Family Gathering Honors Birthday Anniversaries

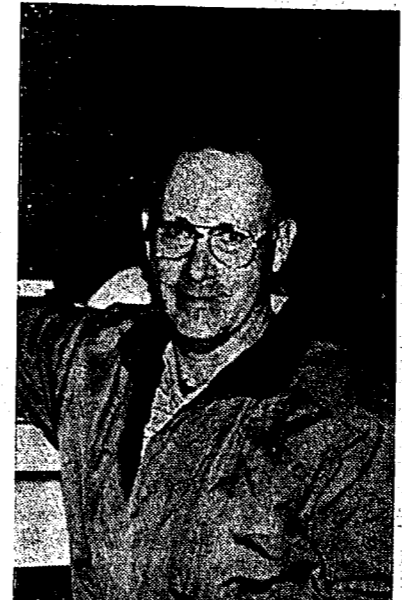

Ray Turner Named Idaho Veterinarian Of the Year for 1990

Lewiston Veterinarian Dr. Ray D. Turner was named "1990 Idaho Veterinarian of the Year" by the Idaho Veterinary Medical Association. The announcement was made at the IVMA Winter Meeting on Jan. 27 in Sun Valley, Idaho at the "Veterinarian of the Year" banquet.



The honor is awarded yearly at the winter meeting in recognition of outstanding service to the Veterinary Profession and to the community.

According to Dr. David R. Rustebakke, 1989 President of the North Idaho Veterinary Medical Association and chairman of the nominating committee for North Idaho, Dr. Turner was the Northern Idaho nominee due to the leadership he had demonstrated over his 34 year career. He has had a very positive impact on the public's perception of veterinary medicine due to his caring attitude and his enthusiasm for his profession. Over his career he has worked with literally hundreds of veterinarians and veterinary students, either as employees or as students assigned to him through the externship program at the College of Veterinary Medicine at WSU; many of them still consider him their "mentor" years later. He has been very active in support of the 4-H and FFA in the area; his example has in fact stimulated many of the area youth to pursue careers in Veterinary Medicine. His positive attitude, sense of humor, and sincerity have earned him the respect and admiration of his clients in the local area, and his professional colleagues statewide.

A native of Toledo, Wash., Dr. Turner attended the WSU College of Veterinary Medicine. Upon his graduation in 1956 he went to work for Dr. Gary McIntosh at the then McIntosh Veterinary Clinic, now known as the Lewiston Veterinary Clinic. He has been a partner in the clinic ever since, where he specializes in general large animal medicine and surgery.

Mustoe Hereford Bull Placed High at Shows In Denver and Ft. Worth

MM Royal Velvet 5W the prize-winning Polled Hereford bull owned by Mark and Caroline Mustoe was recently shown in livestock shows in Denver Colorado and Ft. Worth, Texas where he continued to place among the top animals in the nation.

At the Denver National West Stock Show, Royal Velvet stood second in the Senior Bull Division. He was last year's champion bull.

In Fort Worth the Mustoe bull again stood second in the Senior Bull Division at the National Polled Hereford Show. Royal Velvet placed second to last year's reserve National Champion.

Royal Velvet now weighs 2660 pounds and stands 64 1/2 inches high. Mark said livestock shows are now using ultra sound readings to determine carcass structure and the reading done in Ft. Worth indicates that his animal has a 24" rib eye, which may be a record!

Nez Perce County Adopts Building Code

Nez Perce County has adopted Ordinance No. 49 which adopts the Uniform Building Code. Building permits are required for all construction, including all buildings having over 100 square feet of floor space, which includes farm buildings, storage sheds, shops, etc. Permits are also required for mobile home installation, roof repairs and remodeling. Permits are required BEFORE construction begins. If construction work starts and a permit has not been obtained, a special investigation fee equal to the building permit fee will be charged.

