Local 4-H Youth Attended State Conference

To discover how to use the system to effect needed change, Patricia Jeffries and Brian Silflow were among 150 students attending the annual "Know Your Government" Conference in Boise Feb. 17-19.

Gov. Cecil Andrus addressed conference delegates at a centennial dinner on Feb. 17, and Tom Boyd, Speaker of the House of Representatives, assisted with a mock session of the legislature.

LeRoy Luft, director of the UI Cooperative Extension System, addressed the delegation Feb. 19 at a breakfast where the legislators and judges joined the 4-H'ers.

Patricia and Brian, ninth and eighth graders, respectively, attended a legislative workshop on Feb. 18. In addition to the mock legislative session where each 4-H'er had the opportunity to play the role of legislator, lobbyist, or reporter, the legislative workshop gave delegates a

chance to discuss lawmaking with legislative personnel and lobbyists. Delegates watched an actual session of the Idaho Legislature on Feb. 19. Delegates attending a judicial workshop explored the legal process, observed a mock trial, and attended a workshop on the law and teenagers.

Patricia and Brian will continue to follow legislative affairs and will use the Know Your Government conference as part of the 4-H project, Exploring Citizenship.

The conference was hosted by the UI Cooperative Extension System and sponsored by Albertson's, Chevron USA, Matt Eames, Idaho Dairymen's Association, Idaho 4-H Endowment Fund, Idaho Law Foundation, Idaho Power Co., J. R. Simplot Co., Potlatch Corporation, Zack's Yogurt, The Idaho Farm Bureau Federation, and The Idaho Statesman.

Foster and Marek Slated to Speak Before Grange

Students Toby Foster and Jake Marek will address Kendrick Grange on the subject of substance abuse at its next regular meeting on Tuesday, March 20. The young men, who last year spoke on farm safety in preparation for 4-H competition, will make their presentation at 7:30 p. m. as part of the Lecturer's program, prior to the regular business meeting. The public is invited to hear them.

At its last meeting on March 6 the Grange draped its charter in memory of Walter Benscoter, a 25-year member. The Master installed Henry Reil as Flora. And, the membership accepted an application for membership, the candidate to be voted upon at the next meeting.

The Grange was delighted to find pianist Muriel Hubbard and storytelling husband Lowell back from their winter jaunt. Muriel as pianist does so much to make the ritual come alive!

Granges were urged by Betty Stone to contact their legislators regarding Idaho Senate Bill 1551, that would remove the tax-exempt status of Grange Halls. Ruth and Delores Helmgartner reported they had taken their "Bread in a Bag" program to the Orofino schools that day; 120 kids had the fun of making their own loaf of bread and at the same time learning something about the importance of wheat to the local economy.

Betty Cowger reported that the Grange had served dinner to sixty at the Lewiston Grain Growers meeting on February 23. She is currently organizing the Grange to serve at an upcoming auction.

Guidelines for selection of the Citizen of the Year were approved by the Grange. The committee held a brief meeting later that same evening. The committee, whose choice is final, was encouraged to name a recipient by March 20. The Citizen of the Year will be honored on April 17.

John Peterson, a Kendrick Granger and Grange Insurance agent, made a presentation regarding the current benefits provided by Medicare, pointing out at the same time that the patient must also bear a portion of the cost of medical treatment. Because those costs can be extensive, depending upon the illness being treated, it is prudent, said Peterson, for Medicare patients to carry some kind of supplemental insurance. He recommended that Grangers become informed about Medicare benefits and "comparison shop" for supplemental insurance.

The Lecturer's program included a reading by Dillard Stone, "Can You Remember When?" and another by wife Betty, "The Power of a Group of Real Volunteers." Master Frank Jacobson, trying to illustrate a point of Grange ritual, shut himself out of the Grange Hall and had a tough time of it working his way back in!

To conclude the evening, a lunch of two different and equally tasty potato salads and sandwiches was served up to a record crowd of thirty two Grangers by Ruby Craig and Esther Shreffler.

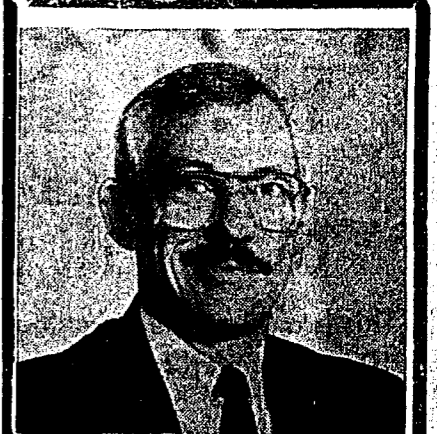
