Kendrick Grange Advises Master to Skip the Ceremonies

Fired up by a Lewiston Tribune news story on the \$30,000 price tag for the inauguration of Elisabeth Zinser as the 14th President of the University of Idaho, Kendrick Grange last week unanimously recommended that its Master not attend the ceremonies held on April 7. Frank Jacobson, scheduled to represent the Idaho State Grange, decided after conferring by phone with State Grange Master Don Johnson not to attend.

The cost of the affair was not the only issue discussed at the Kendrick Grange meeting on April 3. The remarks of the inauguration's coordinator, Edmund M. Chavez, as reported in the Tribune, also drew fire. Justifying the expense as "not fluff at all," Chavez said it was one of the few opportunities, "where Average Joe from Genesee can say, 'Hi, how are you, Dr. Zinser?'" In the view of the Grange, the so-called average Joes of small town Idaho have more important things to do—like doing the hard, dedicated work of improving the economy of rural Idaho, upon whose health both the University and Dr. Zinser depend.

In other business, the Grange heard reports on the death of Idaho Senate Bill 1551 (requiring Granges to apply every other year for property tax exemption) and on the successful auction lunch headed up by hardworking Women's Activities Chairman Betty Cowger. Legislative Chairman Dillard Stone reported that Larry Vincent and Deanna Vickers both had responded regarding Grange opposition to the Senate bill. And Ross Armitage, commenting on the success of the auction lunch project, said, "Pies don't last, but they sure are good."

Ruth White reported progress on the application to enlarge the Senior Citizens Center by means of a grant arranged through the agency of the Clearwater Economic Development Association. White credits the Gem Community Project with having made her aware of the availability of funds and the process used in applying for them. Way to go, Seniors!

A pinochle session following the business meeting saw Betty Cowger and Harlan Fey, "blooming good players," win spring bedding plants for their top scores, while Marie Fey and Lowell Hubbard, for obvious reasons, each took home a bag of onion sets. Dillard Stone, that old pro, also won bedding plants for having been the evening's only holder of the goose. The serving committee—the Wayne Heimgartners, the Leslie Heimgartners, and Millie Corkill—provided all the makings for a do-it-yourself lunch. Tasty!

The Grange will next meet on April 17, hosting a public supper to honor citizens of the year, Dave and Barbra Clayton. Scheduled for 6:30, the planned potluck will see Grangers and visitors bringing vegetables and salads. Special guests are to bring only their appetite.

Marcella E. Wilson Passes April 9

Marcella E. Wilson, a Kendrick homemaker, died Monday, April 9, at her home of a heart attack. She was 74.

She was born December 27, 1915, at Moscow to Arl and Cora Weatherby Burns. The family lived at Linville, Idaho, a small community near Moscow, until she was 13 when they moved to Juliaetta.

She attended high school at Juliaetta, graduating as salutatorian in 1934. She moved to Moscow, where she received her two-year teaching degree from the University of Idaho in 1936.

She and Lawrence Wilson were married at Moscow Sept. 14, 1936. They moved to Southwick in 1941, where they stayed for two years before moving to Council, Idaho.

They left Council in 1946, moving to Midvale, Idaho, then to Farmington, Wash. in 1950. They remained at Farmington for four years, then moved to Touchet, Wa., where they also lived for four years. In 1958, they moved to Asotin remaining there until 1967.

They lived at Colton from 1967 to 1970. They settled at Kendrick in 1970.

She was a member of the Farmington Flower Club and the Granges at Touchet, Asotin, Colton and Kendrick. She enjoyed sewing and making wedding dresses.

Survivors include her husband at the family home; two daughters, Marlene C. Snyder of Juliaetta and Lorene Ellis of Clarkston; a son, Larry Arl Wilson of Pomeroy; a brother, Bob Burns of Nampa, three sisters, Virginia Splyan of Spokane, Jean Parks of Corvallis, Ore., and Betty Heimgartner of Juliaetta; nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

The funeral will be held Thursday at 2:30 p. m. at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston. The Rev. Howard Neal of the Pomeroy Christian Church will officiate.

Kendrick Council Met Tuesday Evening

A variety of subjects were discussed at the monthly meeting of the Kendrick city council held Tuesday evening, April 10. Topics ranged from dogs running at large to the renewal of Washington Water Power's utility franchise with the city.

The Tuesday meeting was presided over by Mayor Jerry Brown. All council members: David Klatt, Darrel Brocke, Rita Blewett and Mike Boe were present. Also in attendance were clerk Donna Goff and maintenance man Steve Howerton.

The council reviewed and renewed its utility franchise agreement with Washington Water Power Co. The old agreement had expired in March. The agreement gives W. W. P., for another 25-year period, permission to build and maintain power lines in the City of Kendrick.

The council has set May 2 to 9 as "Clean-Up Week" in Kendrick. This is meant to coincide with the annual state-wide clean-up day on May 5. The week is also intended to encourage residents to get the town ready for the annual Locust Blossom Festival.

It is understood that the city will attempt to arrange for a large dumpster to be available during the week for the use of local residents.

On a similar note, the city wishes to remind local people that they should not put leaves and grass clippings on the city's burn pile near the school. The piles of leaves and grass clippings will not burn well, and only build up a smoldering, smoldering mess. Leaves and clippings should be put in containers (bags, boxes, etc.) and left for the weekly pick up by Latah Sanitation.