Information concerning these requirements may be obtained by contacting the Nez Perce County Planning and Building office, 1225 Idaho Street, Lewiston, Idaho 83501-0896, Phone 799-3089. Permits are issued on Mondays from 9 to 12 or by appointment by calling the number above.

Nez Perce County is seeking members to serve on the Planning and Zoning Commission. Members must have resided in the county for at least 5 years. Two members may reside in the City of Lewiston.

The Commission meets on the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p. m. at the County Courthouse in Lewiston.

**International Team
Tracks Grizzly
Bear Trends In Selkirks**

A study of the grizzly bear population in the Selkirk Mountains of Idaho, Washington and British Columbia indicates that the high death rate of adult bears, primarily man-caused, may be hurting the population.

That preliminary information came from a joint study being conducted by American and Canadian researchers, government agencies including the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, universities and other organizations. As part of the international effort, researchers are trying to identify factors affecting the grizzly population and determine the bears' habitat needs. They are also looking for ways in which logging operations and the long-term survival of grizzly bears can be compatible.

The bears inhabit an area known as the Selkirk Mountains Grizzly Bear Ecosystem, which was identified as one of the six "bear recovery zones" by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service in 1983. The Fish and Wildlife Service classifies the grizzly bear as a threatened species in the Lower 48 states.

The study is an expansion of grizzly bear research which began in 1981. Idaho researchers conducted habitat surveys, did population and distribution studies, and radio-collared seven bears.

Because Idaho and Washington didn't have adequate habitat to support a viable grizzly population, they asked Canada to cooperate in the bear recovery effort. In 1988 and 1989, Canadian scientists joined the study team, and 21 grizzly bears were captured and fitted with radio collars in Canada.

Robert Wielgus, a University of British Columbia student, and Brad Compton, an Idaho Department of Fish and Game biologist, are monitoring the radio-collared bears to find out whether the grizzly population is increasing, decreasing or stable. They are learning how many cubs are born, how many bears die and what the causes are. They are also noting the bears movement patterns and how the bears use their habitat.

The researchers have tentatively determined that adequate numbers of cubs are being born into the Selkirk population. However, death rates for subadult and adult bears are higher than expected and population may be decreasing.

Of the 28 bears radio-collared by researchers, five have been illegally killed. Another grizzly died of unknown causes and one death occurred naturally. A 20-year-old female was apparently killed by an adult male in 1989.

According to current information, less than 20 grizzly bears primarily inhabit the U. S. side of the Selkirks. It will be another year before researchers have gathered enough information to estimate the number of grizzlies on the British Columbia side of the Selkirks.

Preliminary evidence indicates that both the British Columbia and U. S. bears comprise a single population. If that is proven true, then maintaining a viable population will require international coordination and cooperation.

Researchers have observed bears traveling frequently between the United States and British Columbia, some going quite a distance. One bear was found as far north as Kootenay Lake, B. C., and as far south as Priest Lake, Idaho, a distance of about 65 miles.

Wielgus and Compton will see if such long-distance movements are common, and if highways and roads affect the bear's travel. Extensive movements help prevent genetic inbreeding and allow bears to move from areas well-populated with grizzlies to less-populated areas with suitable habitat.

The habitats used most consistently by Selkirk grizzlies for food are alanche chutes, burned-over and clear-cut areas. The bears use timbered areas for security and bedding. Wielgus and Compton will try to find out what habitats are critical for bear survival at each time of year, identify foods provided by different habitats, and try to figure out the influence of current land management practices on habitat.

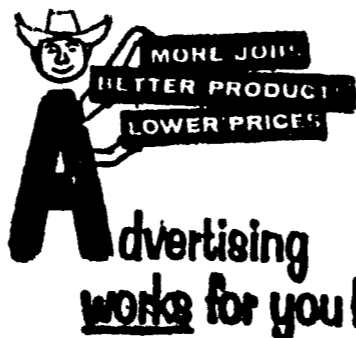
