## 6th Grade Learns Heritage Project

As part of the Centennial Heritage being carried out in all the classes this school year at Juliaetta Elementary, the sixth graders have constructed a colorful patchwork quilt.

Each student designed their own pattern on paper for a 9-patch block with different prints and colored squares, triangles, and rectangles using no more than three colors or prints.

Choosing from a wide array of fabric provided, each individual then cut out their own block and, with guidance, sewed it on a sewing machine.

As you can see from the completed quilt, each had his/her own idea. There was some concern how to tie the wide variety of colors together. After trying different backgrounds, purple was the outstanding and complimentary choice. After being pieced, the quilt was professionally machine quilted.

Through this project, the students learned not only about heritage—how the conservative pioneers used scraps and old clothes to piece quilts and how many of the patterns depicted their surroundings—they also used skills in geometry, planning and precision, color design, sewing, ironing, and patience in getting the job done right. All to make a product that was satisfying and something to be proud of.

On May 4, at the Centennial Heritage Program Finale, the students began selling raffle tickets to cover the cost of the project. The quilt is on display at the Red Cross Pharmacy. Tickets may be purchased at Red Cross, The Chicken Coop in Juliaetta or at Dr. Sowie's office.

The lucky winner will be chosen on Festival Day.

## E. M. T. Unit Welcomes New Members; Emergency Calling Info. Reviewed

The Kendrick/Juliaetta E. M. T. Unit is pleased and happy to welcome a newly graduated and very qualified group of Emergency Medical Technicians into the organization. The new personnel will add to the efficiency and service of the unit.

A new list of all members of the unit will be published soon. But, even though this list will give the home phone number of members, in a true emergency it is important that the person requesting the help call the toll free number listed in the front cover of the local phone directory — 1-800-632-8000. Calling this number will immediately send a page signal out to all 7 radios being used by the unit. One of these seven radios will be in the possession of one of the two advanced E. M. T.'s. All of the E. M. T.'s will know at the same time when they are needed.

REMEMBER! —when you call this number, it is important to remain as calm as possible. Give directions where the ambulance is needed and the reason why it is needed, also for whom the ambulance is needed. Be prepared to give as much information as possible.

All the members are trained to help as much as they can. Don't hesitate to call. If it happens that the patient does not require a trip to the hospital, the E. M. T.'s can still check the situation out and return to the fire hall.

The unit wants to acknowledge the efforts of Debbie Ackerman, and Shary and Gary Siflow who have been cleaning, updating supplies and doing some re-arranging in the ambulance and storage shelves. A great deal of time and effort went into this project and the unit is most appreciative of a job well done. Thanks, Deb, Shary and Gary, the ambulance looks great!!

## May 14 Meeting Discussed Phone Co. Upgrading Program

The planned Potlatch Telephone Company system upgrade program was the subject of a four-hour pre-construction meeting held on Monday, May 14 in the Kendrick fire hall meeting room. According to Jerry Brown, manager of the local utility, "twenty-five people were here to review the rules and regulations of the REA construction contract as well as the safety and traffic control procedures."

Representatives from Henkels & McCoy—the contractor, State Department of Transportation, Nez Perce and Latah County Road Superintendents, Juliaetta Mayor Harold Freeman, councilman Bruce Spang, Kendrick City Maintenance man Steve Howerton, as well as phone company officials, met to discuss how the 162 miles of new telephone cable will be buried.

"There are many requirements which need to be reviewed such as minimum depth, safety markings, and notification sequences," Brown said.

"We are investing an additional \$2 million here to improve our service and to provide all single party line connections," stated Brown. "It is very important to have everyone in the same room at the same time so that this project can be completed properly and on time," he added.

Actual trenching work will begin now as the project moves from the engineering and staking phases into placing the new cables underground. The project is scheduled to be completed over the next 5 to 6 months. "Some of the canyon routes will require extra skill and care to cut through the rocky terrain, however, Henkels & McCoy, our contractor, is very experienced in this kind of work," commented Brown.

Approximately 14 miles of new fiber optic cable is being installed between Kendrick and Juliaetta extending to our exchange boundary where we will meet U S West," added Brown. "Once U S West brings their fiber to that point, long distance calls will be even more improved in clarity and sound," he said.

## Kendrick's 30th Annual Locust Blossom Festival Is Saturday, May 26

If the winds and rain of this week haven't blown them from the trees, there will be blossoms this Saturday, May 26, as the Kendrick community presents its 30th annual Locust Blossom Festival. The blossoms had flowered out a little early this year and are slightly past the most fragrant stage, but they will be on the trees. The area has been drenched with rain and buffeted by strong winds which have shaken many of the blossoms from the trees.

Despite the weather (many are hoping that its "getting it out of its system") there will be blossoms and, above all, there will be a festival. "Let Freedom Ring" is the theme for this year's festival and the theme will be reflected in many of the parade entries.

