Kendrick Students to Attend School at American Falls During Exchange Program

Anna Klatt and Ryan Blewett will be among a group of Latah County high school students who will be spending the week of March 10 to 16 at Power County High School in American Falls as part of a "Sister County" student exchange program. The project is in connection with the Idaho Celebration committee for the state's Centennial. Under the "Sister County" agreement, Power County and Latah will exchange about a dozen student each for one week. Latah County students will be selected from schools in Pottlatch, Genesee, Kendrick, Troy and Deary. Power County will select a similar group to send up to Latah County. The students will stay with host

families in the towns where they will be attending school for the week. The Latah County Celebration Committee has voted to give each school in the project \$100 to help pay for the cost of assembling a small display that will be shown in American Falls by the various students. David Klatt is Kendrick's representative on the Latah Celebration Committee and Sally Brownng is the Juliaetta representative. Anna is the daughter of David and Debbie Klatt of Kendrick. Ryan is the son of Bill and Rita Blewett. Ryan and Anna will leave March 10 and return home on the 18th.

Grange Master Urges Gratitude, Involvement in Gem Community Proj.

Kendrick Grange met February 20 to elect a new Pomona, appoint a Citizen of the Year committee, and hear reports on the various projects in which it's currently involved. The meeting followed a soup-and-sandwich supper served by Ruth White, Ross and Inez Armitage, and Don and Peggy Bateman.

Reporting as the Grange's representative to the Feb. 13 Gem Communities workshop on infrastructure improvement held at Kendrick's Senior Citizens Center, Master Frank Jacobson challenged members to urge all of their elected officials and business leaders in both communities to get behind and participate in the economic improvement project.

"Politics is the science of who gets what and when," Jacobson asserted, arguing that fear and a do-nothing attitude will stand in the way of realizing dreams for the future betterment of both towns, dreams on paper to which the Grange and other community groups have contributed.

Jacobson encouraged Grange members to express their appreciation to all the others who had also given a full day of their time to learning where communities can turn for help in improving their economy. Thank the mayors of both towns, he said, Harold Freeman and Jerry Brown; thank Harry Burmeister, head of the Kendrick/Juliaetta Community Development Association; thank business people Leasel Abrams, Donna Heinen, and Wally Butler; thank hostess for the day, Ruth A. White; and thank the "representative from Poverty Ridge," Rose Ann Holt. And ask, where are the others?

Using Kendrick's need for new sidewalks and an improved water delivery system as examples, Jacobson pointed out that communities interested in improving their hard infrastructure face three major problems: the fragmentation of responsibility, the fragmentation of financing, and the age of the infrastructure. In addition, the improvement of sidewalks and the water delivery system here relates to the complete redoing of the state highway. Before new sidewalks can be installed, the elevation of the highway (Main St.) must be properly lowered and before highway work can begin, new water pipes must be laid. As for the cost of either project, Jacobson said, it does no good to throw up one's hands and say, "Oh, the taxpayer just can't afford it." That's the position of those who refuse to face the hard work both of planning for improvements and that of seeking alternative ways to finance them. And that's what Gem Communities workshops are all about. And that's why, Jacobson said, eight local citizens spent a day learning about how the two communities can improve their infrastructures. They cannot, of course, do it all by themselves.

As for local roads and bridges, Dick Benjamin has almost completed the questionnaire for the National Grange project and will be reporting on his work at the next meeting. Warney May reports that he has acquired a 6-ft.x8-ft. map to use in assigning "blocks" to those interested in helping gather emergency information for the Juliaetta/Kendrick Ambulance Service. It was reported that the Brownie troop in Juliaetta had completed its mapping of the residences in that town, for which the Grange is most grateful.

Henny Reil was elected as the new Pomona and will be installed at the next meeting, March 6 at 7:30 p. m. Peggy Bateman, Maxine Foster, and Lawrence Helmgartner were appointed as a committee to name the Citizen of the Year, this time to represent the Kendrick area. The Grange contributed to underwriting the Young Woman of the Year program for this year.

