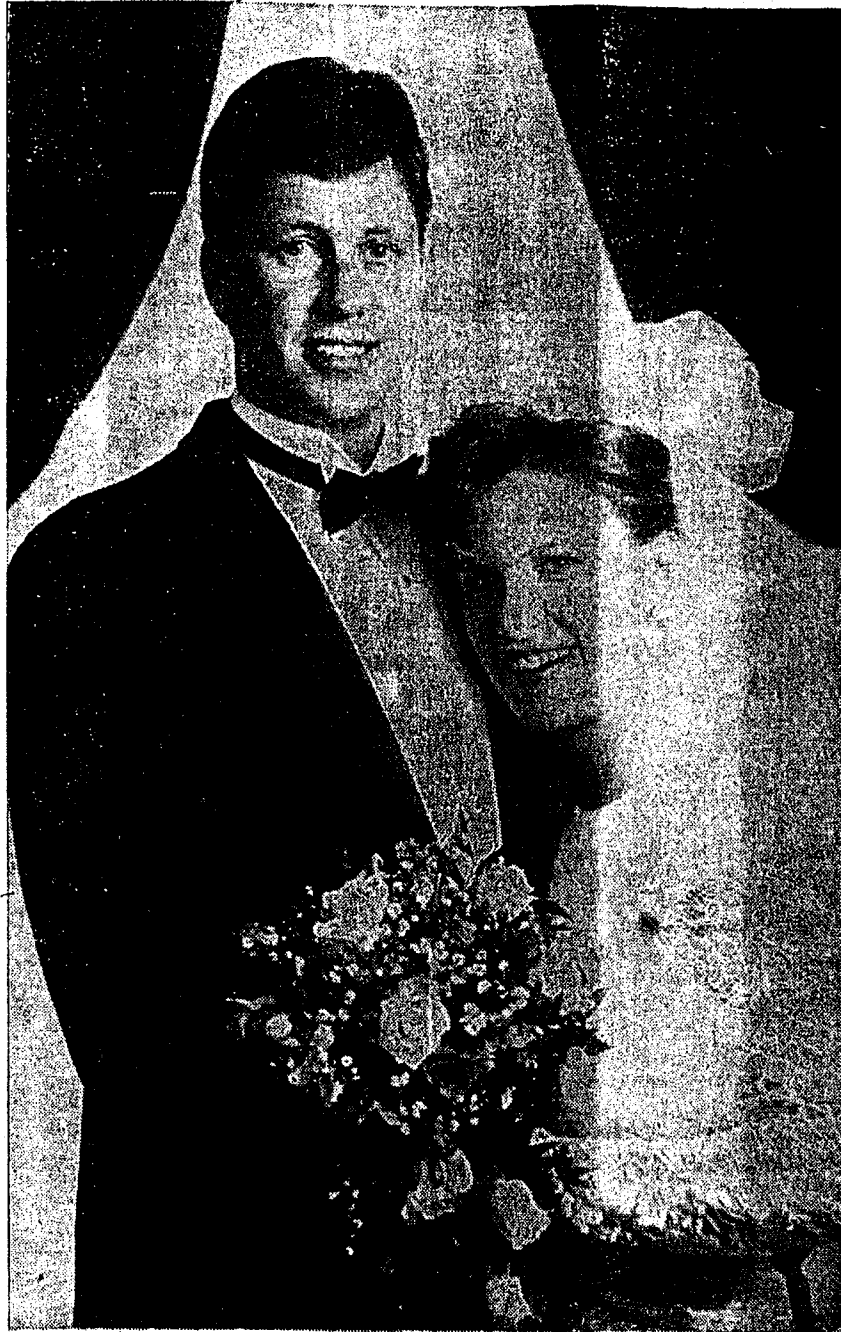

## Robert P. Nelson, 81, Former Resident, Passes July 15

Robert P. Nelson, 81, Council, Idaho passed away Sunday morning, July 15, 1990 at his home. His bride of 55 years was at his bedside. Funeral services for Mr. Nelson were held at 10:30 a. m., Thursday, July 19, at the I. O. O. F. Hall in Council. Interment was at the I. O. O. F. Cemetery in Council under the direction of Thomason Funeral Home, Weiser.

He was born January 7, 1909 at Cottage Grove, Oregon, the son of Rube and Lessie Newcomb Nelson.

In 1917 the family moved to the Moscow, Idaho area. He graduated from Moscow High School in 1928 and attended the University of Idaho. He farmed with his father until 1945. On June 2, 1935, he married Miss Henrietta Hawkins, whom he had first met in the fall of 1929 at a church party and had loved dearly ever since.

In 1945 they moved with their children to Elk City, Idaho, where he raised cattle and was an out-fitter. In 1948 they moved to Kendrick, Idaho where the children grew up. Starting in 1957 he worked in construction across the Pacific northwest. They moved to Orofino in 1966 and to Council in 1988.

Bob joined the Oddfellow Lodge, November 30, 1927 at Moscow and after his retirement he became very active in the lodge and held numerous local and state positions, including being Grand Patriarch of the Grand Encampment of Idaho in 1981-'82. Bob and Henrietta enjoyed traveling and visiting friends across the U. S., Canada and Europe.

During his illness their many lodge and friends in Council have provided a tremendous amount of support and help. Their kindness will be remembered for a long time.

Survivors include his wife Henrietta of Council; his children, Mr. and Mrs. James P. Nelson of Munich, Germany, Mr. and Mrs. L. E. (Patricia) Thompson of Bullhead City, Arizona, and Mr. and Mrs. Todd Nelson of Council, Idaho, and a foster son and wife, Mr. and Mrs. Don Keeler of Boise; seven grandchildren, Robert Thompson, Betty Holtom, Virginia Thompson, Emily Nelson, Cornelia Nelson, Jeff Nelson, and Maria Nelson; 3 great-granddaughters, Amanda Thompson, Angela and Jennifer Holtom; a sister and brother-in-law Mr. and Mrs. Harry (Edythe) Wallen of Moscow. He also leaves many nieces, nephews, and cousins.

## Kendrick Sets Time Limits on Watering

The hot, dry weather of July has forced the City of Kendrick to add new restrictions on outside watering. As of Monday, July 23, the city has limited watering to between the hours of 7 and 9 p. m. in addition to the earlier restriction.

If you live north of Main Street and west of School House Hill, you may water between 7 and 9 p. m. on Monday, Wednesday and Fridays. If you live south of Main Street and east of School House Hill you may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

No watering on Sunday. The restrictions will be in effect until further notice.

## Juliaetta Volunteer Fire Department Needs New Members and Community Support

The members of the Juliaetta Volunteer Fire Department would like to take an opportunity to thank the residents and businesses of the area for the past support, and solicit continued support.

All fire departments in the State of Idaho are rated by the Idaho Surveying and Rating Bureau to determine the ratings for use by insurance agents to determine the cost of fire insurance for all structures in their jurisdictions. Fire departments are rated on such things as water system capacities, fire hydrant size and locations, numbers of

fire trucks and pumping capabilities, kind and condition of miscellaneous equipment, number of active department members, and training levels of the members. It is therefore to each and every residents benefit to support the fire department both monetarily and by volunteering their time to provide a stronger fire department.

During the past five years all funds for purchasing fire hose, nozzles, and firefighter protective gear have come from fund raisers sponsored by the fire department. We have not been supported by tax dollars with the exception of maintenance and repairs to the fire truck. We have recently been experiencing a decline in the support of our fund raisers. This decline in support is making it increasingly difficult for use to continue upgrading the quality of our equipment.

Your fire department currently has 10 active members. Of those ten active members, 9 work out-of-town during the daytime hours. This situation is leaving our community very poorly protected during the daytime hours. Our fire truck is a complicated piece of equipment, and would be very difficult for untrained people to operate. We have always been assisted at fires by many well-meaning people trying to help, but the only real way to help is to become an active member of the fire department.

We would like to have anyone interested in assisting with fire protection of the community join the fire department and become competent in the operation of the fire truck. It would be especially helpful if businesses in the community would encourage their employees to join the department by allowing them the time to attend meetings and respond to fires.

## Reason Why the Bank Removed Two Locust Trees

Two large locust trees at the back of First Security Bank property were removed this week. Bank manager Dirk Hammond said the reasons for the removal were three.

First, the bank is planning to install a drive-thru teller window on that side of the bank and the trees would have to come out to permit the space to be available. The area between the bank and the building next to it, now occupied by Henkels & McCoy will be paved and an off-ramp from the street will be constructed. Hammond said the bank hopes to have this completed in one or two years.

Second, the tree roots are starting to uproot and break the paving and concrete that currently covers the parking area back of the bank. This is expensive to repair and maintain.

Third, the upkeep on the trees is very expensive because the bank is forced to spray and inject the trees each year to prevent aphid infestation and the resultant dripping on cars and vehicles that must use the parking space.

Hammond said the decision to remove the trees wasn't made lightly and the bank regrets having to take this action, but felt it was a necessary move.

Mother Nature Tree Service from Lewiston is taking out the trees and Dale Taylor Construction of Juliaetta will be doing the concrete work.

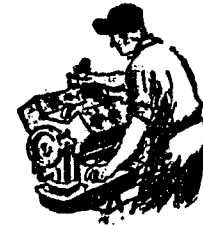