With the coming of spring when local people start working and taking more notice of yards and gardens, the complaints of dogs running at large are again being received by the city. This is always a problem and a headache for any city council as it attempts to tread a narrow line between being too heavy-handed in the enforcement of ordinances and at the same time trying to see to it that no one's property is damaged. The city does wish to remind pet owners that there is a year-round leash law in Kendrick and that dog licenses are required. These may be obtained from the clerk at city hall. Basically it's a matter of being a considerate citizen and neighbor.

The council also reviewed two reports concerning water. The city received the results of a water survey on its water system from the State of Idaho Dept. of Health and Welfare. The system was found to be in good condition, considering its age. A few minor problems were found which are now being corrected by the city.

A report from the Army Corps of Engineers on a recent levee inspection was also reviewed by the council. The report indicated that the levee on Potlatch Creek was found to be in good condition. The city is responsible for cleaning the brush and small trees from the levee.

It was also reported that the city will receive the sum of \$200 from the Latah Local Celebrations Committee. The city will use the funds to plant a Centennial Tree and install a park bench.

Juliaetta's "Chicken Co-op" Offers A Variety of Products and Services



One of the newest businesses in the valley is the Chicken Co-op in Juliaetta. It is owned and operated by Gary and Sally Browning and is located in the former Juliaetta Market building which is owned by Harry and Donna Burmeister who still make their home in the upstairs apartment.

Sally has a delightful variety of gifts, some of which are produced by local crafts people. She now has cut flowers and potted plants and offers delivery here in the local area. The Chicken Co-op also is a state Fish and Game license vendor and sells fishing and hunting items. The store also sells lottery tickets has a copy machine for public use, and have just acquired a fax machine that will be available for public use. They carry a variety of helium and latex balloons and also do weddings and parties.

The building that houses The Chicken Co-op was once owned by Mrs. Browning great-uncle, Culver Richardson and was known as the Richardson - Groseclose General Store. The early owners originally owned a store next door that burned down. They then moved into the Juliaetta Market building.

The Chicken Co-op had its beginning almost five years ago when

five women: Betty Howerton, Debbie Ackerman, Elaine Groseclose, Iris Eckroth and Sally Browning, started the firm as a co-op and as time went on they each found other jobs or commitments. After a short closure Gary and Sally re-opened the firm in December of 1988.

Business hours are 9 to 5:30 on Monday through Friday and from 9 to 4 Saturday and Sunday. The store has a few parttime employees in addition to Gary, Sally and daughter Glynna. Iris Eckroth helps doing flower arranging and corsage making as well as general work at the store. Syrina Groseclose works after school and Robin Sandino fills in on occasion.

Gary and Sally would like to take this opportunity to thank the communities for their support. The owners and staff enjoy the people of the community and the children who stop in the store to visit. The Brownings are getting new inventory all the time and plan on extending their fishing and hunting equipment line. They are also in the process of obtaining wire service for their flower department.

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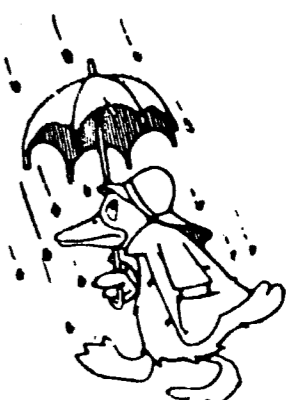

THE PARSON'S CORNER

ALIVE

All around him it was silent as people gazed with great intensity. What would happen next? The stone in front of the tomb now rested to the side, revealing a dark, cold stagnant smelling hole. Jesus poised Himself directly in front of the cavern containing death. Lazarus was now dead for over four days, his flesh mostly decomposed. Then came a loud cry from the lips of Jesus, "Lazarus come forth!" Breathing paused while every eye fixed itself on the tomb. As a figure, bound hand and foot began to emerge, mouths dropped open. The words of Jesus spoke with such force that the body of Lazarus, laden with over 100 pounds of ointment, was literally carried to the opening of the cave. Those words rebuked the decay in his flesh and brought warm pulsating blood and the breath of life. Lazarus, unwrapped by the command of Jesus, stood alive!

How could Jesus speak, and have death obey? Our Bibles tell us in Hebrews 2:14 "Forasmuch then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, He also Himself likewise took part of the same; that through death He might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil." Jesus could speak that way because He was to destroy the devil who had the power of death. This Sunday is set aside to strongly consider the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Before Jesus came out of the grave, He hung on a cross and died. In that death He literally blew death right out of the water. Death no longer has it's power.

Physical death is not the only death that people can experience. Many of us are experiencing a living death. That death might involve wanting desperately to be free from alcohol, but trapped. Death comes by way of our emotions as well. Life becomes tormenting death, with bruises in the heart from people we trusted. Death brings depression from shame and guilt, making heads hang low. The list of living deaths goes on and on. Which one has come to you.

Jesus has destroyed death, coming out of the grave! His words are as powerful now as they were when He stood before Lazarus' tomb. He calls us now to "Come Forth!" To come forth from the living death that holds our lives. Surrender your life to Him, and join Him in His resurrection this Easter.
