began several years ago. The council will now meet on the first Tuesday, following the 3rd day of the month.

The next council meeting will be February 6.

## Monday Wind Storm Caused Much Damage

A severe wind storm swept across the area early Monday morning with velocities recorded as high as 93 miles an hour. The hurricane-like force left the Palouse battered with losses probably running into the millions of dollars. There was one man killed north of Moscow on highway 95 when his pickup truck struck a fallen tree. Several families were left homeless in the wake of the storm, trees were uprooted, power poles were knocked down and power and telephone service has not yet been fully restored.

Most schools in the area, including Kendrick and Juliaetta, were closed because of the power failure and

the risks of moving the buses in the tremendous winds.

In the immediate area, the damage was mostly from fallen trees, poles, and roofs and sheds. Gem State Lumber Co. in Juliaetta appeared to be hardest hit by the storm as two boiler stacks were blown down, and part of 2 roofs were damaged. One of the stacks from a boiler was completely destroyed, but the other stack could be repaired, said Bud Holt, a supervisor at the mill. Some boards were also scattered by the wind, Holt said. The stacks went down between 5:30 and 6:00 Monday morning.

Brocke and Sons' facilities survived without too much damage in Kendrick. George Brocke said Tuesday night that the firm's seed plant in Moscow suffered more than the local plants, losing many sheets of metal siding from the warehouses there.

Browning Cut Stock Co. in Juliaetta also escaped without too much damage, as Jack Browning reported the loss of a door.

Jerry Galloway, who lives on the ranch on Big Bear Ridge had three head of cattle—two cows and a bull—killed when the wind knocked part of a large tree down in the barn yard. The tree apparently killed the two cows outright when it went down, and injured the bull so seriously that it was later shot. A corner of a machine shed, was also damaged. The dead cows and the injured bull were discovered first by Eddie Galloway, Jr. as he was driving around checking for damage early Monday morning. Jerry said he was still at work when the storm struck. Eddie and Harold Larson of Juliaetta put the bull out of its misery and then took the animals to Orofino to salvage some of the meat.

The storm hit shortly after 3:00 a. m. Monday morning. Moscow and much of the Palouse lost its electricity at 4:10. The power went off at 4:25 in Kendrick—came on for a few minutes twice after 5:30 and then went out again and didn't come back until almost exactly 2:00 that afternoon.

The valley businesses were almost brought to a standstill during the power outage. Gas pumps, cash registers—anything requiring electrical power were useless.

Area weathermen and scientists said this was the worst storm in the Palouse area in memory. It was one that local residents wouldn't care to experience again.

A new program to contract grow superior varieties of spring canola (rapeseed) in Idaho, Montana and Washington was announced this week by DNA Plant Technology Corporation (DNAP) and E. I. Du Pont Company.

DNAP, based in Cinnaminson, New Jersey, and Du Pont headquartered in Wilmington, Delaware, are engaged in a joint project to develop and commercialize new varieties of canola with improved fatty acid composition. 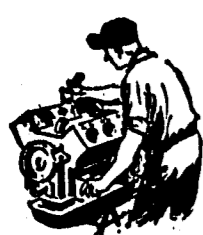