While the day officially begins with the running of the 14th annual 5.3 mile run and the 2-mile fun run, a busy crew of workers will have already spent many hours of time preparing for the celebration, especially the crews who were preparing for the barbecue dinner.

Those who are planning to take part in the 5.3-mile run are asked to be down near the R&R Mobile Home site west of Juliaetta by 7.30. Those participating in the 2-mile fun run need to be at the Doc Little shop two-miles west of Kendrick. Both races begin at 8 o'clock. For the main run, a registration fee of \$10 gets the runner a T-shirt and a Festival button which is also good for the barbecue beef dinner.

Parade Begin at 9:30  
The children's parade will lead

what should be another outstanding collection of entries from many parts of the area. The kiddie parade will begin at 9:30 from the street between the Kendrick Garage and the Clemenhagen home. (see separate article) The Cub Scouts of Pack 101 will carry the flags.

At 10 o'clock sharp the main parade will begin. There will be appropriate ceremonies at the site of the War Memorial in the park.

Following the parade, there will be children races in the park beginning at 11:00 and the concessions and stands will begin operating.

Dinner Begins at 11:30  
The highlight of the day is always the serving of the famous barbecue beef dinner. The menu includes barbecue beef, baked beans, coleslaw, bread, pickles, mustard, coffee and punch. The Kendrick Grange will also, again, be operating its pie stand for those who need dessert.

Time and inflation finally caught up with the Locust Blossom Festival and the noon dinner has been raised in price to \$4.00. It was just a necessity.

Also opening after the parade will be the Festival arts and craft show located in the Grange Hall.

There will also be performances by old time fiddlers, a bed race down main street; a tug-of-war contest and concessions.

## Olive Dammarell, John and Gladys Wilson Are 1990 Festival Grand Marshalls

Olive Emmett Dammarell, John Wilson and Gladys Cain Wilson, the children of pioneers and all three life-time residents of the area, are the Grand Marshalls of the 1990 Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival and will ride in the honored place in the 30th annual festival this Saturday morning. Their selection is a special tribute to the Centennial founding of both the City of Kendrick and the State of Idaho. The families of two of these Grand Marshalls came to this area before Idaho was a State and Kendrick was an incorporated city.

Olive Emmett Dammarell was born shortly after the turn of the century to Burl N. and Laura B. Emmett on a homestead on the lower end of Little Bear Ridge. The Emmetts had come to this area in the late 1880's from Missouri. Olive had one brother and four sisters, all of whom are now deceased.

In 1926 Olive married Edgar M. Dammarell, who was also of a pioneer family. This union produced seven children, four boys and three girls. Donald of Spokane, Frank of Kendrick, Max of Walla Walla, and Ed, Dorothy, Maxine and Francis of Lewiston. Edgar died in December of 1983 following an automobile accident.

Olive attended school on Little Bear Ridge and later at Kendrick. She retired after serving as a cook in the Kendrick School lunch program. She now enjoys her gardening, raising flowers and reading western novels.

Gladys Cain Wilson was born on February 22, 1914 to Bob and Ada Cain, who settled on American Ridge in 1912. She attended school at Upper Golden Shield School on American Ridge through the 8th grade, spent one year at Troy, and then completed high school at Kendrick. Gladys married John Wilson in

1936 at Lewiston. She has been a homemaker all her life, having raised their four children: Lottie Jordan of Mead, Washington, Doris Parker of Farmington, New Mexico; John Robert, Fernwood, Idaho, and Stanley of Clarkston Hts., Wash.

John Wilson was born July 8, 1911 to Alexander Grace Wilson, who was better known as "Scotty", and Mary Ellen Burns on Cedar Creek. John tells that he arrived earlier than was expected in the Wilson home and the new house the family was building still was without windows and doors, so the doctor came up and took the mother and new baby back to town with him.

John's father had come over from Scotland at the age of 14 and first arrived in Kendrick as a carpenter and engineer on a bridge crew working on the railroad in 1890. The first train over the tracks to Kendrick came through in 1891. John's mother's parents traveled up the Columbia River on a boat to Lewiston, later settling below Kendrick where they operated a saw mill.

John was the youngest boy of 10 children in the Wilson family. One sister, Corryell Wolff still makes her home in Leland. John attended Pine Creek Grade School, located where Bob and Helen Heldenreich now make their home. At age 13, he went to work in the woods during the winter, and on area farms in the summer months. He later worked for Potlatch Forests. After a long career as a bulldozer operator in the woods, he retired in 1974. He and Gladys now enjoy their gardening, having made their home in Kendrick since 1949.

The community is pleased to honor Mrs. Dammarell and the Wilsons as this year's Grand Marshalls in recognition of our pioneer heritage and the contributions these good people have made to our community.