Betty Cowger, already deep into planning for the Lewiston Grain Growers dinner on February 23, also had the program for the evening. Her two poems, "If You Really Want to Make It", and "You're a Winner", should have been dedicated to the 2 communities and their involvement in the Gem Communities project.

Steve was born and raised in Juliaetta and is the son Glen and the late Elizabeth Howerton. He graduated from Kendrick High School and attended the University of Idaho and Lewis-Clark State College before receiving his Master of Education degree from Oregon State University at Corvallis. He then taught for six years in the Oregon public school system and for three years in a private school.

Steve came back to the Kendrick-Julietta area where he pioneered the establishment of the Four Square Church located in Kendrick. He still serves as that church's pastor. He also became assistance maintenance man for Juliaetta at that time.

Mayor Harold Freeman of Juliaetta said the Juliaetta council is sorry to lose Howerton, but added, "We realize this is an advancement, and we wish him all the best."

Howerton is married to the former Betty Farrington and the couple have two children, Aundi, 13, and Tony, 9. About his new position, Howerton said, "I'm looking forward to it. It'll be a challenge."

The Howerton family will continue to make their home in Juliaetta, with the Kendrick council's approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 626
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING RATES AND FEES FOR SEWER SERVICES WITHIN THE CITY; PROVIDING THAT SECTION 16 OF ORDINANCE 529 BE REPEALED, PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase sewer rates to a level which will permit sewer revenues to equal the amounts expended for sewer service and improvements;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Section 16 of Ordinance No. 529 be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 2: That the following monthly rates, fees, and charges for sewer services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of February 1990:

A. Each account unless otherwise specified shall be charged a monthly rate of \$6.00.

B. Beauty shops, cafes, taverns, meat markets, frozen food lockers, and laundries shall be charged a monthly rate of \$12.00.

C. Public schools shall be charged a monthly rate of \$60.00.

D. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 25th day of each month.

E. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$.50 per month.

F. Churches, lodges, and civic organizations shall be charged a monthly rate of \$4.00.

G. The City may require a deposit of \$50 to insure payment of accounts.

Section 4: The rates and fees imposed by this ordinance shall be effective the first day of February, 1990. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage, approval and publication.

Littering Causes Concern For Steelhead Fishermen

Regional Conservation Educator In what may well go down as the best steelhead season in a decade, too many local fishermen are going home empty-handed. They return from a day's outing with fish in hand but little else. The shorelines of the Clearwater and Snake River are lined with litter and garbage left by unthinking anglers, according to Idaho Fish and Game creel census technician George Fischer.

"Littering has been a problem all season long, but now it is getting worse with the increase in the number of bank anglers," he said.

The variety of cast-off items and materials is endless, said Fischer, ranging from pop cans to styrofoam cups, tackle containers to fishing line. The latter occurs in staggering abundance, draping the banks nearly everywhere.

"Every week, I see miles and miles of monofilament line on spools, in big balls . . . it's truly amazing," he said.

In addition to tarnishing the reputation of fishing, such trash can do harm to wildlife. Discarded snarls of fishing line can entangle and kill ducks and geese that frequent the banks.

In his routine jetboat trips up and down the Clearwater to interview steelheaders, Fischer said he and his crew fill a garbage sack every day. Even amid the widespread trashing of the region's rivers, some acts stand out as particularly flagrant. Fischer said a common sight at boat ramps is entire six-pack beer cartons left in the sand, the slots filled with empty bottles.

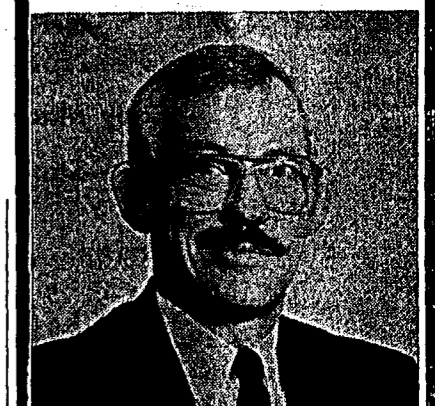
He also reminded anglers that littering is a violation of the law, and that conservation officers patrolling the river will be writing citations for it.
