Margie Alexander made a beautiful cake and special entertainment

included a dance by Mattie Allen, age 96, and Archie Garner, age 72, (mother and son), to the "Anniversary Waltz", played by Kelly Cuddy of Boise.

The celebration spanned the generations and 5 were represented at the party, starting with the oldest member, Mattie Allen, age 96, and the newest addition to the family, Samantha Lyons, just one month and 4 days old.

While 4 anniversaries of 50 years and more is a rare event for most families, this clan has two more couples married more than half a century. Louis and Faye Porter of Orofino, and Art and Maxine Foster of Kendrick, celebrate their 58th and 56th anniversaries, respectively, this November.

Marvin Garner, 69, Former Area Resident, Passes July 7

Marvin Garner, 69, of Grangeville, died Saturday of a heart attack while cutting wood 50 miles south of Grangeville on Old Florence Road.

He was born Nov. 14, 1920, at Linden, Idaho, to George and Mattie McPhee Garner.

He attended Gold Hill School in the Linden area, and after that went to work for Potlatch Forests, Inc. in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area.

He married Daphne Wisdom at Boise June 25, 1950.

He served in Italy and Africa during World War II and in General Patton's 5th Army.

After the war he first went to work for a sawmill at Riggins and then moved to Grangeville in 1957, where he worked for Ida-Pine Mills until he retired in 1988.

His hobbies included snowmobiling, cross country skiing, gardening and viewing various sports including football and baseball. He enjoyed spending time with his children at Grangeville.

He was a member of the Snow Drifters Club, and the First Christian Church, Grangeville.

Survivors, in addition to his wife at the family home, include his mother, Mattie Allen of Lewiston; a daughter, Debra Schlieper of Grangeville; three sons, Dennis Garner of Belgrade, Mont., Doug Garner of Columbus, Ga., and Daryl Garner of Iron Mountain, Mich.; two brothers, Melvin Garner of Elk City and Archie Garner of Salt Lake City, Utah; two sisters, Thelma Cuddy and Maxine Foster, both of Kendrick, and nine grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his father and a sister, Eileen Souders.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2 p. m. at Noland Funeral Home, Grangeville with Rev. Bill Miller of the First Christian Church officiating. Mrs. Harris began her postal career in 1974 as a substitute rural carrier in the Kendrick office, became a regular carrier and remained in that position until her recent appointment as post master.

When asked what she wants to accomplish in her new position, she replied that she wants "to give good service and increase public relations."

Kendrick Watering Restrictions Become Effective July 16

Outside watering restrictions for the city of Kendrick will go into effect Monday, July 16. The restrictions were approved at a meeting of the Kendrick city council Tuesday evening. Under the restriction the watering rules will be:

For the North side of Main St. from School House hill west to the city limits: watering will be allowed on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

For the South side of Main St. and East of School House Hill: watering may be done on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

No watering permitted on Sunday. Mayor Jerry Brown said Tuesday night that the council regrets having to place restrictions on watering, but these past few days of warm weather have already begun to put a strain on the city's reservoirs and pumps.

While no watering hours have been set, Brown suggested that residents do as much of their watering in the evening hours as possible. This will help ease the burden on the pumps and wells when the most demand is being placed on them.

The council would appreciate the community's cooperation in this matter.

All members of the council were present at the Tuesday meeting except councilman Dave Klatt. Those at the meeting were Mayor Brown, councilmen Rita Blewett, Darrel Brocke and Mike Boe; city clerk Lynn Bruce, and guests Wayne Harris, Jim Dewey and Will Harrington.

Harris appeared before the council to review the plans being made to observe the Kendrick Centennial on Oct. 13. Harris told the council of the plans and encouraged the city to become involved in the celebration. After a discussion, the council voted to sponsor the Centennial and will cooperate in making the event a success.

Jim Dewey, the city's forestry consultant and Will Harrington, the city attorney were present to discuss the proposed sale of some of the timber on city-owned land across the Potlatch River. The city had advertised bids on approximately 63,000 board feet of timber to be harvested. No bids were received by the closing date. With no bids offered to cut the timber, the city is now free to negotiate with private loggers.

It should also be noted that Mrs. Lynn Bruce is the new city clerk. Lynn succeeds Donna Goff who resigned effective July 1. Hours at city hall remain the same: 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. Monday to Friday.

It was reported that Steve Howerton, the city maintenance man is now back on the job, but on a very limited work schedule following his recent major surgery.

Gary E. Abbott, 52, Claimed by Cancer

Gary E. Abbott of Beaverton, Oregon, formerly of Lewiston and Kendrick, died Tuesday, July 3, at St. Vincent's Hospital in Portland of cancer. He was 52.

He was the owner and manager of Gary Abbott's Management Consultant Co. at Portland.

He was born Dec. 20, 1937, to Reed and Roberta Weeks Abbott at Lewiston. The family moved to Clarkston, Seattle and then to Haw-Allen, where he started school. He attended elementary school at Norfolk, Va., before the family returned to Idaho in 1954 and he graduated from Kendrick High School in 1959.

After graduation, he moved to Lewiston and attended Lewis-Clark State College for two years.

He married Freida Bamberg on Nov. 22, 1959, at Kendrick, Idaho. They moved to California and returned to Lewiston in 1962, where he worked for Potlatch Corp. They were later divorced.

