If you have any of the warning signals, Gladys suggested that you make an appointment with your doctor. She also recommended that women learn the proper techniques for self-examination of breasts.

Gladys has been conducting a penny drive at each meeting for the year and the total reached \$32.95. This will go to cancer aid and research.

Harold F. Abrams, 74, Former Area Resident, Claimed by Heart Attack

Harold F. Abrams, 74, died Saturday, May 5, 1990, at Sequim, Wash. of heart failure. He was born November 5, 1915, on Texas Ridge near Kendrick to Millie and Frank Abrams. He was educated in Linden and Kendrick schools, graduating from high school in 1933. He worked in various logging camps, and was a log scaler for many years.

He married Leah Butler June 25, 1938 and they lived in Juliaetta until 1948 when they moved to Port Angeles, Wash. This marriage ended in divorce. After thirty years of service he retired from Crown Zellerbach at Port Angeles in 1979. He was a member of the union, and past member of the Port Angeles Eagles Club.

He married Dorothy Smith in Port Angeles Sept. 9, 1972. Along with his wife he is survived by four children, Gary Abrams of Alaska, and Gwendolyn Boggs, David Abrams, and Judith Rudd of Port Angeles; a brother, Frank Abrams of Kendrick, and two sisters, Faye Stephens of Lewiston, and Ethel Wagner of Walla Walla, Washington. He was preceded in death by a sister Verla Nelson. Other survivors include four step-children, Carl Anderson, Anna Molina, Carol Anderson, and Peggy Roston of Sequim; 21 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

The body was cremated and a memorial service will be held at a later date.

Override Levy Approved; Trustees Re-Elected Tuesday

The administration and trustees of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 received a resounding vote of confidence Tuesday, May 15 when voters in the district went to the polls and approved the passage of a 2-year override levy for a supplemental maintenance and operation levy by an 88 percent "Yes" vote, and also re-elected two incumbent trustees for terms of three years.

A total of 172 votes were cast at the four polling places in the district for the M&O levy. Of these ballots cast, 151 were Yes votes; 19 were No, and 2 ballots were void.

Trustee Joyce Clemenhagen was returned for another 3 year term by the voters of Zone 2 with 38 votes.

Supt of Schools Dr. Eldon Taylor said he and board of trustees were very grateful for the support they received at the Tuesday election. "It's a great feeling," Taylor said, "and we appreciate it!"

Kendrick/Juliaetta Economic Development Assoc. Seeks Gem Community Status

An ad hoc planning committee of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Economic Development Association has begun work on the application to be certified as a Gem Community by the Idaho Department of Commerce. (An ad hoc committee is, by definition, one limited to completing a specific task.)

Meeting for the first time on the evening of May 8, the committee defined its task and began organizing itself for work. The group will provide the following components of the application for certification: the long term (3-5 year) infrastructure improvement plan, the long term business retention/expansion plan, the long term economic

diversification plan, a one year plan (consisting of high priority items selected from the preceding long term plans), and a plan for using matching grant funds from the State of Idaho (up to \$10,000).

The committee has referred three other components of the application back to the association's leadership for completion by others: A long term organizational plan, a community profile (demographic and other statistical data), and a building and land inventory. Subsequently, at a meeting of the association at noon in the Firehall last Thursday, Dirk Hammond — presiding in place of vacationing Harry Burmeister, asked that the committee recommend names of those who could complete these portions.

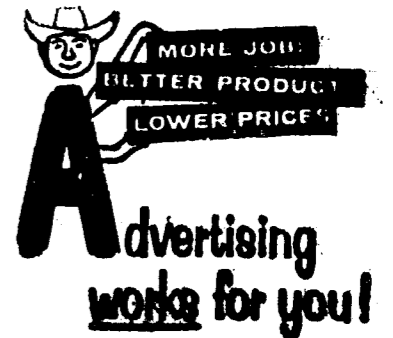

SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. 628
 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, IDAHO, GRANTING A FRANCHISE TO THE WASHINGTON WATER POWER COMPANY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF FACILITIES WITHIN THE CITY OF KENDRICK; PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.
 A summary of the principal provisions of Ordinance No. 628 of the City of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, passed and approved on April 10, 1990, and repassed and approved on May 8, 1990, is as follows:
 Section I: Grants to Washington Water Power Company, a Washington corporation, a Franchise to construct and maintain facilities for distributing electricity on the public property and rights of way of the City.
 Section II: Sets the term of the Franchise at 25 years.
 Section III: Permits the Grantee to trim and remove trees, brush and shrubs interfering with Grantee's installations.
 Section IV: Permits Grantee to excavate under public property and rights of way to construct facilities.
 Section V: Provides that all installations done by Grantee shall not interfere with existing public facilities.
 Section VI: Provides for construction of Grantor in the vicinity of Grantee's installations.
 Section VII: Provides for emergency removal by Grantor of Grantee's installations.
 Section VIII: Provides the Grantor may make reasonable rules and regulations pertaining to the conduct of Grantee's business.
 Section IX: Provides that the Grantee may enter upon its customer's properties for the purpose of installing, servicing and maintaining its facilities.
 Section X: Provides Grantee's rights should property be vacated by Grantor.
 Section XI: Preserves Grantor's right to control public property.
 Section XII: Provides that the grant be non-exclusive.
 Section XIII: Provides for forfeiture should Grantee violate or fail to comply with provisions of the Franchise.
 Section XIV: Provides for expansion of Grantee's facilities.
 Section XV: Provides for notice of changes in boundaries by the Grantor.
 Section XVI: Provides that this Franchise shall update and supersede all prior franchises between the parties.
 Section XVII: Provides for transfer assignment of the Franchise.
 Section XVIII: Provides that the remaining portions of this ordinance shall not be affected should any provision be held invalid or illegal.
 Section XIX: Provides that this ordinance shall have the effect of a contract between the parties.
 Section XX: Provides that Grantor and Grantee shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless one another from damages.
 Section XXI: Provides that Grantee may abandon this Franchise.
 Section XXII: Provides for acceptance of the Franchise by the parties.

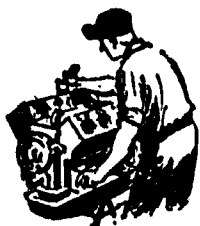
