Kendrick Grange Told Our Economic Bucket Has a Hole In It

Comparing the economy of the Kendrick/Juliaetta area to filling a bucket with water, Master Frank Jacobson on March 20 told Grange members that despite efforts to keep the bucket filled with the dollars flowing in from local basic businesses, the area is undoubtedly suffering severe "leakage" economically as local residents and businesses alike spend many of their dollars outside the community. "The bucket's got a hole in it," said Jacobson, "in fact, several!"

Reporting on the most recent Gem State Community workshop on business retention, expansion and development, held March 14 at the Knotty

Pine Inn, Jacobson said the chief advice given participants was, "Strive first for the economic health of what you have before you start thinking about expanding businesses in your community." Retail sales leakage is one of the principal sources of decline in a community's economy, Jacobson said, and the reasons for it need to be carefully analyzed. Businesses which fail to trade locally also contribute to the decline. Communities that are faithful to their own businesses discover that \$1.00 coming in from an outside source can become because of the so-called multiplier effect \$1.66 as citizens and businesses alike spend more dollars at home. Surveys of both local residents and businesses are recommended as one means of discovering the reasons for leakage, Jacobson said.

The group—represented locally by Leasel Abrams, Harold Freeman, Wally Butler, Ed Nelson, Ruth White, Rose Ann Holt, and Jacobson—was also urged to consider what the top priority goals for the community are: New job opportunities, economic growth, preserving the environment, improving the quality of life, or stopping the decline? If the latter, the alternatives include capturing existing markets (living the motto, "Try Kendrick/Juliaetta first!"), helping existing firms to become more efficient, and using local, state, and federal resources.

The next and concluding workshop will address economic diversification. After that, said Jacobson, the local improvement association, local citizens and businesses must, "fish or cut bait." The time for hand-wringing is coming to an end and that for a concerted effort to better understand and plan for economic development is at hand, he concluded.

Earlier that same evening Toby Foster and Jake Marek from the Cedar Ridge 4-H group demonstrated their growing maturity and competence as public speakers as they presented an informative and well-organized overview of drug and alcohol abuse. Their presentation was followed by a friendly but frank critique from audience members, which it is hoped will help them be even better prepared for 4-H competition on the county level. Enjoying it all were family members Sandi Flowers, Bud and Laura Adamson, Art and Maxine Foster, and Judy Foster, who captured the action on a camcorder.

It was reported by Manning Onstott that the project to gather family data for use by EMT personnel was approaching a successful conclusion, thanks to the perseverance of many community volunteers.

Near the close of the meeting, Don Bateman was presented a certificate of appreciation from the Grange for having faithfully served the people of Kendrick, helping make it a better place to live. Following warm applause from the membership, Don then received a certificate of recognition—having first been taught the secret sign of his office—as No. 1 Plumber of Kendrick Grange No. 413. (His one regret he was heard to remark later, was that he hadn't run the Master down on the streets of Kendrick when he'd had a chance all those years!)

The next meeting of Kendrick Grange on April 3 will see a new member joining the growing ranks of citizens promoting the welfare of the Juliaetta / Kendrick area. Charles Dammarrell will be given the obligation in the fourth degree. Officers are encouraged to review the ritual prior to the meeting.

Latah County Pomona will hold its annual Jamboree at Mountain Home Grange on Saturday, March 31, beginning with a potluck at 6:30 p. m. (meat dish furnished by the host Grange). Each Grange is to have a 5-7 minute program ready for competition and is to furnish two cakes for the cakewalk.

Lianne is the daughter of Dean and Cathy Weyen of Kendrick and received an \$800 scholarship with the title. She also received scholarships of \$150 in the scholastic achievement category and \$50 in the presence and composure category.

The participants were judged in five categories: panel evaluations, scholastic achievement, creative and performing arts, fitness and presence and composure.

First alternate Erin Syverson was awarded a \$300 scholarship. Her parents are Roger and Sue Syverson of Kendrick. In addition to this

Park News

Dan and Sue Willis lost most of their possessions Sunday morning when their home on the Park Ranch burned. A faulty chimney flu is the suspected cause of the fire that left only the outside walls of the house standing. The house, known as the Ringsage house, was built by members of the Swenson/Ringsage family before the turn of the century, and stood on the hill north of the Park Ranch house. The construction of the house was unique in that it was built of hand hewn logs, dovetailed to fit at the corners. The roof was of hand split shakes and the interior was plastered with "dung and wattle" (mud and straw), mixed together by a method one of the early Swensons was taught by a native of the Ukraine, he had met in Canada. In later years, the outside of the house was shingled and painted. It remained in the ownership of first one then another of the Swenson/Ringsage family until it was sold to Park Ranch, Land and Cattle Co. in about 1987.

Sue was in the house alone when fire was discovered and was unable to summon help because the CB cable was near the point of origin on the roof and melted. Dan and Amos Bechel were working at the feeding pens a half-mile southeast of the house when Dan noticed the smoke and both men went to help. Deary
