

#### Owner Looking for **Historical Information** On Juliaetta Bank Bldg.

Jim Ryan of Stites, the owner of At Fire Hall May 28 the old Juliaetta Bank building that now houses First Bank of Pizza is seeking historical information on the building in an attempt to register the structure with the National His-

torical Society. Following the Bank of Juliaetta's closure during the depression of the MaryBeth McCall were taken in as 1930's, the buliding served as the post office until 1975 when that agency moved to a new building. Ryan acquired the building in that year and opened First Bank of Pizza which is now operated by Zana

To get a building registered with the Historical Society information on its history and use is needed. Some of the information Ryan has been able to trace down is that the building was built in 1907 and its builder was a Ben Pendland. The architect was J. H. Kave. The bricks used came either from the Kendrick Brick Co. or the T. H. Cone Yard not filled out an information form in Lewiston. The bank increased its capital stock and incorporated in
