said. "We are investing an addiitonal \$2 million here to improve our service and to provide all single party line connections," stated Brown. "It is very important to have everyone in the same room at the same time so that this project can be

Actual trenching work will begin now as the project moves from the engineering and staking phases into placing the new cables underground. The project is scheduled to be completed over the next 5 to 6 months. 
