Community Development Association Faces Up to Hard Work of Planning

The Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association met for breakfast in the Town and Country Diner on April 24 and began under the leadership of Harry Burmeister to make plans for the next phase of the Gem Community project. Having participated in the four required workshops offered for participating communities the Kendrick-Juliaetta group is considered ready to begin work on an application for certification as an Idaho Gem Community.

An application for certification must include the following: the community's long term (three to five) year plan for economic development, an infrastructure improvement plan, a business retention/extension plan, and an economic diversification plan (the subject of the final workshop held at Cottonwood on April 18). In addition a one year plan of action is required, listing high priority issues and strategies from the long term plan and assigning responsibility and time tables to each strategy. Also required are a community profile containing demographic and other data, a land and building inventory, and a statement identifying the proposed use of a matching \$10,000 grant from the State of Idaho, one of the many advantages of being certified as a Gem Community.

The association at the April 24 meeting asked its newest member, Frank Acobson, to write the foregoing application. Jacobson declined, saying that writing the application is only the final, technical step in a thorough process of deciding where the association wants to see community go in terms of economic development. The hard work of gathering data and making these decisions rests with members of the association, the local city governments, and other community leaders. Jacobson agreed initially to coordinate the work of these forces and called for high priority commitment to regularly scheduled work sessions to begin putting the nuts and bolts of the plan together. The second and fourth Tuesday evenings of the month appeared to be the most likely time slot for this vitally important effort.

Tuesday evening then, May 8 at 7:00 in Kendrick's Centennial Center will see the kickoff meeting of a group committed to drafting the application for certification. Anyone who attended any of the workshops or who is willing to contribute is welcome to join in and should review the Gem Community manual, especially those portions dealing with the certification process. Additional copies of the manual will soon be available at Abrams Hardware.

National Former POW Recognition Day Proclaimed April 9

Legislation designating April 9, 1990 as "National Former Prisoner of War Recognition Day" was signed into law recently by President Bush, reported Lee Halseth, president of Baker-Lind Post 3913, Auxillary, Veterans of Foreign Wars, in Kendrick, Idaho.

Walter G. Hogan of Greenfield, Wisconsin, National Commander-in-Chief of the 2.1-million member Veterans of Foreign Wars praised the efforts of Congress in its quick approval of the resolution which honors all Americans of all wars who were captured.

The VFW leader said, "Setting aside this day to remember former prisoners of war is but a small tribute to the service, sacrifice and the painful uncertainties endured by them, their loved ones and the nation."

Hogan, a Korean War veteran, noted that the VFW has pursued, through its resolution process, an aggressive program to recognize POWs as well as accounting for those still Missing in Action.

In January, Hogan announced that the Secretary of the Navy had approved awarding of the POW Medal to crew members of the USS Pueblo following a two-year effort led by the VFW and Kansas Congressman Jim Slattery. The crew of the USS Pueblo were held captive 11 months following their seizure by North Korea in 1968.

When a local EMT serves his or her turn with the radio, they are most effectively committed to be available for immediate response 24 hours a day.

Alpha Frances Proconier, 86, a lifelong Troy, Idaho, resident, died Saturday, April 28, at her home of causes related to age.

She was born Jan. 15, 1904, at Troy, the daughter of Daniel and Ressa Roberts Helm. She grew up on the family farm and attended the Bond country grade school outside of Troy. She graduated from Moscow High School.

She married Melvin Thomas Proconier Jan. 31, 1924, at Troy. They farmed on American Ridge in Latah County for many years.

He died July 23, 1979. She was an active member of the Troy Lutheran Church, the Troy Grange, Moscow Rebekah Lodge, Christian Ladies Aid Society, the Bethel Club and the Senior Citizens.

Survivors include a daughter, Roberta Swenson of Spokane; a son, Gerald M. Proconier of Spokane, a brother, Monte Helm of Troy; a sister Rose Hatley of Pullman; five grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

Two brothers preceded her in death.

