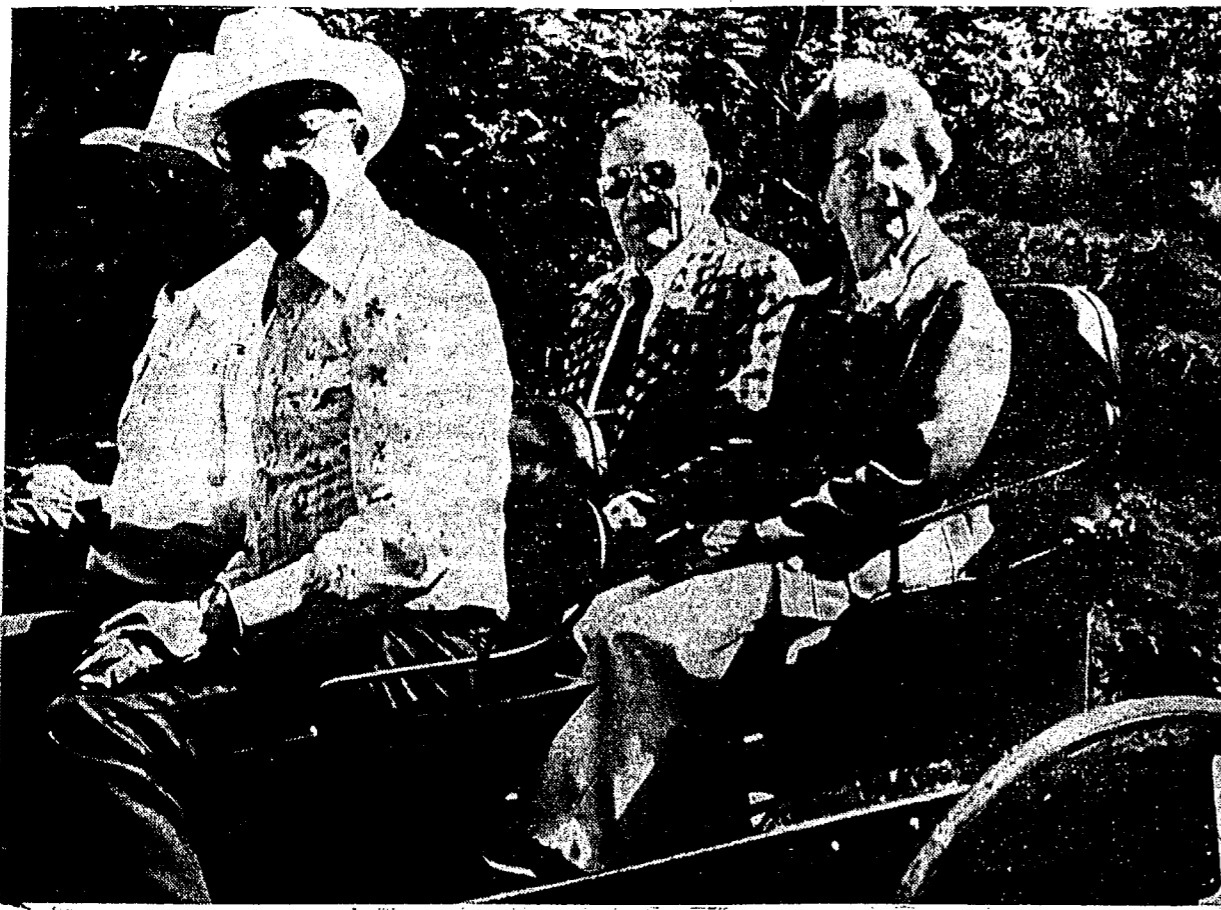

New Car Wash Open At Juliaetta Market

Car and truck washing facilities are now available in the Juliaetta/Kendrick area as Gary Collins of Juliaetta Market has recently completed the installation of a modern car wash on the west side of Juliaetta right next to his market.

The facilities are housed in a new 28'x32' concrete, wood and steel building which was erected just for the wash. The equipment is from "Southern Pride", which Gary says is the "top of the line" in the car wash business. There is a pre-soak, foamy brush, Hi-pressure soap and a hi-pressure rinse cycle. A hot lemon wax treatment is also available, as is vacuuming equipment.

Gary says the wash can handle both cars and trucks with ease. Gary added that one of the good features of this system is that the complete wash and rinse cycle uses only 16 gallons of water.
