Plans for Centennial Celebration Talked At Thursday Meet

Plans for the Kendrick Centennial celebration of October 13, was the main topic of discussion at the centennial center last Thursday evening as eighteen members of the centennial committee met.

Marilyn Eichner, who is coordinating the centennial history book with the Solstice Press, its publisher, reported that almost all the material for the book is now in. The title, "A Centennial History of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Area", was chosen that evening.

It is still hoped to have the book back from the printer (somewhere in Michigan), and available for distribution by October 13.

Parade

Emil Silflow, who with Eldon Taylor, is chairman of the parade committee reported that he is already contacting various riding clubs and groups in the area to get them interested in riding in the parade. He said there are about 120 groups and individuals in the area involved with horses and riding, so from these it should be possible to have a good representation in the parade. Anyone interested in this part of the celebration should contact Eldon or Emil. It is also planned to have the back street from the Telephone office to the Food Bank closed so that riding entries such as buggies, wagons, etc., may have a place to have the entries on display after the parade.

Food Fair

Barbra Clayton and Phil and Donna Heinen, co-chairmen of the Food Fair committee, reported that they have received inquiries from groups and individuals interested in having a booth in the park for the Food Fair on Oct. 13. Plans call for a number of booths to sell a variety of food items Centennial Day rather than serve one meal as is done at the Locust Blossom Festival in May. It is hoped to have ethnic food, (German, Russian, Mexican, etc.) available. Again those individuals or organizations interested in serving food or having a booth should contact Mrs. Clayton or the Heinens.

Music and Entertainment

George Brocke reported that he has signed up a number of local musicians interested in being part of a community band that would perform on Centennial Day. More musicians are needed, Brocke said, and they should sign up as soon as possible so practice can begin. It was also reported that Joanne Gertje has expressed interest in directing a local choir group for the Oct. 13 entertainment portion of the day. Also suggested was that the committee try to get some of the local dance talent to perform as part of the afternoon entertainment. A number of young girls are accomplished dancers and would add to the day's program.

The committee already has a good commitment from the Latah County Old Time Fiddler to be present that day.

The V. F. W. and its Auxiliary Unit appears to have a good start on presenting the Centennial Ball the evening of Oct. 13. Gerald and Lee Halsey were present Thursday evening to tell the committee of the plans the VFW and Auxiliary have already made. Tickets for the dance will soon be on sale and a band has been booked. There is still much planning and work to be done before the October 13 date. The centennial committee will be meeting on a regular basis during the next two months. 1989 Big Game Harvests Set New Records

Idaho hunters broke the records for deer, elk, antelope, bighorn sheep and moose harvested in 1989, according to a report recently released by the Department of Fish and Game. The report, compiled from a telephone survey of license buyers, contains the official estimated harvest for all species of big game.

Deer hunters statewide were fewer than in 1988, but they hunted longer and had a higher success rate. During 1989 seasons, 142,400 hunters (148,600 in 1988) took 95,200 deer, (82,200 in 1988) setting an all-time record. The success rate was 67 percent, as opposed to 55 percent in 1988; and hunters spent 1,089,800 days afield (978,000 in 1988).

Elk hunters set an all-time record also, with 77,200 taking 22,600 elk for a success rate of 29 percent. Harvest in 1988 was 20,400 for 77,800 hunters, a 26 percent success rate. Elk hunting provided 699,000 hunter days of sport in 1989, as opposed to 704,500 in 1988.

A record antelope harvest of 3,500 was reported by 4,640 hunters who spent 12,500 days afield. The success rate was 75 percent, better than the 72 percent in 1988 when 3,900 hunters took 2,800 antelope in 11,600 days afield.

A record 400 moose were taken by 464 hunters, for an 85 percent rate; in 1988, 450 hunters took 399 moose for an 88 percent rate. They spent 3,000 days afield in both of those years.

Bighorn sheep hunters numbered 199 and took 98, for a 48 percent success rate. They spent 1,500 days afield. In 1988, 184 sheep hunters spent 1,700 days afield to harvest 78 sheep, a 40 percent success rate.

Part of the increased harvest of elk and antelope was due to a department response to depredation problems in agricultural areas. "We had several areas where big game herds were damaging private lands," said Wildlife Bureau Chief Tom Reinecker, "so we established hunts in those areas or issued more tags in an effort to trim those herds back to levels which could be supported on their normal range."

