Ryan C. Wilson, 18, Died July 14

Ryan C. Wilson, 18, a 1990 graduate of Genesee High School, died Saturday, July 14, of a gunshot wound, apparently self-inflicted. The death occurred about 28 miles east of Grangeville, on the South Fork of the Clearwater River.

Ryan, the son of Richard and Fonda Schoeffler Wilson, was born July 2, 1972, at Lewiston, and lived at Genesee all his life. He had planned to attend the University of Idaho this fall.

During high school he was a member of the National Honor Society; was active and won a national award in Future Farmers of America; earned letters in football, basketball and baseball and received many scholarships for college.

He is survived by his parents at Genesee; a maternal grandmother, Muriel Hubbard of Juliaetta; maternal step-grandfather, Lowell Hubbard of Juliaetta; and paternal grandmother, Gloria Choate of Kendrick.

Services were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston, and burial followed at Genesee City Cemetery. Memorials are suggested to the Genesee Quick Response Unit.

On June 4, Theresia Brown, accompanied by daughters Jenny Rode and Mary Lou Taylor, left Spokane for three weeks in Germany where they visited Resi's five sisters and her brother.

After a long flight over, with stops in Minneapolis and Boston, the woman finally arrived in Frankfurt the following afternoon. They then flew from Frankfurt to Munich where they were met by Resi's sister Mia and a friend of the family, Peter. Peter and his sister Monika were the only English-speaking people in the family who could communicate with Mary Lou and Jenny, which made for an interesting vacation. The girls had a lot of fun trying to communicate with the others in the family when Peter, Monika or Resi were not around.

Resi's ability to speak her native language quickly returned so Mary Lou and Jenny had an interpreter with them almost all the time. The first week was spent getting acquainted (and re-acquainted) with relatives and visiting places around the Marktoberdorf area. The second week the local women rode the train to Kaufbeuren where they changed trains and went into Munich to pick up a rental car. Driving on the autobahn was a very exciting experience for the group.

Places visited in Germany Austria and Switzerland included a tour of Munich and the Olympic stadium, Berchtesgaden and the Salt mines, Salzburg, Oberammergau, where the passion play was in progress. (Tickets had been sold out years in advance so it was impossible for the travelers to attend). Tours were taken at the Castle of Linderhof, Neuschwanstein Castle, Rothenburg, Sonthofen, Garmisch - Partenkirchen, Fussen, and numerous old churches and monasteries including Weis that were magnificent. They took a ferry across the Bodensee from Switzerland to Meersburg and enjoyed a gondola ride into the beautiful Alps. Also enjoyed were the lovely lakes and rivers in the area which were the prettiest blue color the ladies had ever seen.

Everything in Germany was so clean and beautiful and the women had a very enjoyable trip. By the time they left, there was not a road in the southern part of Germany they had not been on.

The entire three weeks was spent traveling, seeing many of the beautiful sights of Germany and getting acquainted with relatives they had never met. They hope they have convinced some of the relatives to come visit here and see how beautiful Idaho is, too.

Help is Needed for Planned "Food Fair" On Centennial Day

It wouldn't be a real celebration if food weren't available—that was the thinking of the Kendrick centennial committee when it met to discuss plans for the October 13 centennial day observance. But just what and how to make it available was the big question. Locust Blossom Festival offers the famous barbecue beef dinner — it's a great one, too, but it's expensive, specialized, and requires much time and effort to prepare, cook and serve. The crew that does this is experienced and good at their job, but they've already done this task once this year, and, it was felt, they shouldn't be asked to go through the effort twice in less than 6 months. So, what to do?

The suggestion was a "picnic in the park". Each family or person would be encouraged to pack their own picnic dinner for the afternoon's enjoyment. This could work.

But, what if a person or family didn't have the time or inclination to prepare a picnic basket. The success of the day is going to depend mostly on volunteer participation. If a person is busy that day they probably won't have time to pack a basket and bring to the park. Visitors won't want to bring a basket. But they will want to eat and have "something special" available.

The local restaurants will be working that day, but they couldn't be expected to accommodate a large crowd. And a large crowd is what Kendrick is hoping for Oct. 13.

A possible solution to the problem, it is hoped, arrived in the form of a suggestion for a "food fair". What this means is basically setting up a number of booths, each of which offer a certain type of food. This could be ethnic food (German, Scandinavian, etc.), maybe a favorite family recipe, or just some food a group thinks people might enjoy trying.

This could also be an excellent way for a group—church, 4-H, the Scouts, service organizations, etc. to raise money. These would not be centennial or city projects.

It is planned to have a meeting of those interested at a later date—time and place will be announced. Please think about this, and maybe someone in the community has some even better ideas. Lots of help is going to be needed. Please, this is your centennial!

Attended National Auto. Plate Collectors Convention

Sunday, June 24, Flo and Clem Lyons left home on a trip that took them through Montana to Rapid City, South Dakota, where they attended the National Convention for the Automobile Plate Collector's Association. Mystie B. Heimgartner, Area Resident Since 1896, Passes at Age 102



Mystie Belle Heimgartner a resident of the Juliaetta area since 1896, died Sunday, July 15 at a Lewiston care center at the age of 102.

