## Lula Lettenmaier Claimed by Cancer

Lula Lettenmaier, a Southwick homemaker and resident since 1944, died Monday, January 15 at the Moscow Care Center of cancer. She was 72.

She was born Feb. 3, 1917, at Southwick to Melvin H. and Lydia B. Miller. She attended schools at Juliaetta where she graduated from high school.

Following graduation, she moved to Lewiston, where she worked as a maid for the C. L. Billings family. She later worked as a silk finisher and then as a waitress for the Raymond Hotel.

She later moved to Spokane, where she worked as a waitress at the Davenport Hotel. She returned to Lewiston and went to work in the box factory at Potlatch Forests, Inc.

She and Johnnie L. Lettenmaier were married at Lewiston on April 15, 1944. They moved to Southwick where they farmed and raised cattle. He died on Nov. 30, 1984.

She was a member of the Southwick Community Church and a former member of the Southwick Home Extension Club.

She is survived by two sons, Fred L. Lettenmaier of Southwick and Eddie C. Lettenmaier of Lewiston; a brother, Alfred M. Miller of Lewiston; four grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

A daughter, Rosalie Brunelle, died previously.

The funeral service was held Friday, at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Clifton Morey of the Southwick Community Church officiating. Pallbearers were: Arley Armitage, Mark Mustoe, Davern Riggers, Roger Brunelle, Jeff Brunelle and Mike Zenger.

Burial was at the Southwick Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials to the Hospice of the Palouse, 804 S. Washington, Moscow, Idaho 83843, if desired.

## University of Idaho College of Agriculture Awards Scholarships

The University of Idaho College of Agriculture awarded nearly \$175,000 in scholarship money to 218 students for the 1989-90 school year.

The Colleges largest scholarship is the Iddings Research Fellowship, which is for \$6,000.

Sixty-three different scholarships are offered by the UI College of Agriculture, plus several 4-H national awards and a varying number of undergraduate fellowships. Most are for between \$500 and \$1,500.

Wayne Rush, College of Agriculture student relations coordinator, said scholarships are awarded on the basis of scholastic achievement, "but most of them require financial need be taken into consideration."

Some scholarships are awarded to students who are outstanding in specific majors or areas of specialization.

(Editor's note: The Gazette received this unsigned article in the mail this week. Ordinarily we won't publish an article if we don't know who the author is. Where has your pride gone? Why do some of you feel the need to destroy what others have built?

Juliaetta, in the past, has had many community organizations and businesses all dedicated to the improvement of its home.

I urge all of Juliaetta's citizens to take action. To organize, to get busy and make a difference.

## Better Streets and Sidewalks Top Priority List for Kendrick and Juliaetta

The improvement of streets and sidewalks in Juliaetta and Kendrick rated highest in a list of priority that came from a series of assessment meetings conducted as part of the Gem Community program now in operation in our two towns. The two communities were accepted into the Gem Community Program last year. The program, sponsored by the Idaho Dept. of Commerce, is designed to help small rural communities in establishing a locally initiated economic development plan.

One of the first steps to be taken in a Gem Community Program is a community assessment. This involves conducting a series of meetings designed to assess the community's strengths and weakness and determine what the people feel needs to be

done in the future to ensure the survival of the towns.

In attempting to assess the feelings of the community a series of meetings were held with the Gem Community group, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Potlatch Ridge residents, Lions Club, Kendrick Booster Club, Juliaetta Church of the Nazarene, Senior Citizens, Kendrick Grange, E. M. T.'s, and two different groups of high school students.

These groups, considered to be able to give a good cross-section of community opinion, were asked to rate goals for the two communities in the order of importance, rate community project ideas, list community strengths and weaknesses, opportunities existing in the communities, threats that face the towns, the 25 greatest things about Kendrick and Juliaetta, conditions that need to change, what needs to remain the same, and what is essential to the future of Kendrick and Juliaetta.

The results of all these meetings were given to Mary Emery of Lewis-Clark State College who is serving as project coordinator through the Institute for Community Development.

Ms. Emery compiled the statistics and opinions gathered into a report which she presented at the January meeting of the J/K Community Development Assoc. The report is most interesting and gives good indication of how citizens perceive the community they live in.

First, there was no doubt that the citizens were concerned about the condition of the streets and sidewalks in both towns. The desire for a bike path/walking path came in a strong second place, well ahead of a desire to increase jobs with small industries.

Improved recreational facilities were in fourth place with the mention of an athletic center, a diving board for the pool, etc. Retirement housing placed fifth.

## What Are Our Strengths?

Those people who were asked and could express opinions saw the strengths of the communities as our history, climate, school facilities, solid businesses, location (near UI, WSU, LCSC) stable agricultural base, nice natural settings, variety of businesses, friendly good attitude, churches and schools.

## And Our Weaknesses?

When asked what the weaknesses of the community were, the answer that came back most frequently was the water situation, poor sidewalks, junk cars, excessive street traffic, lack of housing, fire protection, job opportunities, traffic control, litter, buildings in need of repair, and no full-time doctor.

## What Threatens Us

In reply to the conditions that pose a threat to the area, concerned citizens said: limited financial resources, school consolidation, water supply, appearance of streets, population loss, fire hazards, vacant building, water storage, truck traffic, job market loss, apathy, dollars leaving the community.

## Development Assoc. Re-Elects Officers

By a unanimous vote of the members present, the officers of the J/K Community Development Association were re-elected for another term of office Thursday noon, Jan. 11 at the regular monthly meeting of that group held at the Knotty Pine Inn in Juliaetta. Re-elected were Harry Burmeister, president; Lesael Abrams, secretary-treasurer, and Dirk Hammond, vice-president.

Following the reading of minutes, Wayne Harris presented a report on the medallion sales. There are still 299 medallions on hand. The committee has \$2,359.40 cash on hand plus \$1,200 in silver which will probably be made into medallions later. The medallion committee is in good condition and Dirk Hammond, manager of First Security Bank in Kendrick indicated that the bank will be purchasing more medallions later in conjunction with a promotional campaign.

The sales of gift items and centennial items (T-shirts, sweat-shirts, mugs, etc.), amounts to \$6,628.40 so far. Expenses have been \$5,284.92 for the products purchases. The fund has a cash on hand of \$896.61, plus accounts receivable.

President Burmeister also reported that the Centennial Center in Kendrick is now in operation. The center is located in the old Lyons Electronic Shop on Main St. which has been donated to the committee by Brocke and Sons for use during the centennial period. Volunteer workers have installed show cases and other display areas. There are now many interesting exhibits and photographs at the center.

The Golden Sunset Senior Citizens have offered to help staff the center and it is now open Wednesday and Friday from 1:30 to 3:30.

The public is invited to stop in and view the many interesting items on display.

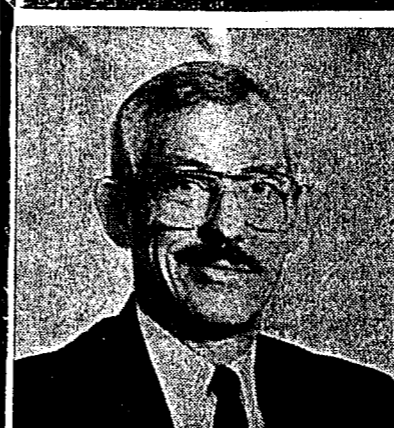