A more complete report on hunter success across the state will be included in the September-October issue of Idaho Fish and Game News.

Hearing Set for Proposed Changes in Idaho Trucking Regulations

LEWISTON — A public hearing on proposed legislation giving the trucking industry more flexibility in meeting Idaho's regulations will begin at 9:30 a. m., Wednesday, August 22, at the Ramanda Inn, 621 21st Street in Lewiston.

The legislation would allow truckers operating on the state highway system to meet one of several length restrictions, according to the Idaho Transportation Department, which is sponsoring the hearing.

Most of Idaho's mountainous state highways are restricted to semi-trailers 48 feet in overall length and a 39-foot kingpin setting dimension. A kingpin setting dimension is the distance measured from the connection of the tractor and the trailer to the rear axles.

The proposed legislation would allow semitrailer combinations to operate at one of the following lengths depending on the curvature of the highway.

1. On highways that have severe curves, semi trailer combinations would be restricted to 60 feet in overall length;

2. On highways with less severe curvature, semi trailer combinations would be authorized to operate at 65 feet in overall length or by having a 41-foot or less kingpin setting dimension; or

3. Highways with minor or no curvilinear alignment will be authorized for operation of 48-foot semitrailers without any over length or kingpin setting restrictions.

"Certain industries within Idaho are having trouble meeting the current kingpin requirement," Mary Sayers, Vehicle Size and Weight Specialist for the transportation department, said. "The new regulations would give the trucking industry options so they can operate on the majority of Idaho's highways as well as bring the state into compliance with new federal regulations."

Transportation department representatives will present the legislation and show how the restrictions would apply to the various highways. The department will also be asking the truckers for input on the regulations. "It is hard to determine how the proposed legislation would affect the trucking industry because of the variety of equipment operated in the state," Sayers said. "Truckers should attend this meeting to fully understand the impact of this proposal."

The new restrictions would not decrease safety for the travelling public, Sayers said.

Apparent Low Bidder Announced for Highway Project on Idaho 3

Poe Asphalt Paving, Inc., of Clarkston, Wash., is the apparent low bidder for the Little Potlatch Creek to Kendrick project and Kendrick stockpile in Nez Perce and Latah counties, the Idaho Transportation Department announced. The apparent low bid was \$1,066,581 and was among two bids.

Work on this project will include resurfacing 7.34 miles of Idaho 3, Little Potlatch Creek to Kendrick, as well as crushing and stockpiling cover coat material, road mix and anti-skid material at the Kendrick Maintenance Yard.

A starting date will be set when the contract is awarded; the proposed completion time is on or before December 1.

Monday Storm Caused Outages, Other Damage

A severe summer thunderstorm swept across the region and the Kendrick-Juliaetta area early Monday evening bringing with it high winds, thunder and lightning and heavy rains. The resulting wind disrupted power and phone service, blew down a number of trees on the ridges and caused washing on fields and even on some roads in the rural area. The storm brought the peas and lentil harvest to a standstill.

The storm apparently developed suddenly as weather forecasters did not predict anything like the force and fury of the wind and rain. The temperatures climbed rapidly on Monday and unofficial readings in town were at over 100 degrees by mid-afternoon. Clouds began forming around four o'clock and continued until after 6 when the sky was completely covered. The winds picked up gradually and by 6 to 6:30 had reached gale force.

At 6:55 the power went off in Kendrick and shortly afterward the rain arrived. Rain fell heavily, whipped by the strong winds. The Main Street of Kendrick was deserted at the height of the storm, except for a few hardy souls who braved the storm to roll up open car windows.

The storm moved on through the towns and by 7:30 only a few drops were falling in Kendrick. Power was returned to the town at 8:05. Kendrick was one of the lucky areas with Juliaetta power off until some time during the night.

Electrical service to some portions of the ridges, such as Bear Ridge, was not restored until almost 9:00 a. m. Tuesday morning.

The storm did bring a dramatic and almost sudden cooling—where the temperature was slightly over 100 degrees at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon, but by 8 that evening the mercury had skidded to below 70.

South Latah Highway District crews were down in this area early Tuesday removing trees that had fallen and blocked the roads, and clearing rain-swept mud and debris from the county highways. Dick Flodin, a road foreman, told of a number of trees blown down on the ridges. He said some of the roads were washed badly by the heavy rains.

By Tuesday afternoon, warm summer weather had returned and with it the temperatures had moved back into the eighties.
