Helen Heidenreich, local chairman of the Veterans of Foreign Wars National Home committee recently received a special award for the time and effort she has contributed to this project. The V. F. W. and its ladies Auxiliary sponsor a V. F. W. National Home in Eaton Rapids, Michigan that helps children of deceased or disabled veterans and Auxiliary members. There, children have the opportunity to live in a home with their natural parents, or houseparents, receive an education at local schools, and receive guidance for their future as active responsible citizens.

Nationwide, V. F. W. and Auxiliary members contributed \$199,946.85 to the Health and Happiness Christmas Cheer Fund for the home; \$87,597 for the upkeep of the homes, and \$122,

722 for the purchase of National Home Seals. In addition, gifts were given to graduating seniors and to the college graduates, plus the gifts given to all residents of the home at Christmas.

Under Helen's chairmanship, her committee raised \$75 to use for scholarship, Christmas and Home gifts and the Ladies Auxiliary of Baker-Lind 3913 matched these funds.

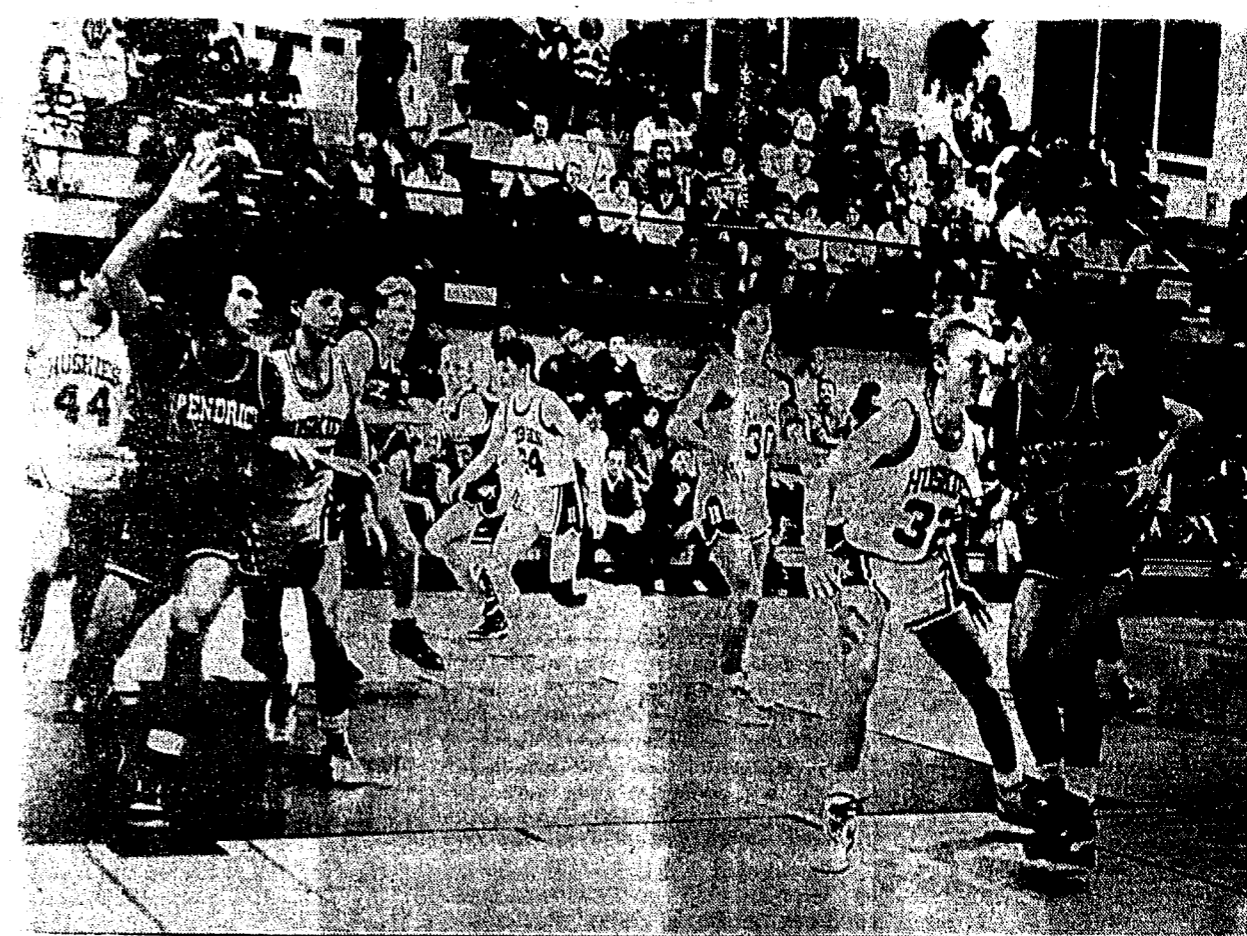
