Gold Hill School Reunion Brought Many "Back Home"

It was a great day of "meetin' and greetin'" at the Gold Hill Community hall Sunday, June 10 when 140 (or more) gathered for a reunion of Gold Hill School students, teachers, relatives and friends. Two former teachers were present: Eva Slater Smith Daniels, who taught in 1930-31; and Ida M. Perryman, who taught from 1931 to '36, 1943-'44 and again from 1950 to '53.

Arley and Mattie Allen and Celia Bohn were the oldest students who had attended the school. The youngest was Penny (Weaver) Saarela.

Other came from Asotin, Clarkston, Lewiston, Juliaetta, Kendrick, Lenore, Deary, Troy, Potlatch, the Park Community and Gold Hill.

The first school at Gold Hill was taught by Mrs. Clugston in a log cabin in 1888-89 with terms of 3 months in the spring and 3 months in the fall.

For the term of 1903-04 a new 2-story building was built with the school on the first floor and a hall on the second floor used for programs, dances and elections. The building is still standing. Alvah Smith was the teacher that first term. Mrs. Ida Perryman taught the last term of school held at Gold Hill. The students, after that, went by bus to Southwick for a number of years thereafter.

The school house was used as a club and community meeting place until the new club house (located at the top of Weyen Hill), was completed in 1982.

There were descendants present at the June 10 reunion of pioneer families who came to Gold Hill before the turn of the century or shortly after. These included the Alexanders, Lyons, Garners, Vaughans, Smiths, Zimmermans, Weavers, Frys, McPhees, Jenks and Israels.

The Weaver family had the most members present June 10, with the Garners a close second. There were two generations of Weavers who had attended school and three generations of the Mattie Garner Allen family.

The committee wishes to thank all who came bringing pictures to share, for the delicious food and especially for each one attending to make this a most memorable day.

Mayor, County Comm. Sit In with Planners

Mayor Harold Freeman of Juliaetta and Latah County Commissioner Dana Magnuson joined the economic development planning group on June 12 as they continued their discussion of possible infrastructure improvement plans. Freeman, who attended all of the Gem Community workshops presented by the Idaho Department of Commerce, is the first council member from either city to join in the work of the ad hoc planning committee.

Magnuson, who has been recruiting members to serve on a county-wide rural economic development group, told the committee that they should consider themselves to be the planners for the community. Rural city councils, he said, have traditionally been too involved in dealing with day-to-day needs and problems to have time for planning. On the other hand, he encouraged the committee to keep the councils informed, for in the long run they will be the ones needed to implement infrastructure plans, especially those that depend on tax dollars or municipal enforcement. The fact that they're not present does not necessarily mean that they don't support the committee's efforts.

The committee that evening took a look at some of the high priority infrastructure improvement goals that surfaced during the community assessment. It was noted that none of these goals related to transportation, to education and work force, or to energy, including conservation. The emphasis upon recreation (bike and walking path, RV park and facilities) was about the same as that placed on public services and facilities (street and sidewalk repair and maintenance, water supply and delivery). Health and senior housing, while represented among the top priorities, received less emphasis. Those receiving the greatest emphasis tend to depend on tax dollars, it was noted.

Continuing their search for "models" of infrastructure improvement, the committee members agreed to each come up with a list of no fewer than 10 improvement goals for presentation and discussion at the next meeting on June 26. While members may use some of the infrastructure improvement goals already discussed, they were encouraged to give free rein to their individual thinking about things in the community's infrastructure that either need improving or that would somehow stimulate economic development. "Be imaginative, be bold, be outrageous!" advised their chairman, Frank Jacobson of Leland.

Jacobson closed the June 12 meeting with a quote from the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah: "Seek the welfare of the community where you live, for in its welfare you will find your welfare." A thought for all of us to live by.

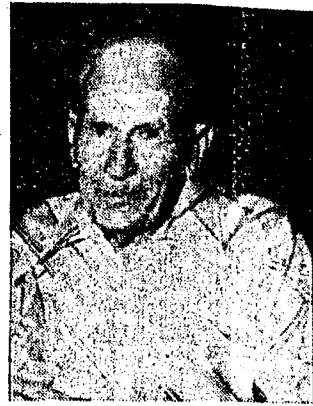

Centennial Day Events Discussed at Meeting

There was an excellent attendance at the Thursday meeting of the Centennial committee to discuss possible events and activities when Kendrick celebrates its 100th year this coming October 13.

The October celebration is already beginning to shape up as a major event with a parade, marching bands, floats, and horse entries. Emil Silflow and Eldon Taylor (the same two who have put together the Festival parade these past years) are already contacting possible entries.

Also planned is a "picnic in the park" at noon. For this activity there are planned to be food booths and a food fair offering a variety of ethnic foods, or people may prepare and bring their own picnic basket to be eaten as they take in a number of musical events including a possible band concert and a performance by the Old Time Fiddlers.

It is planned to construct a number of sheltered booths in the park to house the food booths. The possibility of building a stage for some of the noon and afternoon concerts is also under consideration.

A suggestion of having old-time craft demonstrations such as hewing, chopping, etc. was also received and will probably be arranged for. The committee further has a lead on arranging for a complete miniature sawmill to be set up and functioning that day as well as some very old log trucks that a still in working order.

Among the other suggestions for events on Centennial Day were that the Indian Agency at Lapwai be contacted to arrange for some native American displays or performances; other ethnic exhibits and booths; a fashion show of old-time clothing; plus other centennial-era items.

If it can be arranged (depending on weather, fire hazards, etc.), there will also be a fireworks display in the evening.

It is planned to have the events of the day conclude with the Centennial Ball in the evening at the VFW Hall, Baker-Lind Post. 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars, has agreed to oversee this event.

And, early this week, it was learned that a local group is interested in staging an old-time "Melodrama" some time during the day. Leasel Abrams reported that local drama teacher Michael Elridge is looking for a suitable play and if found, will be making a casting call soon.

It was stressed that many of the events have not been firmed up yet and everything is subject to change. There is still time to offer ideas and suggestions — anything that might make this "once in a lifetime" day a success.

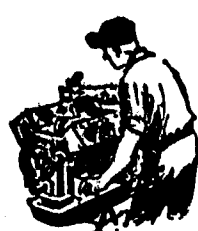