The funeral was held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at Short's Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Ryon Hansen of the Troy Lutheran Church officiating. Burial followed at the Moscow City Cemetery.

Daniel Warren, 84, Brother of Grace Ingle, Passes in California

A Moscow resident from 1940 to 1969, as State 4-H Leader, Daniel Warren, 84, died at his Palm Desert, Calif., home of age related causes April 24.

He graduated from the University of Idaho in 1927. He taught at Rupert, and joined the University Extension Service as District Agent at Burley. He served as county agent at Malad and Payette before becoming State Youth Leader for the Extension Service. Supt. Answers Questions About May 15 Election

As we get closer to Tuesday, May 15, school election day, there are 2 school issues that face some school zones and one that affects all school zones. In Zones 2 (Kendrick) and 3 (North Juliaetta and adjoining Rural areas) a trustee election will be held with incumbents Joyce Clemenhagen and Bud Henson running in each zone respectively. In all zones a 2-year supplemental maintenance and operation "override levy" will be held. The two (2) year supplemental levy will replace and reduce the present two year supplemental levy \$75,000 (1988-89) to \$64,000 (1990-91) and \$65,000 (1989-90) to \$63,000 (1991-92). Because of this up-coming election, Supt. Eldon Taylor has compiled some questions and answers that might better explain the issues.

Question:
Does lowering the levy amounts mean we should see a lowering of our property taxes?

Answer:
Yes. There should be an ever so slight decrease on the school taxes that make up your total property taxes that also include county and city taxes if that applies to your given situation. As far as the school portion of your total property tax you do have the 1987 state school equalization flooring law that causes districts to level up their tax rate from .0030 to .0036 over a 5-year period in order to get the maximum state funds through the equalization formula. While this law which will continue for 2 more years runs counter to any decision a local board of trustees may make reducing levy amounts, the net result to Kendrick patrons should either be a "push" or a very slight decrease. The gray area between the "push" and a very slight decrease depends upon what happens to the total market value of a given district in a given year which is determined by the county assessor's office. This school district certifies to the counties a given dollar figure (in this case \$64,000 for 1990-91 and \$63,000 for 1991-92) and then the county-assessor's office and tax commission fine tune the tax levy amount to the millionth (6 places) of a decimal.

Question:
If you did not vote in the last school or general election or have moved, do you have to register?

Answer:
Yes. As of 1987 you do have to register in school elections if you did not vote in the last school election or a state or federal general election. You may still register until 8:00 p. m., Friday, May 4 at your county auditor/recorder's office. You may pick up registration cards at your local precinct registrar or at the county recorder's office. By the time this Gazette comes out you had better return the registration card to the county recorder's office because they have to be in the hands of the recorder by 8:00 p. m., May 4 to insure that your name will appear on the county computer check list that are sent out to the polling places.

Question:
Is there some risk in running a 2-year override supplemental levy?

Answer:
A qualified Yes. The risk is in the second year that is caused by a "storm cloud" in Boise not Kendrick. This "storm cloud" is a funding equity shift movement brought on by 11 of the larger Idaho school districts (not Lewiston, Moscow, or Boise school districts because they, like 52 to 55+ smaller districts including Kendrick would be badly hurt financially by the results of such a shift). This funding equity shift by the 11+ large school districts and encouraged by State Supt. of Instruction Jerry Evans and his assistant Gus Hein surfaced in 2 different bills this last legislature and was defeated by north Idaho Legislators. However, more than likely there will again be another attempt next legislature by the same 11+ districts plus a lawsuit over this issue filed in late May or June.

Since this legislature set the state appropriation for next year, the local implications are known for next year as far as a 2-year override. It is that second year of it that this funding equity issue could become a concern. Should this lawsuit be filed it would be worthy of a series of question and answer Gazette articles from the school superintendent this summer versus now which could confuse the current election issues.
