Grange Week Kickoff Honors The Claytons

Anticipating the celebration of Grange Week across the nation by a few days, Kendrick Grange at a festive supper on April 17 honored Dave and Barbara Clayton as Community Citizens of the Year for 1990. Rick, Mariann, and Cindy Chase were special guests for the celebration.

Following the main course, Marlann cut and served generous portions of a decorated cake commemorating the occasion. Master Frank Jacobson presented the Claytons with a certificate citing them as very special people in the community; he also presented them with a marble paperweight bearing the Grange logo and inscribed with their names.

Having read National Grange Master Robert E. Barrow's proclamation of Grange Week by way of introduction, Jacobson pointed out that the Claytons, while not themselves Grangers, exemplify in their private and business lives the importance that Grangers place on improving the quality of life in rural America and in recognizing the value of community service. The Claytons, Jacobson said, have a long history here of "going the extra mile" as the owner-proprietors of the Red Cross Pharmacy and as contributors to the civic life of the Kendrick-Juliaetta community.

Main Street Clock Will be Back Soon

Thanks to Frank Abrams and the Kendrick City Council, Main Street will soon have its clock back. The clock has not been in use since First Security Bank replaced its sign a couple of years ago. The clock was part of the bank's sign, but the bank replaced it with a huge, red emblem that had no timepiece.

Bank manager Dirk Hammond, not wanting to junk out the old clock, gave it to the city, if they wanted it. The city did want it, but it took a couple of years to get around to finding a place for it.

Several locations were suggested, but the decision to put the clock in front of Abrams Hardware was finally made. Last Saturday Frank completed pouring the concrete foundation to support the base and installed the necessary hardware to hold the base and pole. The metal pole came from Moscow where it was used as a street light holder. The power will come from the nearby street lights and an electric "eye" will illuminate the clock during periods of darkness.

The clock, if you remember, is about 36 inches square and will be 14 feet above the street.

Frank said Monday that final installation will be made when the concrete foundation cures properly, a couple of weeks.

Drug Abuse Program Begins at KHS May 2

Parents of students in junior high school should realize what a critical age 13 through 16 is for their children. It is during these years that many of our youth begin to experiment with drugs. This is particularly true for a child in the 8th grade.

Many adults feel that the issue of drug abuse does not apply to them or their family. However, every child in Latah County will have to face the issue themselves at some point during their most impressionable school years. For many children curiosity and pressures that are exerted by their peers to participate in the experimentation with drugs can be too great if they do not have a solid understanding about the problems and ramifications of drugs such as PCP, LSD, THC, and even alcohol.

These drug abuse program classes are beginning May 2 at KHS and each Wednesday for the next three weeks from 7 to 9 p. m. at the high school. School officials hope parents will attend these sessions with their child or children. Participation will enable parents to answer responsibly their child's questions about the use and abuse of drugs.
