## Jane L. Roth, Gazette Publisher, Dies May 25

Sarah Jane Roth, a publisher of newspapers in Latah County since 1954 died at 10:45 p. m. at her home in Kendrick Friday, May 25, 1990 of congestive heart failure. She had been in poor health for several years. She was 84.

She was the one of the owners and co-publishers of The Genesee News and later of The Kendrick Gazette.

Sarah Jane Leighty Roth was born November 6, 1905 at Vermont, Illinois, the youngest daughter of Frank T. and Anna Maria Shepherd Leighty. She attended schools in Vermont, graduating from high school in 1923.

She began her printing career at the age of 14, working at the Vermont Union after school and on Saturdays for the wage of 10c an hour. She learned the trade first as a hand-set compositor, setting the type by hand, letter-by-letter. She later learned to operate a Linotype machine, the occupation she was to pursue almost all her life.

She retired after the sale of The Gazette News, but still maintained Rich for everything he has done. an active interest in the operation and publication of the paper.

She was a member of the Vermont Methodist Church and the American Legion Auxiliary in Vermont. She was also a member of Lily Chapter. Order of the Eastern Star for many years, joining first in Vermont, Ill.

Three brothers and two sisters preceded her in death. Surviving are a son, William Alan, at the family home in Kendrick; and