Mrs. Heimgartner was born Oct. 24, 1887, at Union, Nebraska, to Frank and Susie Hoisington. The family moved to Palouse, Washington in 1889, and shortly after moved to a homestead pre-emption near Troy, Idaho.

In the spring of 1896 the family moved to Fix Ridge near Juliaetta. Mrs. Heimgartner was one of three Hoisington daughters who married three Heimgartner sons. She married Albert J. Heimgartner October 30, 1907. Her sister Bessie married Robert (Rob) Heimgartner and her other sister, Lona, married William Heimgartner. After Mystie's marriage to Albert they farmed on Fix Ridge until 1918. They then moved to Potlatch Ridge.

After her husband's death in 1973, she continued living in their home for several years until bad health caused her to spend some time with her children before entering a care center at Lewiston in 1978.

Mrs. Heimgartner was a devoted wife, mother and grandmother. Her main concern in life was always helping others, and her family can still vouch for her culinary abilities. Mystie's home was the stopping place for the whole neighborhood, and there was always room at her table for one more plate.

She was a member of the Stony Point Friendship Club for more than 50 years and enjoyed making quilts.

She was preceded in death by her husband, a daughter, Erma Stevens, who died in 1985, and a great-grandson, Michael Jon Bartelson in 1976.

Mrs. Heimgartner is survived by

five sons, Eldon Heimgartner, Floyd Heimgartner and Wilbur Heimgartner of Juliaetta and Clarence Heimgartner and Earl R. Heimgartner of Culesac; two daughters, Mable Steigers of Culesac and Bernice Foss of Lapwai; a brother, Cleitis Hoisington of Lewiston; 22 grandchildren, seven stepgrandchildren, 47 great-grandchildren and 16 great-great-grandchildren.

Graveside services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens with Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston in charge.

Receives Grant for Bear Ridge-Avon History

Stan and Margaret Cox of Avon were in Coeur d'Alene Thursday, June 28, where Margaret accepted grant money of \$500 from the North Idaho Fund of the Spokane Inland Northwest Community Foundation, for the "Busy Bee Club" to offset the printing and publication of its book, "From Bear Creek to Avon" memories of the Avon area of Latah County. The grants were awarded at a Coeur d'Alene reception.

The North Idaho Fund was established in 1976 from the estate of Harry Day, a Wallace mine owner and businessman. The Spokane Inland Northwest Community Foundation, founded 15 years ago, now has \$6 million in assets. Five North Central Idaho organizations have received grants amounting to \$3,300 from this foundation. They were among 15 non-profit organizations from 10 Northern Idaho counties in the 5th annual North Idaho Fund distribution.

Census Bureau Asks: "Were You Counted?" In Final Public Appeal

"Were you and all the members of your household counted in the 1990 Census?" That's the question the Census Bureau is asking all Idaho residents as the census nears completion. "Were You Counted?" is an important follow-up effort, part of a series of operations planned to ensure a complete count for Idaho and the nation.

"If you believe a census questionnaire was not completed for your household, or that someone living in your residence was not counted, there is a simple form you can fill out," said Barbara Everitt Bryant, Director of the U. S. Census Bureau.

The form, which is being printed in newspapers as a public service, can be filled out by readers and mailed to a census office. The form contains only seven questions, and is available from community based organizations. Completion takes only a few minutes.

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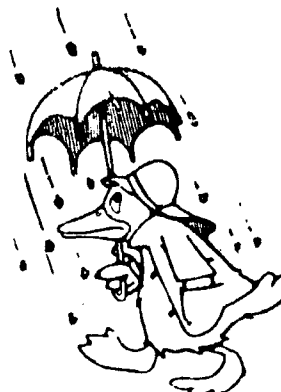

Caribou Calves Born In Selkirk Mountains

A northern Idaho herd of the endangered woodland caribou now has five new members. Last month, biologists from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game observed

five caribou calves in the Selkirk Mountains of the Idaho Panhandle.

Researcher Brad Compton said he found the calves and their mothers in calving areas that still had five to six feet of snow cover. Pregnant caribou move up to high ridges to give birth. Although harsh weather at those altitudes claims some of the calves, biologists think caribou seek out such sites to avoid predators.

Compton said the births are an encouraging sign for the endangered herd. Over the past four years, 60 caribou captured in central British Columbia have been released near Bonners Ferry in an effort to build up the herd. Prior to the transplants, the herd had dwindled to 25-30 animals.

The latest transplant occurred in March, when trapping crews captured a dozen caribou north of Kamloops, B. C., and relocated them to the Selkirks. The transplants will be the last one; researchers will now concentrate on monitoring the population to determine whether it can expand on its own through natural reproduction.

The Selkirk caribou herd suffered a setback in early May when it lost two members. A female that had been monitored since 1983 was killed by a vehicle on B. C. Highway 3 near Stag Leap Provincial Park. Another female died from undetermined causes.