In 1971 he moved to Beaverton, Ore. He began working for Upland Industries as office manager in 1972 and in 1978 he began working for the city of Portland in its auditing department. In 1980, he joined a band and toured Oregon, Montana, Washington and Idaho.

He married Phyllis Smith Baeschlin in December 1984 at Lewiston. After their marriage they moved to Beaverton, Oregon, where he started his own management consultant business. He was a real estate appraiser, managed apartment buildings and served as a consultant for the city of Beaverton.

He enjoyed music, golf and boating.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Beaverton; his mother, Roberta Weeks Manwaring of Kendrick; a daughter, Brenda Kay Mutch of Sherwood, Ore.; a son, Robert Blaine Abbott of Sherwood; two stepsons, Shawn Baeschlin of Salem, Ore., and Steve Baeschlin of Portland; a stepdaughter, Shelly Fatheree of Albertson, Mt.; three half-brothers, Monte Abbott of Clarkston, Noel Abbott of Lewiston and Les Abbott of Kent, Wash.; three half-sisters, Merilyn Brandon of Selah, Wash., Martha Grove of Kamiah nad Lorene Reed of West Palm Beach, Fla.; three grandsons and two step-grandchildren.

The funeral was at 2 p. m. Friday, July 6, at Malcom's-Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Sam Stedman officiating. Burial was a Lewis-Clark Gardens. National Wheelchair Sports Medal Goes To Diane Gellings

NEW ORLEANS, LA—Diane M. Gellings of Kendrick, Idaho, won a silver medal June 29 in the field discus event at the largest wheelchair sports event in the nation, the 10th National Veterans Wheelchair Games.

She joined 520 military veterans who are competing in sports events such as track and field, swimming, weight lifting, and basketball. Gellings will be competing in manual chair bowling, field shot, javelin and manual chair slalom.

All participants use wheelchairs for mobility due to spinal cord injury, other neurological diseases, or amputations.

One-third of the participants are competing for the first time. Others are world-class wheelchair athletes, some of whom got their start at earlier veterans' wheelchair games and progressed to the 1988 World Paralympics in Korea.

The Games are co-sponsored by the Department of Veterans Affairs and Paralyzed Veterans of America. Both sponsors promote recreation and sports as a way to a healthier, happier, more purposeful life for veterans in wheelchairs.

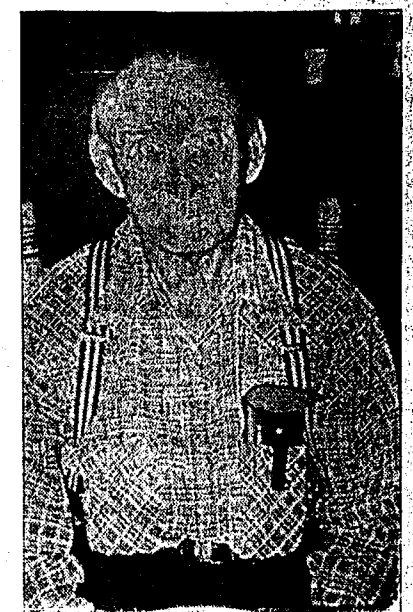

Dewey Galloway, A son of Pioneers, Dies at Age 91

Dewey Galloway, the last of the original Galloway boys from Big Bear Ridge, died Friday morning, July 7, at the Moscow Care Center of causes related to age. He was 91. The Galloway brothers, there were five of them, lived, farmed and raised cattle on Big Bear Ridge and in the Kendrick/Juliaetta area all their lives and were among the best-liked and respected men in the community.



Dewey was born July 24, 1898, at Galloway, Missouri, to Alexander and Kate Baker Galloway. The family moved west when he was an infant and settled on Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick. He attended the Steele School on the ridge.

Dewey farmed and raised cattle with his brothers, John and Andy, all of his life. None of the three ever married. They were familiar faces in Kendrick, and were some of the steady crew that assembled at Dick Cuddy's Barber Shop to trade news and stories. Dewey was a director of the Kendrick Cattle-men's Association and his main hobby was raising livestock.

Dewey was a steady, dependable and caring individual. His interest in the community was expressed in the work and contributions he made to good causes and projects.

Survivors include a sister, Mary Larson of Placerville, Calif. He was preceded in death by five brothers, John, Hiram, Ed, Andy and Henry Galloway, and a sister, Anna Bower.

Graveside services were held Sunday, July 8, at the Wild Rose Cemetery on Big Bear Ridge with the Rev. Dallas Groseclose of the Full Gospel Lighthouse officiating.

Among the flowers that graced the cemetery that afternoon were yellow roses, which his family knew he loved.

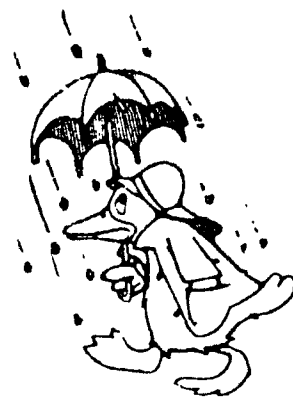

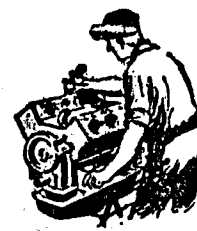
