THE PARSON'S CORNER Good Samaritan Food Bank Continues to Serve

The Disciples were so pressed by the amount of people who wanted to see them, that they didn't have the time to eat. Jesus then led them out to a desert place, hoping to be left alone. The crowds followed however, and Jesus spent the day teaching them. Now they were hungry. Philip led a delegation to Jesus to request that the crowds disband, so they could find food for themselves, but Jesus said, "No, you feed them." The astonished disciples scrambled to figure the cost, and determined that ten to fifteen thousand dollars would not be enough. With five thousand men plus women and children, each would only receive a token amount of food.

This story found in Mark, Chapter Six is amazing. The people were fed with plenty left over. Our hearts today are challenged by the words of Jesus, "You feed them."

Around four years ago, the Kendrick/Juliaetta community rose to the challenge and started the Good Samaritan Food Bank. Since then many families have been helped. This has been accomplished through your donations and the volunteer work of many. With no government help, the food bank not only has survived, but has grown. To say, "Job well done" is in order. Speaking for the families helped, I would like to say Thank You to the community.

"Good Sam's", as the food bank is called, was started by the church community and other concerned citizens. Some six or seven churches are represented on the board. The main intent was, and still is today, to help families through a crises until they can stand on their own or permanent help is arranged. Canned and dried foods are available at the center, and certificates are given for fresh foods at local stores. The bank also has on hand a variety of quality used clothing. Current store hours are Thursdays from 1 to 4 p. m. Christmas time is a major thrust. Names of families needing help are collected, then generous boxes of food are made up with toys for the little ones, finally the boxes are delivered. This thrust requires great resources in food, money, and manpower. The volunteers are to be commended for their efforts.

Support Needed for Idaho Pro-Gun Legislation

To all National Rifle Association members and outdoor sportsmen: At a time when many gun owners in other states are fighting anti-gun legislation, Idahoans have an opportunity to support and pass pro-gun legislation now pending in Boise, but we need a letter of support from you and your friends today!

Idaho Senate Bill 1535, sponsored by State Senator Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston, with the full support of the NRA, the Idaho State Rifle and Pistol Association, the Idaho Hunters Association, and the Gem State Sportsman's Association, will establish a process for mandatory issuance of a license to carry a concealed weapon for all Idahoans. Under current law, the decision whether to issue or deny a concealed carry license to a citizen rests solely on the total discretion of the sheriff of each and every county in the state.

There is no uniformity, there is no equity, and there is no recourse if you are arbitrarily denied! Under the new bill, SB 1535, proposed by Senator Sweeney, the NRA and other pro-gun organizations, if you are a law-abiding citizen and you do not have a criminal record or are not mentally unstable, then you have a right to self-protection. That basic right will no longer vary according to local politics and the whims of a powerful few!

CableVision Expands Microwave Transmitter

CableVision has recently completed an expansion of their microwave transmitter on Moscow Mountain. This expansion enabled CableVision to expand the channel capacity of the microwave, which feeds the communities of Potlatch, Princeton, Albion, Palouse, Pullman, Colton, Uniontown, Genesee, Juliaetta, Kendrick, and the Eastman Acre and Joel areas.

This new equipment addition enables CableVision to provide TNT to the outlying towns. Moscow and Pullman have been enjoying the sports and movies of the Turner Network Television channel for a couple of months now and CableVision is very pleased to be able to bring the same quality programming to all serviceable areas.

The new expansion of the microwave will also enable CableVision to provide KSPS, the PBS station from Spokane on channel 7 to Kendrick, Juliaetta and the Eastman Acre area outside of Moscow, and KWSU, the WSU station on channel 10 to Kendrick and Juliaetta. The new equipment will also upgrade the reception of KSPS to the towns of Genesee, Colton and Uniontown.

Walter Benscoter, Am. Ridge Pioneer, Dies March 2

American Ridge area pioneer Walter Robert Benscoter, 91, died Friday at his home on American Ridge near Kendrick. Cause of death was a gunshot wound, apparently self-inflicted.



He was born September 3, 1898, at Kendrick to Frank M. and Josephine E. Scott Benscoter. His parents had lived on American Ridge since 1886, when they moved from Ionia County, Michigan.

The Benscoter family maintained and supervised the American Ridge Telephone Co., until 1915, when the company was absorbed by the Potlatch Telephone Co.

He attended schools on American Ridge, then at Lewiston and Kendrick, graduating from Kendrick High School in 1917.

He married Ernestine Callison on Sept. 10, 1926, at Spokane. They settled on American Ridge where he farmed all his life.

He also served as director and claims adjuster of the Latah County Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Co., from 1963 to 1984.

He was a lifetime member of the Kendrick Grange No. 413.

Survivors include six daughters, Mary Beth McCall and Wilma Greene of Lewiston, Priscilla Armitage of Kendrick, Nita Webster of Plains, Mont., Judy Erwin of Bruneau, Idaho, and Diane Dupea of Orofino; a son, Jack Benscoter of Pullman, Wash. 19 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren.

His wife and two daughters died previously.

The funeral service was held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Ward Walker of Pullman officiating.

Burial followed at the American Ridge Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials may be given to the Kendrick-Julietta Ambulance Fund.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, TERMED 'ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL' APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITY OF THE CITY FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING ON THE FIRST DAY OF OCTOBER, 1989, AND ENDING ON THE THIRTIETH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1990; ALLOT- TING SAID APPROPRIATION FOR THE OBJECTS AND PURPOSES SET FORTH IN THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING THAT ORDINANCE NO. 624 BE REPEALED; PROVID- ING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, COUNTY OF LATAH, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: There is hereby appropriated out of any monies in the treasury of the City of Kendrick, Idaho, not otherwise appropriated, and out of any revenue which the City of Kendrick may acquire between the first day of October, 1989, and the thirtieth day of September, 1990, the following sums:
