A group of students from Kendrick High School, accompanied by Science Club advisor Colette Cozort, traveled to Boise Jan. 20 where they competed in the Boise State University Math/Science Day competition. The entire group did very well, and two KHS members claimed two awards. Ben Nye, son of Lloyd and Cynthia Nye of Juliaetta, qualified for a \$1,500 scholarship to BSU based on test scores in math and science. Then Nye and Ben Ellison won the team award in math and science for small schools. Ben Nye also won an individual prize in the math and biology competition and Brandon Bowen placed third highest individual in a physics and engineering competition.

Grange Seeks Ways to Improve Performance

At its last regular meeting on Jan. 16, Kendrick Grange No. 413 formally acknowledged the passing of one of its most faithful members, the late Dick Cuddy, by draping its Grange Charter. Memories of Dick's faithful service in the Grange and the high standards of performance he called for have done much to inspire a spirit to improve the Grange.

The same evening Kendrick also welcomed a new member into its ranks, John Peterson of Lewiston. He and Floyd Miller of Lapwai Grange, were given the obligation in the fourth degree by visiting Master of Lapwai Grange, Victor Haag.

Warney May and Ed Ulrich, representing the Block Watch program sought the help of the Grange in distributing a questionnaire among families served by the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Service. Their proposal may well help the Grange see its community project get underway. Their proposal was to be considered later by the membership.

That same evening, Betty Cowger was recognized for her outstanding contributions to women's activities on the state level. Betty, as chairperson of Kendrick's Women's Activities Committee, plays a vital role in the success of her local Grange as well, and especially in the area of fund raising. Forced to raise its dues by \$2.00 a year because of an increase on the national level, Kendrick's membership recognizes that nearly every last cent of its local dues goes to meet obligations to the Idaho State Grange and the National Grange. Given that fact, it's easy to see that the Grange runs on the dollars generated by the activities which Betty manages.

On Saturday afternoon, January 27, Betty Cowger hosted a "cookies and punch" awards program for all the youngsters who had participated in the toy making program last year. Every young needle artist received a ribbon for having participated, plus \$1.00 from Kendrick Grange, another \$1.00 from Pomona Grange, and a valentine. Hayley Heimgartner took home even more cash loot (another six dollars!), having taken first place for her toy in Pomona competition and second statewide.

January 30 the officers of the Grange met in a planning session to address a number of issues: How to improve the performance and significance of Grange ritual (a must for Dick Cuddy!), how to cut down on the length and "talkiness" of the business portion of a meeting, how to provide for more fun during meetings, and how to improve the programs presented by the Lecturer and others.

The group also reviewed a proposed budget and made some changes in it, chiefly to set aside funds to take care of certain maintenance needs in the Grange Hall, including the outside entryway, the roof, and restroom facilities. The revised budget was to be recommended to the membership for adoption at the meeting on February 6.

Involvement in ongoing Grange projects was reviewed and endorsed, including participating through the Master in the Gem State Community Project. Cooperation with the Block Watch program sponsors was affirmed by the leadership group and the leadership group and the decision made for the Grange to be helpers rather than designers of a program that will eventually help Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Service find and serve those in need of emergency care.

Potlatch Creek Bridge Closed to Truck Traffic

Commissioners of the South Latah Highway District this week closed the Potlatch Creek Bridge located 5 miles east of Kendrick to all truck traffic after the bridge received damage when someone crossed the bridge with a very heavy load. Highway Commissioner Jack Parsley said the action was taken Tuesday at a meeting of the District. The limits are effective immediately. Only cars, pickups and the school bus have been given permission to cross the bridge.

Reports are that the damage occurred when a truck hauling a D8 tractor crossed the bridge. This would have been a load of approximately 100 tons on a bridge with a ten-ton limit. Two stringers were broken, plus other structural damage.

Replacement of the bridge has been on the agenda of the Highway District for several years Parsley said Tuesday afternoon, but other projects were more pressing and had a higher priority. "Now it looks as if we're going to have to move the bridge up on the priority list," Parsley predicted.

With even the garbage-truck from Latah Sanitation now prevented from crossing the bridge, Parsley said arrangements are being made to place a dumpster at the south end of the bridge for use by area residents.

The district is also considering a "ford crossing" near the bridge that would permit trucks and other heavy vehicles to cross the creek until the bridge is replaced. This would involve getting permission from the state Water Resources Board in Coeur d'Alene. The Highway District is now attempting to contact the board to obtain permission.

Commissioners to Meet in Kendrick
The next regular meeting of the South Latah Highway District will be held in Kendrick, at the Fire Hall, on Tuesday, March 6, at 8:00 a. m. Sealed bids for purchase of rock by the district will be opened at 10 a. m.

At 1:30 p. m. the commissioners will meet with the Kendrick City Council and with the Nez Perce County Commissioners.

Highway District board meetings are open to the public and all interested persons are both invited and encouraged to attend.

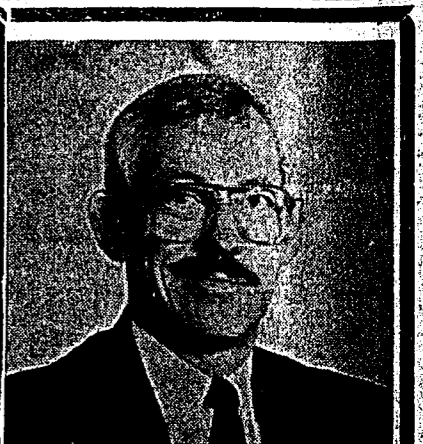
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THE PARSON'S CORNER

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
