Phil Bahr, 83, Retired Area Cattleman Passes

Phil Bahr, a retired Kendrick area cattleman, died Sunday night at his home in Lewiston of cancer. He was 83.

Bahr was named cattleman of the year for Latah County in 1989. He served as president of the Kendrick Cattle Association and was a commissioner for the Latah County Cattleman's Association for eight years. He also was a member of the Kendrick Grange.

Bahr had been a communicant at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church since 1982.

He was born Nov. 21, 1906, at Creston, Wash., the son of Leonard and Pauline Labor Bahr. He attended grade school at Creston before moving to this area.

He married Mary Konen at Lewiston May 3, 1927. She died January 8, 1988.

Survivors include a daughter, Wanita Arnett of Lewiston; three sisters, Louise Miller of Mohler, Wa., Harriet Kafka of Solone Beach, Ca., and Helen Silvers of Weaverville, Ca.; two brothers, Herb Bahr and Elmer Bahr, both of San Leandro, Ca.; five grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

A brother, Walter Bahr, died previously.

School Elections Tuesday, May 15

Next Tuesday, May 15 voters in Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 will go to the polls to vote on a two-year Maintenance and Operation over-ride levy in all zones, and, in addition, two zones: No. 2 (Kendrick) and No. 3: (North Juliaetta and surrounding rural areas) with incumbents Joyce Clemenhagen and Bud Henson both seeking re-election. Three additional questions asked school superintendent Eldon Taylor are as follows:

Question:
How much will lowering the M&O Over-Ride reflect our tax bill?

Answer:
A "Yes" vote will decrease taxes by 2c per thousand of assessed market value for the 1990-91 fiscal year and 4c per thousand for 1991-92 fiscal year in comparison to this fiscal year if all else stays constant. Thus a \$100,000 assessed market value of farmland would see a \$2 reduction the first year and a \$4 reduction the second year. A 50,000 home with home owners exemption using a \$5,000 lot value would see a 44c savings the first year and a \$1.10 savings the second year.

Question:
Where will the polling places be for the election?

Answer:
Because of the Idaho code requirement that a polling place within each county be designated, there will be 4 polling places open Tuesday, May 15 from 12:00 p. m. (noon) to 8:00 p. m.—Juliaetta Elementary School and Kendrick High School for Latah County (Zones 1, 2, 3 and 4), Cameron Lutheran Church in Nez Perce County (Zone 5), and the Albert Lawrence Home (Zone 5) in Clearwater County.

What is your greatest concern about the election?

Answer:
Apathy. Everyone will think that the election is a foregone conclusion and no one takes the extra effort to come out and vote!

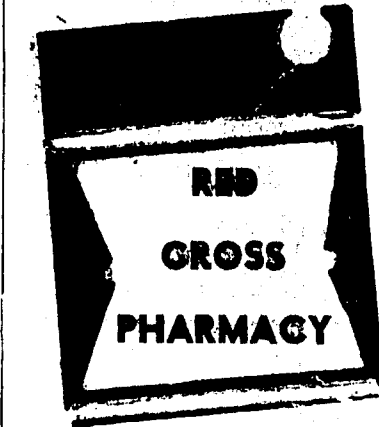
