Lisa Gravelle, the daughter of Paul and Carolyn Gravelle of Juliaetta, will be taking her final walk as Kendrick-Juliaetta Junior Miss on Saturday night, March 24th, at Kendrick High School.

This will mark the end of an era with the name Junior Miss and the premiere of its new beginning as Young Woman of the Year. The name-change of this program hopes to deter any pageantry image and focus people's attention on scholarship and being one's best self.

Last April, Lisa won the local Scholarship and Physical Fitness Awards, along with the honor of representing the community this past year. In November, at the Idaho State Program, she was a Preliminary Fitness Winner and among the top ten finalists. At both the local and state levels, Lisa has received at least \$1700 in college scholarship money.

For the last time Saturday night as Junior Miss, she will also perform, by popular request, her Creative and Performing Arts number. It is a self-composed flute duet entitled "Flammette de la Vie" (French for "Little Flame of Life").

This year's participants in the 1990-91 Young Woman of the Year program are Holly Barclay, Tina Ross, Erin Syverson, Shannon Tanata, Lianne Weyen, and Nicole Wilson. They will be judged in five categories: scholastic achievement; panel evaluations; creative and performing arts; fitness; presence and composure.

The theme is "Jukeybox-Jazz" with "the one and only" Chuck Lyons as host. Saturday night's program will begin at 7:30 p. m. in the Kendrick High School gymnasium.

Senior Citizen Tax Exemption Sign-up in J-K Area Is April 4

It is time to sign up for the Circuit Breaker, Senior Citizen Tax Exemption, reminded Assessor Steve Fiscus this week. The deadline for this sign-up is April 16.

There will be a representative from the Latah County Assessor's office at the Kendrick Senior Citizen Center on Wednesday, April 4 from 10 to 12 noon and at Juliaetta City Hall from 2 to 4 p. m. that same day.

If your income does not exceed \$14,410 and you are a widow or widower, 65 yrs or older, disabled or a disabled veteran, you may qualify for the exemption. This exemption must be applied for every year.

You will want to bring with you the following: A copy of your Federal Income Tax Form 1040, if you filed on your Social Security benefit statement form SSA-1099 stating the amount you received from Social Security; all medical expenses, including prescriptions and medical insurance premiums, and any medical expenses you paid for and were not reimbursed by medicare or insurance.

Please come into the Assessor's office in Moscow in the Courthouse if you cannot make either of these times.

Potlatch Telephone Company Plans Major Construction Project; New Lines Due

Potlatch Telephone Company, the phone utility that serves the Kendrick and Juliaetta communities, has set the stage for the largest construction project ever undertaken by the firm. Beginning in early May, Henkels & McCoy, a utility construction contractor, will begin installing more than 167 miles of new telephone cable.

"We've been putting our plans together for this project for the last year," said Jerry Brown, manager of the company. "The contractor was chosen by competitive bid. Henkels & McCoy was one of four contractors that submitted a bid on the project."

The construction program, which is expected to last 4 to 6 months,

will allow the company to provide all customers with private line service. A recent customer survey indicated that practically all customers who have a party line service would prefer a private line. "The convenience and security of a private line certainly make the service attractive," said Brown, "but there are other benefits, too. With private line service it's possible to subscribe to custom calling features and other services that make the phone much more valuable."

The construction program will have other side benefits. Since most of the new cable being installed will be buried more than two feet in the ground, service reliability will be improved immediately. In addition, transmission quality on local and long distance calls will improve for many customers once several aerial open wire lines are replaced.

The project also includes the installation of fiber optic cable. "We've put a plan together with U. S. West that will allow us to replace all of our existing long distance circuits in the next year or two with fiber optic cable," said the company manager. "Sometime within the next 24 months, our customers will be talking over a laser beam every time a long distance call is made." The high tech long distance circuits, in addition to providing high quality transmission service, will serve the company well into the 21st century.

By the end of November all of the company's customers will be hooked up to private line service, according to Brown. The entire project, which is expected to cost more than \$2 million, is being financed by the USDA's Rural Electrification Administration.

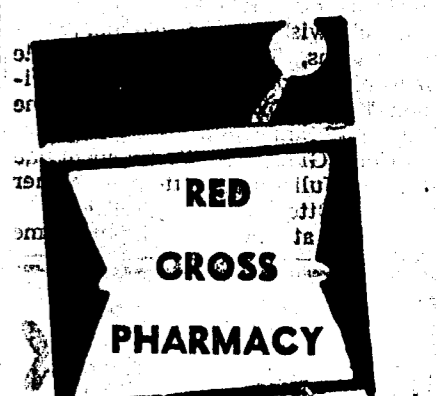
